Knights Family,

It is my pleasure to share with you the latest edition of Crossings Christian School's journal, *Missio'*. Enclosed you will find highlights, statements, facts, and vision for the future of CCS. While many schools can fill pages with accomplishments and aspirations, what separates our school from many others is the mission which we are striving to deliver, "To partner with parents and church to develop students into Christ-centered servant leaders who are academically and spiritually prepared for college and life."

Our mission supports the biblical concept of parental discipleship outlined in Deut. 6:7 (ESV) and the goal of, not only academic preparation but also eternal preparation. Therefore, the delivery of our mission is based on a distinctly biblical educational philosophy termed "Kingdom Education: "A Life-long, Bible-based, Christ-centered process of leading a child to Christ, building them up in Christ, and equipping them to serve Christ" (Schultz, 1998). This approach to education is congruent with the statutes found in Psalm 78 and emphasizes most what other educational approaches fail to target — the spiritual formation of a student.



What you will find in the pages beyond include the accomplishments of extremely talented and dedicated students who are taught and led by the best educators in the state of Oklahoma. Also, the highlighted facilities in which our programs are showcased rarely have an equal. Likewise, the parental involvement of our families in the lives and education of their children is exemplary. However, all of these outstanding merits are for naught if we fail to "...tell to the coming generation the glorious deeds of the Lord, and His might, and the wonders that He has done" (Psalm 78:4, ESV).

That's what I love about Crossings Christian School – our mission reflects a Kingdom mindset, which satisfies and supersedes earthly knowledge. My hope is that not only will this be evident in this issue of *Missio*', but more importantly, that it will be unmistakable in our daily approach to carrying out the mission of our school through Kingdom Education "so that they should set their hope in God and not forget the works of God, but keep His commandments" (Psalm 78:7, ESV).

Kingdom Education may not sound like the latest pedagogical buzzword garnering praise as breakthrough research from the bastions of higher education. As Dr. Jason Nave, Head of School, explains it, "Kingdom Education is the focus on keeping the Kingdom of God as the lodestar of all that we do - even education. How can we exclude the eternal focus of God's Kingdom and His commands and teach to the highest degree? Colossians 2:2-3 states that in Christ are hidden all the mysteries of wisdom and knowledge. Therefore, how can we impart knowledge and foster the gaining of wisdom without accounting for both the spiritual and temporal components of life? To tend to one without the other is to offer an incomplete education."

Kingdom Education can be defined as "The life-long, Bible-based, Christ-centered process of leading a child to Christ, building them up in Christ, and equipping them to serve Christ" (Schultz, 1998). The basic premise of this philosophy is that parents are the primary faith trainers, and a Christian school is a partner in this endeavor. The philosophy of Kingdom Education is echoed in the mission of Crossings Christian School: to partner with parents and the church to develop Christ-centered servant leaders who are spiritually and academically prepared for college and for life.

In Dr. Glen Schultz's book, "Kingdom Education, God's Plan for Educating Future Generations," he defines four principles, beginning with the understanding that educating our children is an intentional and multi-generational approach. The second principle explains it is a lifelong process that begins at birth and continues, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The understanding that discipleship begins at home and is reinforced through the partnership of a Christian education sums up principles three and four.

The philosophy, and its principles, are founded in Scripture. Deuteronomy 6:4-7, which calls us to love the Lord our God with all our hearts, soul, mind, and strength, is written to parents as it reminds us to impress these things on our children and "talk about them when [we] wake up, lie down, sit and walk by the way. Parents who have chosen to send their students to our school are, in turn, choosing CCS to be their "by the way partner" in this endeavor.

Luke 2:52 states that "Jesus grew in wisdom and stature and in favor with God and man." As Christ followers, we are called to emulate Him and teach others to do the same. These traits parallel education through the vision of CCS, which calls us to equip our students to grow intellectually, physically, spiritually, and socially.

The fourth principle of Kingdom Education is evidenced in the partnership of discipleship as written in Luke 6:40, "The student is not above the teacher, but everyone who is fully trained will be like their teacher." Kingdom Education presents CCS teachers, coaches, and staff members with the opportunity to influence and disciple those in their care as like-minded, Christian mentors. Someone or something will disciple the next generation, and Kingdom Education focuses on the intentional discipleship process.

The ultimate goal of Kingdom Education is to develop and prepare our students to face and understand the world through a biblical lens referred to as, "worldview." CCS Spiritual Formation Director, Jamie Wheat, strives to do this daily, stating "A biblical worldview must be the lens through which we see all of life," and

once it is developed, "it will change how we view everything in our world." This begins for even the youngest Knights as they memorize and understand Scripture through daily exercises with children and daily communication with their parents. It remains a constant within every classroom and activity across the CCS campus for students as young as three years old and until their high school graduation.

Dr. Nave recently met with new CCS families, describing the partnership between the school and parents as defined by Kingdom Education. Additionally, this last June, 26 faculty and staff members of CCS joined with other Christian educators and parents across the country, providing the opportunity to examine, explore, and discuss the vast impact that Kingdom Education affords our students and their developing personal relationships with Christ.

Among the group was Lower School Assistant Principal, Kim Bastin, who recognizes the potential impact and partnering role a Christian school plays in the lives of each and every student. She stated, "When God became man, He came not only to die for us to clean away the sins that cover us, but Christ came to provide an example for us, to show us how to love, how to teach, how to provide compassion, and how to prove that there is hope in a world filled with pain and anger. Ultimately, this should be the goal of a Christian school, to follow the example set by Christ. A Christian school promoting and promising Christ-based education and administration must remain diligent to keep that mission at the forefront of every lesson, activity, discipline, and reward."

Academic Team


The Crossings Christian School Academic Team had a noteworthy year, showcasing their exceptional knowledge and competitive spirit. They dominated the area, regional, and district tournaments, securing first place in each of these competitions, and finishing as State Runner-Up in 2022. Two of the team's seniors, Lucas L. and Reagan T., were recognized as All-Staters, further highlighting their individual achievements within the team. Their accomplishments add to the impressive track record, which includes five state championships in 2013, 2016, 2018, 2019, and 2021.

Band

The Crossings Band had an extraordinary year, including earning the title of Jazz Band OSSAA 3A State Champions, marking their fourth consecutive year of qualifying for the state competition. In addition to their exceptional musical achievements, they formed a special "Holy Spirit" band that graced numerous basketball games and State Send-offs for fellow Upper School groups heading to state competition. The band boasted an impressive lineup with five All-State Musicians - Reagan T. '23, Spencer B. '23, Brandon D. '24, Dennis D. '24, and Robel S. '24. Their bond extended beyond the stage, as they enjoyed various opportunities for camaraderie, including Friday night pre-game meals, a Christmas party, and a memorable Fine Arts trip to New York City. The band program was able to achieve and perform some incredible music while raising the standard for what CCS instrument groups can do.

Debate

The Crossings Debate Team had one of its most outstanding years to date, achieving unprecedented success. Their accomplishments include winning the 6A OSSAA Championship, with senior Blaine Y. '23 earning his second consecutive championship title and junior Braeden A. making a remarkable debut. Both Blaine and Braeden were recognized as All-Staters, with Blaine achieving this honor for the second time. The team received a full invitation to the prestigious Tournament of Champions at the University of Kentucky, marking a significant milestone for Crossings Christian School. Furthermore, Blaine and Braeden made history for CCS by being ranked in the National Coaches Poll, placing 52nd among the best debate teams in the country. In an impressive display of skill, they defeated the 5th ranked team in the country, Shawnee Mission South, in the semifinals of the Colleyville Heritage tournament, securing their most significant victory to date. The Crossings Debate Team's achievements in the past year have solidified their position as a force to be reckoned with in the world of debate.

Orchestra

The Crossings Orchestra had a exemplary year, showcasing its exceptional talent and dedication. In November, they earned straight Superiors at Districts, highlighting their consistent excellence. At the State Symphonic Contest in February, they achieved an Excellent stage rating and a Superior rating in sight reading, further establishing their skills. The orchestra boasted outstanding performers and soloists, including Collin A. '25, who earned the prestigious All-State Violin title, and Tucker M. '23, a three-year All-State participant. The orchestra participated in a variety of performances and contests, such as *The Wizard of Oz* Pit, Friends and Family concerts, two school concerts, as well as the Regional and State Solo/Ensemble contest, where they garnered an impressive eight superior ratings.

Theatre

Crossings Theatre Arts had an eventful and successful year, marked by their implementation of a new flying system in the production of *Peter Pan and Wendy*. Furthermore, the team's hard work paid off as they secured a commendable 4th place at OSSAA One Act Regionals. Jaedyn F. '24 had a remarkable performance earning her the well-deserved recognition of All-Star Cast for Regionals. They offered a diverse repertoire of shows this year, including *The Wizard of Oz, I Never Saw Another Butterfly, and Dystopia: The Hungry Maze Game of Divergent Death.* Throughout the season, students consistently exceeded expectations, tackling every challenge with determination, adaptability, creativity, and a firm belief in the process and its outcomes.

Vocal Music

CCS Vocal Music had an exceptional year filled with notable achievements. At the OSSAA 3A Districts, they achieved an abundance of Superior and Excellent ratings, pushing them on to State. At the State level, their exceptional Stage Performance and Sight-Reading earned them a Superior rating, qualifying them for the Outstanding Achievement Award. Additionally, their Solo & Ensemble performances received all Superior ratings, with four solos and two ensembles impressing the judges. The Upper School Show Choir also made their mark at invitational contests, particularly excelling at Edmond Santa Fe, where they garnered straight Superior ratings and earned a prestigious Top Ten Award. Isabelle S. '23 shone brightly as an All-State Choir Member, and she was also honored with the Three-Year Medalist award, highlighting her exceptional talent. The progress of the program was also noteworthy as we celebrated the creation and debut performance of the new Middle School Show Choir. The future is bright for Crossings Vocal Music!

'25 led the boys' team with a remarkable performance, earning a medal and setting a new personal best and CCS record time. Nate B. '23, Harry S. '25, Zac R. '26, and Spencer B. '23 also achieved personal best times, highlighting their dedication and improvement throughout the season. Trey B. '25, finishing 7th in the top ten, was recognized as a 3A All-Star, an exceptional achievement. Additionally, Nathan B. '23 and Bronwyn L. '23 were named Senior All-Stars by the OCCTCA, reflecting their outstanding contributions to the team.

The CCS Football Team had an impressive season with a record of 8-3, finishing in a three-way tie for second place in their district and earning a spot in the playoffs. VOLLEY BALL








BASKETBALL

The Crossings Basketball program had an impressive 2022-23 season. The boys' team finished with a remarkable record of 23-3, becoming District, Regional, and Area Champions and competing in the State Semifinals. They secured their fourth consecutive 20-win season with a win percentage of 85.5%, the highest in school history. Cal F. '25 was named the Greater Metro Athletic Conference (GMAC) Offensive Player of the Year and earned a place in the Oklahoman State Tournament All-Tournament Team and the Tournament of Champions All-Tournament Team.

The girls' team also had an impressive season, showcasing their resilience and determination in the face of adversity. Allison H. '24 contributed to the team's success to "grit, teamwork, and relentless effort," despite battling various injuries throughout the season. With only one senior on the team, their performance this past year has not only prepared them well for the future, but has proven their ability to compete at a high level.

The team's outstanding performance earned them a notable second-place finish in District 3A-1, showcasing their competitiveness and skill. Additionally, they secured the title of Bi-District Champions, further solidifying their accomplishments on the field.

The team's individual players also achieved remarkable milestones. Preston M. '23 left a lasting mark on the school's record books, setting new benchmarks with a batting average of 0.525, 55 RBIs, and 53 hits. Silas W. '23 established the school's lowest ERA record at an impressive 1.40. 


TENNIS





ON CAMPUS | MIDDLE SCHOOL

The MacDonalds

THE first time Mr. Paul S. MacDonald stepped on the campus of Crossings Christian School, it was to chair our accreditation team in 2006. At that time, CCS had an enrollment of less than 200 students and classrooms were in the basement of the former Crossings Community Church building in Belle Isle. As the chairman of the ACSI Executive Board, Capital Corporation, and Accreditation Committee as well as the Head of School at Emmanuel Christian, Mr. MacDonald was well-equipped to assist CCS in preparing and attaining our accreditation status over the next several months. Of course, this was just the beginning of his legacy and leadership at CCS.

Mr. MacDonald was once again invited to visit Crossings Christian School in 2011, but this time to serve as the Head of School. After a long and prosperous tenure at Emmanuel School and Oklahoma Bible Academy, both CCS and Mr. MacDonald felt the Lord's calling for him and Franci to join the CCS Family in the fall of 2012.

He spent his first summer on campus praying over classrooms, pouring over the curriculum, and memorizing every student and staff member using the most recent yearbook. It is easy to see why he was quickly and affectionately labeled Mr. Mac. Within his first few years, Mr. Mac not only served as the Head of School, but also as the Upper School Principal, during which time he added AP courses and additional teachers, laying the foundation for today's rigorous academic standards. He also recognized the value of a strong Fine Arts department and championed the growth of the performing and visual arts across campus. Mr. Mac also understood the need to develop the campus and instituted a multi-year plan that included the addition of football, soccer, baseball, and softball complexes, a middle school building, a Performing Arts Center, a competition gymnasium, and other state-of-the-art facilities.

LEAVING A LEGACY | CELEBRATING THE MACS

As a graduate of a Christian high school and university, coupled with over three decades of service in Christian Education, it was clear that Mr. Mac had the knowledge and skills necessary to continue CCS' growth, which is realized today. This, of course, includes the 1200+ students currently enrolled at CCS, making it the largest preschool-twelfth grade private school in the state of Oklahoma. Mr. Mac's guidance was also integral in the growth of the CCS campus, which added over 250,000 square feet of academic space and a 13-acre athletic complex during his tenure. His attention to academic rigor is evidenced through CCS' 19 AP courses, dual credit courses, and the consistent above-average ACT scores from our graduating classes, confirmed again by the Class of 2023's 26.5 average. While campus and academic growth are valuable, the most important component is the spiritual impact experienced by our students, staff, and families throughout Mr. Mac's time as Head of School.

At almost every event or meeting, Mr. Mac's heart could be heard, saying "It matters where our students are 10 years from now, but it matters more where they are 1,000 years from now." Spiritual formation was paramount for both Mr. and Mrs. MacDonald.



Franci served faithfully as a coach, mentor, and the school's first Spiritual Formation Director for Girls throughout her tenure at CCS. By organizing elements including Spiritual Formation week, weekly Bible studies, the introduction of small groups, service projects, and relevant and intentional topics and speakers in chapel, both Mr. and Mrs. Mac knew, prioritized, and exemplified a Christian foundation for our students. They consistently prioritized the spiritual growth of CCS students, regardless of the day, time, or demands of the week, often meeting with students in the evenings to offer prayer and support.

Paul and Franci were staples at every school event. They attended each and every chapel, play, musical, performance, and sporting event, both home and away. Often, they could be seen in the front row, following the lines and singing along. At athletic events, however, Mr. Mac often chose to sit mid-level in the stands in order to see the game in its entirety and to ensure his grumbling about the referees couldn't be heard on the field. He was, and remains, a passionate supporter of our student-athletes.

After serving 44 years in Christian education, 11 of which included his time as the Head of Crossings Christian School, we wish Paul and Franci a blessed and restful retirement. We thank them for their faithful service and demonstration of Colossians 3:23 through each day at CCS, answering the call that "WHATEVER YOU DO, WORK AT IT WITH ALL YOUR HEART, AS WORKING FOR THE LORD..."


