In District 129, we are guided by the following principles when deciding on activities:


- We believe that all learners have the right to and deserve to be included, accepted, and to contribute unique perspectives and experiences.


Lam Latino: The Beauty in Me*

Bonus features include a guide for how to create your own butterfly garden at home, as well as a bilingual glossary of select plant and animal species native to the island of Cuba.



The book includes a letter from the author and suggestions for celebrating Children's Day /El día de los niños, making the book perfect for gifting, family celebrations, and classroom sharing.


