Social Studies Skills and Processes

Reading and Source Analysis and Application

- Read closely to determine what the text says explicitly and to make logical inferences from it.
- Integrate and evaluate content presented graphically, visually, orally, and multimodally as well as in words within and across print and digital sources.
- Evaluate the argument and specific claims in a text, including the validity of the reasoning as well as the relevance and fluency of the evidence.

Writing Standards

- Students will write arguments focused on discipline-specific content.
- Students will write informative/ explanatory texts, including the narration of historical events.

Historical Thinking and Reasoning

- Engage in inquiry, including constructing compelling questions, supporting questions, and determining helpful resources needed to answer their questions.
- Evaluate context, continuity and change by analyzing connections among events and developments in broader historical contexts.
- Analyze various perspectives by analyzing the multiple factors that influenced peoples' perspectives during different historical eras and explaining how and why perspectives change over time.
- Analyze the relative influence of various causes of events and developments in the past and in contemporary society while evaluating their effects and implications.

6th Grade Course Content

Unit One: Prehistoric People (Transition to Civilization)

- 1. Explain how early people interacted with their environment to meet their basic needs and survive.
- 2. Describe and evaluate the effects of the transformation of human beings from Paleolithic (food collecting) to Neolithic (food producing agriculture).
- 3. Analyze and evaluate the impact of a stable food supply (agriculture) on the development of permanent settlements.
- 4. Explain how social studies uses artifacts to interpret history.

Unit Two: The First Civilizations (Mesopotamia, Egypt, and Canaan)

- 1. Explain how the geography affected the development of the world's first civilizations.

- 2. Describes the elements of culture through an analysis of the first civilizations.

Unit Three: Ancient India

- 1. Evaluate the unique geographical features that affected the development and growth of ancient India.
- 2. Analyze the emergence of urban development in the Indus River Valley.
- 3. Evaluate how the Aryan migration affected Indian culture and the development of Hinduism.
- 4. Connect the development of the social structure in ancient India to its religious beliefs.
- 5. Recognize the major cultural and historical achievements of ancient India.

Unit Four: Ancient China

- 1. Evaluate the impact of geographical features on China's history of isolation.
- 2. Describe and analyze the advantages and disadvantages of feudalism during Zhou Dynasty.
- 3. Explain how the instability of the Warring States Period led to the development of the three Chinese philosophies.
- 4. Analyze the changes that led to a unified Qin Dynasty.
- 5. Evaluate the major advancements of Han Dynasty.
- 6. Evaluate the development of trade between China and other parts of the world.

Unit Five: Ancient Greece

- 1. Analyze how the geography of Greece affected the way in which ancient Greeks lived.
- 2. Compare the emergence and rise of the major Greek city-states.
- 3. Explain how internal interactions between Greek city-states and contact with other nation-states influenced the development of Greece.
- 4. Evaluate the cultural impact and significance of the Hellenistic Age.

Unit Six: Ancient Rome

- 1. Analyze how the geography of Rome affected the way in which ancient Romans lived.
- 2. Describe the development of the Roman republic.
- 3. Analyze the reasons for Rome's transition from a republic to an empire with a dictatorial system of government.
- 4. Analyze the cultural achievements of ancient Rome.
- 5. Evaluate the origins and spread of Christianity in the Roman Empire
- 6. Analyze the reasons for the fall of the Roman Empire
