The 2023-2024 school year has started exceptionally well despite the extreme heat at the beginning of the school year. As we conclude our first month of school, we are pleased to inform you that all of the students are engaged and focused on their learning. Nonnewaug High School continues to expand its course offerings and offer students additional opportunities to earn college credit and participate in workforce experiences. Region 14 has instituted comprehensive K-12 common assessments that will help staff inform their instruction and help students set and achieve their individual academic goals.

Region 14 has continued to make progress in our infrastructure that will enhance the learning environment for all of our students. Construction of the new Horse Barn at Nonnewaug High School continues to make progress, the installation of new 6th grade lockers is on schedule for October, and the new Bethlehem Elementary School playground is on schedule to be installed in the late fall.

Region 14 will continue to build on the synergy that has been created at the beginning of the school year. It is a privilege to work with your child every day.

WOODBURY MIDDLE SCHOOL

8th Grade Social Studies Looks at American Stories





As a warm-up before eighth graders in Jim Spinner's Social Studies class jump into learning about early American history, they shared part of their own histories with classmates.

The "American Stories" lesson tasked students with uncovering their family histories to learn when and how their families came to the United States, to Connecticut, and eventually Woodbury or Bethlehem. Students were interested to hear about the many different countries from which their classmates immigrated to the United States – Albania, Slovakia, Ireland, Italy, England, Germany, Jamaica, Portugal, Mexico, and more.

They looked for patterns, themes, commonalities and just interesting stories and discovered there are similar reasons behind their families' immigrations to the area.

World Language at WMS

In Dawn Manogue's 8th grade World Language classes, these first-year students work on vocabulary development and learn about Spanish and French cultures. Students begin with vocabulary words and work on responding to questions, learning about the contemporary life of youth in French and Spanish-speaking countries, and exploring personal and public identities of people in these countries. In Spanish, students played a Mexican Bingo style game called "Loteria" that combines vocabulary skills as they listen for the Spanish word called out and try to match the images to the corresponding picture on their card. French students have been working on greetings, words for some foods, descriptive adjectives, and learning about culture and family.



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Counselors Makes Connections at WMS

Counselors hold classroom lessons twice a week to explore many topics encompassing social-emotional skills and academic needs. Lesson topics include career inventories, looking ahead to high school, time management, decision making skills, and ultimately building their Student Success Plan over the span of the three years they are at WMS. School counselors collaborate with both students and their families and kicked off the school year with a Needs Assessment for parents, followed-up by a student survey within student classes. Parents and students had the opportunity to offer suggestions for lesson topics that will help counselors deliver a quality curriculum that aligns with the needs of both them and their families. Weekly in-class lessons strengthen the essential connections to ensure students always know where to turn for support.


Everyday Math & Science Means Team Work at BES

Second graders practice math facts using a fill-in-the blank puzzle to find the missing addition and subtraction equations. Students collaborate with each other in small groups and use digit cards and number cubes to practice adding and subtracting within the number 20 to make the equations true.

In science, fifth graders are learning about Food Chains. Lessons included an activity called "Eat or Be Eaten" where students worked together to create food chains based on the cards they randomly picked from the deck.

The students had fun learning about how plants, insects, animals, and humans are inter-connected within our Ecosystem.

The school year is off to a fantastic start! Elementary students have been increasing their phonics skills through the implementation of Fundations while also participating in thinking critically and creatively in math and collaborating with their peers through the Illustrative Math program. Our middle school students have begun to experience the integration of reading, writing, and speaking standards with the skills of researching, analyzing, interpreting, and evaluating texts through the study of historical and scientific topics in their English Language Arts (ELA) classes. Our high school students are developing a stronger understanding of the importance of SAT testing as an indicator of future success and lifetime earnings through advisory, class meetings, and class lessons

With the new curricular components in our elementary and middle schools, the Instructional Leaders and I will be hosting a curriculum night at each school to provide parents and guardians with information about the programs we are utilizing and even participate in a mini-lesson to experience some aspect(s) of the programs themselves.

At Bethlehem Elementary and Mitchell Elementary, we will present Fundations, the PreK-3 phonics program; Illustrative Math, the K-9 math program; and Mystery Science, the K-5 science program. At Woodbury Middle School, we will present OpenEL, the 6-8 English Language Arts program, along with the new literacy lab structure for ELA in 6th and 7th grade; Illustrative Math; and OpenSciEd, the 6-8 science program. After the three presentations, there will be a guestion and answer period.

We look forward to speaking with all who attend and giving a glimpse into our students' school day as parents and guardians participate in lesson components.
