

2022-23 School Board Goals

Each year, the Minnetonka School Board sets goals for the school district. In the 2022-2023 school year, Minnetonka Public Schools focused on three goals.

GOAL: EXCELLENCE IN WELL-BEING, CONNECTION, AND BELONGING

The District will foster and promote positive student well-being, connection and belonging efforts and will identify and remove barriers that have a detrimental effect on these areas. The District will strive for fair treatment, opportunity and advancement of all students to pursue their highest levels of academic and personal achievement. The Board's vision for child-centered excellence will be the foundation for these efforts.

GOAL: EXCELLENCE IN STUDENT LEARNING AND SUPPORT

Excellence in student learning and support is a foundational principle guiding the Minnetonka School Board and District Administration in their work. The continuation of the District's excellence will be driven through deep implementation of educational frameworks and strategic programs to support student learning. The District will also broaden the reach of the Minnetonka experience through the Tonka Online K-12 e-learning program and will assess the program's successes and challenges to make recommendations for future adjustments. And, the District will utilize space strategically to accommodate its growing innovative programming. This includes long-term facility planning for the programming needs in all academic and co-curricular programs.

GOAL: EXCELLENCE IN LEADERSHIP AND ORGANIZATIONAL SUPPORT

The District strives for excellence in all aspects of leadership and fiscal management. It will increase engagement opportunities for District leadership to build even stronger community trust, keeping constituents informed and engaged. The District will take steps to further maximize long-term financial stability and sustainability. And, there will be an enhanced focus on recruitment and retention of exceptional teachers and staff, including efforts to create a representative workforce that will enrich the learning environment for all students.

Q&A with School Board Chair Lisa Wagner

Lisa Wagner, School Board Chair and 16-year member of the Board, reflects on 2022-23 goal outcomes and the future of the District.

How did the School Board determine the 2022-23 goals?

CHAIR WAGNER: The School Board looks at a wealth of input when considering goals including surveys and input from students, teachers, staff and administrators. We distill that, as well as information we learn in our meetings, into actionable but visionary statements. Excellence in student well-being, connection and belonging underscores all the District does, and this should be an ongoing focus. The Board felt a continuation of the District's efforts with multitiered systems of support (MTSS) was of great importance—with a focus on tiered instruction for all students, as this allows improved outcomes for all. Regarding leadership and organizational support, the Board heard from the community it was looking for increased communication and engagement.

What are areas in particular where the Board feels the District performed well in 2022-23?

CHAIR WAGNER: The District made good progress on its well-being and belonging efforts. The continuing MTSS work has established a good foundation to build on. The community engagement and communication efforts were positive, and that is reflected in parent and community survey results. The District also had success with signature programs, such as S.A.I.L., VANTAGE and MOMENTUM, among others.

What are areas, in particular, where the Board feels the District has work to do?

CHAIR WAGNER: We need to practice continuous improvement. As the Board shared in our Vision document: "If our future is to be better than our past, we must have the courage to let go of what no longer serves us, embrace what is required for the future and advocate for what is best for our children, our community and our nation."

What do you see as the School Board's main focus and responsibility?

CHAIR WAGNER: The Board is responsible for governance of the District. It has one employee—the Superintendent. The Superintendent leads all other aspects of the District—the day-to-day operations and the implementation of the Board goals. As a Board, we do not make individual decisions. We operate as a cohesive, collaborative body that guides the District by providing a vision and setting goals. We serve as a bridge between the community and the District ... to collectively advocate the community's needs to the District and the District's needs to the community.

What do you see as opportunities and challenges going forward for the District?

CHAIR WAGNER: There is new work outlined in the 2023-24 goals regarding literacy, and that is a big opportunity. Our examination of financial stability is a challenge but also provides us with an incredible opportunity to reinvest in our students' futures. Continuing to build on our signature programs and provide exceptional student learning opportunities is critical.

In your 16 years on the Board, and with your last few months on the Board on the horizon, what are your hopes for the Board—and for the District?



Celebrating Academic Excellence

National Merit Semifinalists



Twenty-eight Minnetonka High School seniors have been named 2024 National Merit Semifinalists in the 69th annual National Merit Scholarship Program. The students scored among the nation's best on the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) taken their junior year, in fall 2022.

More than 1.3 million juniors entered the competition for 2024, and of those, approximately 16,000 (~ top 1%) were named National Merit Semifinalists. Semifinalists will have an opportunity to continue the competition for approximately 7,140 National Merit Scholarships.

IB Diploma Graduates



Congratulations to the 50 students from the Class of 2023 who earned the International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma. Of those, 27 earned an IB Bilingual Diploma in Chinese, Spanish or Portuguese.

The IB Diploma Programme is recognized and respected by the world's leading universities. At Minnetonka, the IB program

is an all-inclusive series of courses that uses internationallydeveloped curriculum to provide a deep, thought-provoking study in six areas during 11th and 12th grade. It is known for academic rigor and comprehensive curriculum, enhanced by an inquiry into the theory of knowledge, research, creativity, action, service and a capstone extended essay.

Math and Science Club at Minnetonka Middle School Fast

Middle schoolers from Minnetonka Middle School East formed a Math and Science Club, and in 2022-23, several of the club's teams had great success in math and science. The group was founded by student Michael Luo '27.

Three club teams participated in the State Science Bowl competition in the Middle School division, with one placing first and earning a trip to represent Minnesota at the National Science Bowl competition in Washington, D.C. The team of Michael Luo '27, Jacob Lee '27, Alex Ren '28, Addison Shi '28 and Evan Truong '28 placed fourth in their division nationally, resulting in an award for the school from the Department of Energy.

The club also had teams compete in the 2023 Minnesota MATHCOUNTS Competition sponsored by the Minnesota Society of Professional Engineers. The team of Luo, Lee, Ren and Sam Wu '28 placed first in state. Luo placed second in state as an individual and qualified to participate in the National MATHCOUNTS Competition.

Minnesota Aspirations in Computing Awards

The National Center for Women and Information Technology offers an annual awards program to recognize students for their technology interests, skills and accomplishments. The honor recognizes these students' academic excellence, leadership and future goals with regard to computing and technology.

This year, three Minnetonka High School students were honored at the state level with Minnesota Aspirations in Computing Awards: Meiling Mathur '23 was a State Winner, Valerie Nelson '23 earned a State Rising Star Award and Alia Peterson '23 earned a State Honorable Mention.

Testing Ahead of Peers

Minnetonka students experience a transformation that accelerates their learning far above the national average. By the time they reach middle school, the average sixth grader in English or Chinese/Spanish Immersion is performing beyond the 12th-grade level in reading and math compared to national norms.



MCA III Test Results Show Strong Performance by Tonka Students

Minnetonka students across all grades tested are performing well on measurements collected through standardized testing. Most notably, students demonstrated strong performances in science, reading and math. On the spring 2023 MCA III assessments, Minnetonka students ranked first in reading and science and second in math among comparative schools in the Twin Cities metro area.

NWEA Test Performance Compared to National Grade-level Criteria

By the spring of their first year with Minnetonka Schools, Kindergarten students already begin to perform academically ahead of their peers. By the end of elementary school, the average fifth-grader is performing at a mid ninth-grade level in reading and an early twelfth-grade level in math. By sixth grade, these students are performing beyond twelfth grade in both subjects.

Best Wishes to the Class of 2023

On Thursday, June 8, the 70th graduating class of Minnetonka High School attended commencement at U.S. Bank Stadium. The 889 graduates and their families joined the District in celebrating the culmination of their K-12 school journey.

Graduates have enrolled in 280 colleges and universities in 47 different states and the District of Columbia, and one graduate is studying internationally. The top five colleges and universities that graduates are attending include: University of Minnesota Twin Cities (84), University of Wisconsin Madison (57), Normandale Community College (33), Iowa

State University (30) and University of Saint Thomas (29). Four graduates are serving in the Air Force, Army, Marines, Navy or National Guard.

"Your legacy at Minnetonka High School is set," noted Principal Jeff Erickson in his commencement address. "It is one of kindness, humor, creativity, curiosity, respect and inclusivity. I am grateful to have been a part of your story, and it is with overwhelming pride and honor that I say to you, the Class of 2023, well done and congratulations!"

Updating Our Spaces

Building Improvements—Big and Small—Continually Transform Minnetonka Schools into an Even Better and Safer Place to Learn



The LED bulbs at Einer Anderson Stadium light up the night much more efficiently and cost-effectively than halogen bulbs.

From sustainability to security, updates to Minnetonka school buildings are a regular part of each school year and summer, when the majority of construction projects take place. The District's rolling Long-term Facility Maintenance 10-Year Plan ensures that buildings receive the attention they need. As updates occur, energy efficiency and enhanced security are underlying priorities, ensuring that Minnetonka's learning spaces are prepared for students and teachers both now and in the decades to come.

"We are efficient in energy use and saving money to put more toward the classroom as a core value in how we operate the District from a financial standpoint," said Paul Bourgeois, Executive Director of Finance and Operations for Minnetonka Public Schools.

Energy efficiency is a priority when planning building maintenance, such as including additional insulation to roofs for increased thermal efficiency. New additions and window replacements in existing buildings include installation of double-pane argon-filled 20%-tinted windows, saving on heat in the winter and air-conditioning costs in the summer.

All of the District's boilers have been converted from indirect-fire to direct-fire models, increasing efficiency by about 10%. The boiler systems have also received exhaust stack recovery units to increase efficiency by 10%. Existing HVAC mechanical units have been replaced with modern energy-efficient units.

Minnetonka Public Schools participates in seven community solar garden contracts, with the District as the anchor tenant with 40% of the generated output. It also has a Renewable*Connect contract with Xcel Energy for wind and solar sourcing of electricity.

All District buildings use LED interior lighting, and there are occupancy sensors in all classrooms and hallways to minimize lights on when spaces are not in use. Energy management controls in rooms minimize both electricity and natural gas use by targeting energy needs.

Outdoors, building security and parking lot lights also feature LED bulbs. In the Tonka Dome that is put up over Einer Anderson Stadium each winter, lights were switched from 1,000-watt halogen bulbs to 100-watt LEDs. Other

Einer Anderson Stadium and Veterans Field lights are also now LEDs.

"This has all happened over the years," said Bourgeois. "Energy efficiency continues to be a core factor in our ongoing building component upgrades that we do to keep our more than 1,833,000 square feet of facilities in a state of good repair for the long term."

Security remains a constant consideration in all District building upgrades, as well. "We are always evaluating ways we can keep students and staff as safe as possible in our schools and buildings. We revise and update procedures, and we upgrade security systems and equipment, taking recommendations from experts in the field to stay on the cutting edge," said Superintendent David Law.

An additional level of security and controlled entry was completed for all school buildings during the 2022-23 school year, requiring visitors to show identification before proceeding to main offices from entryway vestibules. For the 2023-24 school year, a new Security and Emergency Management Coordinator position was added to support needs across the District.

Update on VANTAGE/MOMENTUM Building

The District broke ground on its newest instructional space, the VANTAGE/MOMENTUM Building, in May 2022. Since then, the land was cleared and graded for construction and the structure has been built. While the building's completion timeline has been impacted by industry supply shortages, the work has been progressing very well. When completed in late winter/early spring, the building will be home to several VANTAGE strands and MOMENTUM's new aviation program. Groveland Elementary's Outdoor Classroom Offers Fresh Opportunities for Learning

In collaboration with the school's parent teacher organization, a new outdoor classroom was installed on the grounds of Groveland Elementary. Whimsical cement seats shaped like acorns and sized for elementary learners create a small amphitheater that can be utilized by classes and clubs. "The classroom has been a big success," said Andrew Gilbertson, Groveland Elementary Principal. "Classroom teachers and specialists have used it to get students learning outside and to increase engagement."





New Playground at Minnetonka Community Education Center Supports the District's Youngest Learners

Minnetonka Community Education replaced its 30-year-old playground with brand-new, fun, colorful and state-of-the-art equipment for the start of the 2022-23 school year. The new playground meets the needs of students ages two through five in the Minnetonka Preschool and Junior Explorers program. The play space includes a variety of equipment pieces for students of all ability levels, and it also provides a community space to socialize and play.

Classrooms of the Future in Action!

A Minnetonka Public Schools classroom looks very different today than it did 20, 10 or even five years ago—and in the years ahead, classrooms will continue to evolve. From flexible seating and modular desks to the worlds of possibility opened up through the interactivity of personal devices, Minnetonka classrooms are dynamic places where students of all grade levels are researching, collaborating and presenting, with technology as an accelerator for learning.

"Our District is research-driven, where proven and promising teaching and learning practices are the basis for classroom technology decisions," said Dr. Amy LaDue, Associate Superintendent for Instruction. "Desired learning outcomes, coupled with the research on how students learn and the technologies available, drive our technology needs."

"Classroom technology is any 'tool' used for any aspect of instruction or as a means to interact with the teacher and/or with classmates," said Amanda Fay, Director of Instructional Technology. "These range from low-tech pieces, such as math manipulatives and whiteboards, to high-tech options, like iPads, apps, presentation screens and microphones."

Throughout the 2022-23 school year, the Minnetonka Schools Teaching and Learning and Technology teams continued their iterative collaboration to research the next era of Minnetonka's classroom technology, a project presented to the School Board throughout the year as the "Classroom of the Future." The research process included stakeholder interviews, teacher surveys and focus groups, student focus groups and discussions with PTO/PTA leaders regarding classroom technology.

As administrators and teacher leaders prepare for "what's next" in terms of technology in the classroom, it will not be a device alone, but an entire classroom ecosystem designed to support student experiences for meaning, engagement and deeper learning. "The era of independent hardware devices has passed," said Mike Dronen, Executive Director of Technology. "What's next is a connected classroom portfolio of higher performing hardware and software that outperform today's current technology, better supporting learning, instruction, collaboration and access. We are looking to transform education."

Through extensive "Classroom of the Future" research, four

guiding principles emerged that will inform the District's next steps for technology. Technology utilized should be 1) Visible, 2) Mobile, 3) Flexible and 4) Collaborative.

Visible technology refers to consistent, reliable, equitable, modern and easy-to-use equipment, including bright and clear classroom display technology.

Mobile technology refers to responsive equipment with productive and efficient workflows and tools to support teachers and students both in and out of the classroom.

Flexible technology refers to the ability of equipment to adapt, physically or digitally, based on individual or collective student or teacher needs.

Collaborative technology refers to equipment that allows every student and teacher to engage in learning activities.

These core priorities will ensure that future technologies in Minnetonka classrooms continue to act as a catalyst to accelerate student learning.

Funding for Classroom Technology and District Security on the Nov. 7 Ballot

All of the technology currently used in Minnetonka classrooms is funded through the District's Capital Projects "Tech Levy."

This levy is up for renewal for Minnetonka School District resident voters to consider in the upcoming election. Approval of this ballot question would renew critical funding for the District's technology and security infrastructure, as well as support for the staff members in these areas.

Students Put Technology Skills into Action

Minnetonka Public Schools works constantly to support students in innovative ways that will stimulate learning and achievement. Teachers encourage students to work on real-world problems and pair their technology skills with innovation to solve challenges. Below are just a few examples of Minnetonka students putting technology into action.



Middle School Students Design & Create 3D-Printed Prosthetic for Pet Chicken

Seventh graders in Dawn Sorenson's technology education class used the engineering design process to make life a little easier for Maple, a local pet chicken beloved by an MME family. After the chicken lost a claw to frostbite, the class worked together to design and fabricate a prosthetic for her. Students used the digital application Sketch Up to create 3D renderings of their ideas, which were then fabricated using a 3D printer.



Elementary School Students Teach Digital Citizenship Using Green Screen Videos

Clear Springs Elementary fifth graders learned important digital citizenship skills in a hands-on way. Working in teams during their media time, students created videos about how to interact with others safely online while keeping their personal information secure. Students led every aspect of the video production, from writing the scripts, acting out conversations and recording their ideas to editing their footage and presenting final films to the class.

Signature Program Update

Experiential Learning Offers Pathways to Personal Success



Providing students with unique and personalized real-world learning opportunities has long been a priority for Minnetonka Schools. Through the District's innovative signature programs, students in grades K-12 are provided with experiences to connect curriculum to their lives beyond the classroom, deepening their understanding by learning from professionals and collaborating with each other.

"Our signature programs are a hallmark of a Minnetonka Schools education," said Superintendent of Schools David Law. "When learning is personalized to a student's interests, passions and needs through dynamic experiences, students find deep engagement and success. It's an amazing way to introduce them to future possibilities."

Read on for an update about several of these pathways, from the District's K-12 Language Immersion program to its many specialized courses that give students a chance to explore into future careers and post-high school opportunities. In addition to the programs featured here, Minnetonka Schools has many other personalized options for students:

- Ready-Start Kindergarten (RSK) is a Kindergarten program filled with hands-on opportunities to develop social and emotional skills, specifically designed with younger Kindergarteners in mind.
- Tonka Online provides an exceptional, comprehensive e-learning experience for students in grades K-12.
- Tonka Codes is a K-12 coding curriculum that introduces all students to the language of computer programming.
- Art and music classes start in Kindergarten, and musical theatre opportunities begin in fifth grade.
- Senior Capstone provides students the opportunity to apply for and participate in a two-week, off-campus experience at the end of their senior year.

LANGUAGE IMMERSION

Minnetonka's Chinese and Spanish Language Immersion Program provides premiere learning experiences for students from Kindergarten through their senior year. With the state's largest Language Immersion program, the District is uniquely prepared to support the goals of students.

In the 2022-2023 school year, there were 3,391 students enrolled in the District's Spanish Immersion program, and 1,228 enrolled in the Chinese Immersion program. The majority of graduates who continued Immersion through their senior year expressed the desire to earn an advanced degree in their language of study as either a major or minor.

"In our most advanced IB Immersion classes, the following statistics are noteworthy regarding how many students passed the IB exam: 100% for Chinese Language and Literature, 100% for Spanish Language and Literature Standard Level, 94% for Spanish Language & Literature Higher Level and 89% for Spanish Global Politics," shared Jodi Siegel, Immersion lead and Spanish Immersion teacher at Minnetonka High School.

Chinese Immersion student Declan Halloran '23 credits the program with supporting him in building deep friendships and with helping him plan for his career direction after high school. "I am interested in becoming a diplomat or an expert in East Asian culture," said Halloran. "Despite its difficulty, learning Chinese has been one of the most important parts of my life and has given me so many opportunities that I otherwise would not have had."

In the spring, the District added a new Tonka Online Course, Chile Immersion Abroad, which offered an opportunity for students to travel and study in Concepción, Chile. "Students dive deeply into many aspects of Chilean culture prior to travel and complete a travel project while in Chile," said Siegel. "This course shows an official Immersion Abroad course on their transcript and deepens their travel experience."

MINNETONKA RESEARCH

Minnetonka Research provides students the opportunity to pursue authentic research driven by their own questions and interests. This program inspires and guides students as they develop strong skills in communication, critical thinking, creativity and collaboration.

In 2022-23, 68 students participated in the program. This year, Minnetonka Research welcomed 90 students, the largest class in program history. Projects completed during the school year focused on everything from aerodynamics optimization to resolve porpoising issues in F1 automobile racing to machine learning algorithms for the early detection of carpal tunnel syndrome in violinists, and much more.

Many Minnetonka Research students took part in regional and state science fairs to share their knowledge and processes. One student, Ana Stewart '23, qualified to compete at the International Science and Engineering Fair. Another highlight of the year included the return of the in-person Minnetonka Research Symposium in May.

Minnetonka Research students were mentored by professional scientists from around the country and the globe. Our students then, in turn, mentored younger students from Minnetonka elementary schools. Twenty-eight fourth graders from Deephaven visited students in the spring to share their own research and participate in experimental design activities.

"The most challenging and exciting part of research is when you get to a step in your project that requires you to perform a technique that you have no idea how to do," said Kate Feist '23, a Minnetonka Research student. "You then get to do a deep dive into learning the new technique. You try. You mess it up. You try again, and you learn. It is very exciting and extremely challenging at times but very enjoyable because you have a passion for it."

MOMENTUM

Three years ago, MOMENTUM, Minnetonka High School's program for design and skilled trades, launched with expanded opportunities in technology education. It has since grown to serve hundreds more students. In that time, course registrations have increased by 56.7%, growing from 564 in 2020-21 to 884 in 2023-24. MOMENTUM provides students with specialized tracks in construction systems, manufacturing, design and transportation.

"The program has had continued success with the Mini-Youth Apprenticeship opportunities embedded in our classes," said Brent Veninga, coordinator for MOMENTUM. "On a monthly basis, students visited area businesses in the trades. They have given these site visits and subject matter experts high praise."

Lessons in professionalism have been incorporated into the MOMENTUM curriculum based on input from local business partners, training students on the importance of the following components: Having a "safety first," actionable mindset, being reliable, being engaged, being proactive and being an effective communicator.

"I'm proud of myself for taking a risk and taking the Physics of Home Renovation course," said Jacob Ekstrand '23. "It has taught me more than any other course about the real world. My MOMENTUM teacher has helped me better understand the trades and taught me countless skills that I'll be using for the rest of my life. The program has granted me so many opportunities to get first-hand experience in the trades."

Minnetonka's first aviation courses launched this fall as part of the transportation track in MOMENTUM. More than 170 high school students elected to take part in this opportunity. Aviation courses will be held in the new VANTAGE/MOMENTUM building under construction on Highway 101 and Covington Road. This soon-to-open, state-of-the-art facility will bring VANTAGE programming closer to campus

-Jacob Ekstrand '23 MOMENTUM Construction Systems Student and will provide specialized spaces to support the curriculum offered in MOMENTUM and VANTAGE. It will be Minnetonka's first all-new school building in more than 56 years.

"To see the incredible growth in student interest in MOMENTUM in just a few years time has been so exciting," said Mark Ambrosen, School Board Director, advisory board member for MOMENTUM and retired air traffic controller. "The new aviation track aligns with the program's goal of preparing our students for future career opportunities in the trades and with the School Board Goal of Excellence in Student Learning and Support. This is definitely opening doors for students to consider various aspects of aviation as a viable career option."

Of the students registered for aviation in 2023-24, 20.7% are female, compared to just 9.6% of female pilots currently in the industry. Principal Jeff Erickson shared, during an update to the School Board, that the demographic balance of students registered for Aviation I and Aviation II is representative of the backgrounds of students at the high school, showing interest across various racial, gender and learning ability markers.

"It is great to see that students from a wide variety of backgrounds are interested in MOMENTUM programming. Closing opportunity gaps and offering alternate post-high school paths for students who may not be interested in attending 4-year colleges are important markers of success for MOMENTUM," said Meghan Selinger, Vice-chair of the Minnetonka School Board. "The District offers financial assistance to those who may need it for MOMENTUM fees, such as flight time for the aviation program, to reduce barriers to student participation."

"It's important to note that the District funded the construction of the VANTAGE/MOMENTUM Building with existing bond capacity and revenue streams. The District's financial team, under the guidance and support of the Citizen Finance Advisory Committee, refinanced existing bonds and used that additional bond capacity, along with some of the District's investment earnings, to pay for the building. The District did not have to ask tax payers for more money to get it built. That is something we try to do whenever possible creatively and strategically use all existing revenue options before going to voters for more," said Patrick Lee-O'Halloran, current School Board Treasurer, who also serves as the Board representative on the Citizen Finance Advisory Committee. "Wise and prudent financial management is a key strategy the Board—and the District Administration—will continue to embrace. This is one important way that we, as a District, have been able to serve our students well through top-tier facilities, which go hand-in-hand with top-tier instruction."

The VANTAGE/MOMENTUM Building is slated for completion later this school year. A ribbon-cutting and open house will be planned and communicated in late winter or early spring.

VANTAGE

VANTAGE is Minnetonka High School's advanced professional studies program, offering a unique way for high school students to apply their coursework in real-world settings. Now in its 11th year, VANTAGE offers 10 different strands and serves more than 550 high school students.

The program provides hands-on engagement and connection through one-on-one mentorship with local professionals, rigorous coursework and real project work directed by industry leaders. VANTAGE students partner with small, local businesses, nonprofits and multinational corporations to provide recommendations and insights into a variety of authentic business development strategies.

"The central goal of VANTAGE is to produce confident young adults who are ready to go out and succeed in whatever they want to do," said Roger Andre, executive director of VANTAGE. "Students get to experience what professional life might be like five, 10 or 20 years from now."

Learning from industry professionals was a highlight of the program for Zariya Anderson '23, a VANTAGE Health Sciences student. "In our last semester project, we shadowed two or more professionals in a medical field and then presented our different experiences to our class and mentors," she said. "I had the amazing opportunity to shadow three people—a trauma nurse, a firefighter and an orthopedic physician's associate. I loved observing all their day-to-day activities, including surgeries and how they interact with patients."

The addition of the VANTAGE Education strand to the program course list was a highlight of the 2022-23 school year. It joins study areas in Business Analytics, Design + Marketing, Multimedia Communications, Global Business, Global Sustainability, Health Sciences, Public Policy and User Experience (UX) Design, as well as International Relations, a new strand added for the 2023-24 school year.

S.A.I.L.

Minnetonka's Students Achieving Independent Life (S.A.I.L.) program is a transition education opportunity for students ages 18-22 with special needs. Opened in 2021, the program is based in a building intentionally created to support learning for life after high school, and includes a complete model apartment, greenhouse, kitchen space, video production studio and learning labs for skill development.

The S.A.I.L. program assists students in preparing for success in adult life by focusing on student- and team-identified transition outcomes. Students have access to skill development activities designed to meet their needs for career training, recreation, leisure, community participation, independent living and post-secondary/post-school planning.

"Our students had a very busy school year," said Erin Valenta, Director of Transition Education. "Community involvement and practice is an integral part of our program. Students participated in more than 180 community outings and countless visits to internships and work experiences."

Community partnerships offer students ways to learn professional skills and build relationships for their future career opportunities. "We added a new work site at Northern Tool and Equipment this year," said Valenta. "It was a wonderful addition to our business partnerships, as we were able to add a different type of retail experience for students with an interest in tools and automotive."

"We have learned so much by coming to S.A.I.L.," said student Jacob Cofer '21, who completed the transition program in 2023. "We learned about how to grow in our independence. We learned about making wise and responsible decisions, and we learned many things to help us succeed in adulthood." Cofer completed his S.A.I.L. work seminar at Minnetonka Junior Explorers, and he has continued to work there since graduating from the program.

TONKA ONLINE

Tonka Online is Minnetonka Schools' e-learning program. It began as a high school-level supplemental program more than 10 years ago and has now grown to become a full K-12 school. Tonka Online offers its students the opportunity to receive the same outstanding District-developed curriculum, rigorous academic standards and commitment to excellence that their counterparts in Minnetonka's physical buildings receive. In 2022-23, 156 students enrolled in Minnetonka Schools through Tonka Online.

K-8 Tonka Online courses have been specifically designed to provide personalized instruction and to better support learners through a blend of synchronous and asynchronous instructional models. Outside of the classroom, teachers ensure that students have an opportunity to develop social and emotional skills with classmates.

"We are continuously collaborating to create memorable social experiences for our students," said Joe Hessburg, assistant director of Tonka Online. "We have many students who are becoming friends with each other and want to hang out and play. So, teachers created opportunities for families to do that. From community meet-ups to buddy groups to all-school assemblies, the Tonka Online experience is more than just an online course. It's a true school community."

High school students in Tonka Online have access to both supplemental courses and core curriculum courses that round out their graduation requirements.

"Minnetonka is one of the few districts in the metro that has been able to keep an online program going post-pandemic," said Superintendent of Schools David Law. "I'm excited that Tonka Online's K-12 full e-learning option will be heading into its third year, and we will continue to meet the needs of our students who thrive working online."

THE NAVIGATOR PROGRAM

The Navigator Program serves academically advanced students in second through fifth grade. This unique program provides a specialized learning environment capitalizing on the unique intellectual strengths of its learners.

"By providing rigorous, meaningful work in a safe learning environment, advanced learners develop the grit needed to try hard things, to fail and to try again," said Diane Rundquist, Minnetonka's Director of Advanced Learning. "This is critically important to this population of learners because we don't want college to be the first time a student struggles."

During the 2022-23 school year, Navigator students participated in experiential learning opportunities, including a food innovation challenge in partnership with VANTAGE. Students developed quality frozen desserts that were sustainable, healthy and appealing to consumers and presented their ideas to VANTAGE student panels.

"We do a lot of projects in which we get to decide what we want to focus on and that we direct for ourselves," said Devin Kuenzel-Turner '31. "We have made podcasts, we wrote alternatives to classic stories, we worked with VANTAGE high schoolers on product development and marketing and many other fun and interesting projects. I have confidence that I can embrace more responsibility and academic challenges beyond my grade level when given the opportunity."

Academic enrichment is available in Minnetonka for students K-12. At the elementary level, programs such as Independent Investigations, Project Think, Academic Extension and Wings also serve advanced students. In middle school, there are an array of Honors and Accelerated classes. Once in high school, there are many ways to engage in challenging work, including Advanced Placement, International Baccalaureate and Honors courses, as well as specialized programs such as Minnetonka Research and Project Lead the Way.

Strategic Enrollment Growth

Open Enrollment Funds Innovative Programs and Reduces Class Sizes

Outstanding teachers. Innovative, cutting-edge academic programs. World-class facilities. A personalized approach to student learning, well-being and connection. Minnetonka Public Schools has earned its reputation for excellence and has become a district of choice for families in Minnesota.

Sixteen years ago, Minnetonka Schools was on a steady decline of students. If the trend had continued, the District would be at approximately 6,000 students now. Instead, due to a strategic approach to planning and growth, the District is thriving at a bustling 11,100+ students and continues to offer some of the most innovative and sought-after opportunities available. Strong enrollment numbers have been key to the District's success.

"All around us we are seeing districts with declining student numbers," said Superintendent of Schools David Law. "Our Board recently had a presentation by the state demographer, and she explained that our state is aging and that student numbers are declining throughout it. This is impacting most districts in a very negative way, forcing them into steep cuts of personnel and programming."

By thoughtfully and creatively embracing open enrollment, which allows students from across the state to enroll in the school district, Minnetonka Schools brought in more than \$43 million in the 2022-23 school year alone, with more than \$7.5 million of that revenue left over, after the cost of instruction for open-enrolled students, to fund unique, innovative programs that benefit resident students and to minimize financial cuts to staff and programs.

"Many of the District's costs are fixed—such as facility-related expenses, utilities, and salaries and benefits for District administration and the majority of our teaching and support staff," said Chris Vitale, School Board Director. "By using the additional revenue provided through open enrollment each year, we have been able to build out signature programs such as Language Immersion, VANTAGE Advanced Professional

These are innovative, experiential learning options our resident students would likely not have without the added revenue the District receives from open enrollment, because we just couldn't afford them without it."

Because non-resident students bring significant revenue in the form of state and local aid, the District can keep class sizes small. The District hires more teachers and paraprofessionals and creates additional classes, as needed.

"It may seem counter-intuitive, but by adding open-enrolled students and increasing our student body, we can offer smaller class sizes," said Dr. Mike Remucal, School Board Director. "Without the additional open enrollment revenue, the District would really struggle to keep class sizes as small as they are now, as there would not be financial flexibility to add support when it's needed."

Minnetonka Schools consistently has low class sizes, as compared to the Twin Cities metro area average, as seen on the table below:

- Ciara Grad '24 won Best of Show for the 2023 Minnesota Junior Duck Stamp Contest, administered by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service.
- Marching Band placed eighth in state. Three students qualified for state in the Color Guard.
- Three Minnetonka students qualified for the state Music Listening competition, where they placed fifth overall.
- 34 elementary and middle school students were selected for the 2022-23 American Choral Directors Association Honor Choir.
- 11 students were selected for the 2022-23 Minnesota Music Educators Association All-State Choir.
- 12 students were selected for the 2022-23 Minnesota Music Educators Association All-State Band.
- Seven students were selected for the 2022-23 Minnesota Music Educators Association All-State Orchestra.
- Four students qualified for the MNSOTA Middle Level Honors Orchestra.
- Christian Garner '27 won the Minnetonka Youth Symphony Young Artist Grand Prize in the trumpet category.
- Scholastic Art Awards:

Service

- 264 students and adults were recognized through the President's Volunteer Service Award program. Together, the honorees reported 39,904 hours of service to local and global communities. 130 Bronze, 57 Silver and 77 Gold Awards were recognized.
- 44 MHS students earned varsity letters in Community Service.

Best Buddies is an organization that fosters oneto-one friendships and offers leadership development programs for people with and without intellectual and developmental disabilities.
- Jordan Cushing (English, MHS), Claire Harley (English, MHS), Jennifer Furness, (English, MMW) and Zach Ludvigson (Math, MHS) earned the National Board Certified Teacher distinction in 2023.
- Varsity Track & Field coaches Jane Reimer-Morgan (girls team) and James Finch (boys team) were named the State High School Coaches of the Year by the The U.S. Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association.
- Minnetonka Community Education was named as a Top-10 Community Education Program in North America by the Learning Resources Network.
- Joe Cossette (Science, MHS) has been named as the national Teacher of the Year by the Physics Teacher Education Coalition.
- Executive Director of Special Education Christine Breen received the 2023 Hero Award from GiGi's Playhouse, a nonprofit that provides free educational and therapeutic programs to individuals with Down syndrome.
- The Minnetonka Schools Communications Team earned 15 national awards recognizing outstanding work in communications from the National School Public Relations Association.
- Minnetonka staff raised \$83,000 through the annual employee Charitable Giving Campaign. In the 20+ year history of the project, staff have raised more than \$1 million to support organizations serving those in need.

Minnetonka Community Education

Minnetonka Community Education (MCE) provides national-caliber programming in areas supporting Skippers of all ages. During the 2022-23 school year, MCE was recognized as a 2023 Learning Resources Network Top 10 Community Education Program in America. Overall participation for all Minnetonka Community Education classes, events and programs totaled 34,369, a 13% increase over last year.

"Minnetonka Community Education is such a valuable resource and connection point for our families—and for residents of this school district overall," said Katie Becker, Minnetonka School Board Clerk and Board liaison to the Community Education Advisory Committee. "For many, it's the first place where they start to build connections with Minnetonka Schools. It was a space where I first met other District parents and found ways to give back to the community, too." Becker served as a leader within the Minnetonka Preschool & ECFE PTO and was a founding member of the Parenting with Purpose Speaker Series, which is now evolving to a podcast to provide additional resources for families.

MCE serves community members starting at birth all the way through adulthood, before school, after school, in the evening, on weekends and on non-school days. It provides opportunities for all learners to pursue their passions, develop their talents and build relationships in a safe, nurturing environment. MCE provides enrichment and recreation

programs, music lessons, Adult Basic Education and programming for adults with disabilities in its Project SOAR program. In 2022-23, Project SOAR enrollments grew by 112%.

Explorers childcare is also offered through MCE. The program provides a positive environment where children are encouraged to pursue their own interests, develop friendships and grow in confidence and independence. Explorers provided before and afterschool childcare programming for 1,373 students this past year, from Junior Explorers (ages 4-5) through fifth graders. Nearly 1,000 students were served in Explorers childcare over the summer.

Minnetonka Preschool and ECFE provides a place for the youngest learners to dream, create, wonder and discover. Minnetonka Preschool is rated at the highest level (Four-Star Rating) by Parent Aware and follows

the Pyramid Model framework to promote children's healthy social and emotional development. New additions to the 2022-23 Minnetonka Preschool program included a new playground, Spanish Immersion Preschool and Nature Adventure Preschool.

MCE events such as Tour de Tonka, Minnewashta Mud Run, the Tonka Trail Trot, Fall de Tonka and the Youth Triathlon continue to be popular, family-friendly favorites. Tour de Tonka has hosted riders from 71 of the 87 counties in Minnesota and from 44 different states in its 18-year history. Other events including the Fifth Grade Finales, East Meets West and the Dodgeball Tournament remain popular, as well.

MCE is excited to add new events to the lineup in 2023-24, including a LEGO Masters competition, a Jigsaw Puzzle Competition and Pizza Party and a Family BINGO night.

Each year, MCE counts on more than 3,000 volunteers to help its programs and events run smoothly. Beyond major and recreational events, Project SOAR, Holiday Family Giving and the Rake-a-Thon, Rec Basketball, Ski & Snowboard Club and other youth recreation leagues are supported by our community's amazing network of volunteers, from service organizations, sports teams, businesses and families.

his World's Best Workforce (WBWF) report summary, in accordance with 2013 Minnesota Statutes, shares Minnetonka Public Schools' progress toward the state's goal of creating the world's best workforce. This includes student achievement goals, the strategies and initiatives that Minnetonka engaged in to meet those goals and the progress made by the end of the 2022-23 school year.

Minnetonka Public Schools continues to evaluate and refine its plan to address the following five, state-identified goals: 1. All children are ready for Kindergarten; 2. All third-graders can read at grade level; 3. All racial and economic achievement gaps between students are closed; 4. All

students graduate from high school; and 5. All students are ready for career and college.

Since these achievement goals were set in the 2013 Minnesota Statutes, Minnetonka Public Schools has made progress toward achieving each one, as measured by national, state and local assessments.

The full World's Best Workforce report, which includes student achievement goals and the strategies and initiatives that Minnetonka engaged in to meet those goals, will be available on the District website at www.minnetonkaschools.org/wbwf following the December 7, 2023 School Board meeting.

WBWF Goal: Children Are Ready for Kindergarten

The District measured this goal in a new way for 2022-23. It was measured by increasing the percentage of all incoming Kindergarten students in Minnetonka Public Schools who score at low risk on the Fastbridge Early Reading Screener. In 2022, 82.4% of Kindergarteners were at low risk according to the screener.

WBWF Goal: Third Graders Can Read at Grade Level

In 2022-23, Minnetonka third grade students surpassed the state average by 22.0%, with 69.1% meeting or exceeding proficiency on the MCA-III test, compared to 47.1% of third graders statewide.

WBWF Goal: Closing Achievement Gaps

The District remains committed to its work in closing achievement gaps in reading and math. As measured by the MCA-III (and detailed below), the gap between white and non-white students at Minnetonka is much smaller than the gap reported statewide.

READING

MINNETONKA: 75.6% of white students and 69.5% of non-white students met or exceeded proficiency on the MCA-III Reading test. The gap is 6.1%.

STATE AVERAGE: Of the state's white students who took the MCA-III in Reading, 58.3% were proficient. Of the non-white students, 35.2% were proficient. The gap is 23.1%.

MATH

MINNETONKA: 77.1% of white students and 70.8% of non-white students met or exceeded proficiency on the MCA-III Math test. The gap is 6.3%.

STATE AVERAGE: Of the state's white students who took the MCA-III in Math, 55.1% were proficient. Of the non-white students, 28.4% were proficient. The gap is 26.7%.

WBWF Goal: Students Graduate

The four-year graduation rate for Minnetonka High School students, as determined by the Minnesota Department of Education, is 96.6% for the Class of 2022.* Comparably, statewide, 83.6% of students in the Class of 2022 graduated in 2022.*

WBWF Goal: Students are Ready for College and Careers

The District measured this goal differently than it has in the past, with a focus on students achieving college readiness benchmarks in each individual subtest, rather than only the student's composite score. This goal is measured using ACT scores from the Class of 2023, a test that 637 students took (69.6% of the graduating class).

For the Class of 2023, 61.0% of Minnetonka High School seniors who took the ACT met or exceeded the readiness for college-level coursework in all four areas (English Composition, Algebra, Social Science and Biology) as measured on the ACT. Comparatively, 28.0% of graduates statewide in 2022* who took the ACT were considered college-ready in all four subject areas.



Prudent Financial Management



One of the Minnetonka School Board's critical roles is to be a conscientious steward of taxpayer funds. "All of us on the School Board take the Board's role as a responsible financial steward of District resources very seriously," said Patrick Lee-O'Halloran, current School Board Treasurer and Board representative on the Citizen Finance Advisory Committee. "For that reason, the Board only seeks additional support from taxpayers as a last option."

In Minnetonka, state funding makes up 70.7% of the annual operating budget, federal funds account for 1.9% and 27.4% is local funding. Of the 27.4%, approximately two-thirds of it is voter-approved referendum funding. The other local levies are based on formulas set in statute and approved by the School Board.

The Minnetonka School Board has worked diligently over the years to keep property tax levies as low as possible. The School Board has supported the District in pursuing the refinancing and restructuring of capital bonds to lower interest rates and in spreading the cost of capital over the life of the assets to the benefit of taxpayers. This has resulted in significantly lower annual bond payments, which, in turn, has translated into lower property tax levies than would have otherwise been possible.
