ENGAGEMENT

In science, kindergarten students are exploring living versus nonliving things. They went outside to explore and compare living and non living things such as ants, fallen leaves, grass, a ball, and even a toad!







This month, our library kicked off Hispanic Heritage Month which runs from September 15 through October 15th. Students read books written by Hispanic authors. Some books included *El Perro Con Sombrero, Gracias Thanks, Mango Abuela and Me, Alma and How She Got Her Name, and Funny Bones: Posada and His Day of the Dead Calvaleras.* Students also listened to biographies on Sonia Sotomayor, Ellen Ochoa, and Picasso and did an activity to go along with each biography. Kindergarten also listened to a story called *The Dot* and created their own Dot creations.







WELL-BEING

We launched the year in partnership with FES and ETJMS engaged with the Harlem Wizards. Our students are practicing basketball and fitness drills in the WizFit Challenge, where they have raised over \$8000. We set earning benchmarks that the students have met across the board: \$2000 for a Sports Day, \$4000 for a school-wide Go Noodle Dance Party in our gym, and we recently met the \$8000 threshold, where students will cheer on some of their beloved staff in a pie eating contest!
