District Five is making a positive difference for our students, our families and our community.

This year was filled with many successes for District Five schools, students and staff. Continuing our legacy of

excellence in academics is at the heart of all we do in District Five. All indicators confirm that our teachers are performing in outstanding fashion and our students are responding with superior academic performance. District Five is recognized nationally for our outstanding academic success. *Niche.com*, a national clearinghouse for evaluating public education, recognized District Five as the second highest ranked school district in South Carolina. *U.S. News & World Report* ranked District Five as best school district in South Carolina for preparing students for college. *The Washington Post* ranked two of District Five's highs schools as most challenging (rigorous) and our Technology Student Association (TSA) Chapter won the top national prize.

Our SAT and ACT scores beat the national average and were among the best in the state, while testing a higher percentage of our students than any other South Carolina district. We are proud of our efforts to keep students in school and boast one of the lowest dropout rates and highest graduation rates in the state. More than 180 students were honored as Junior Scholars, 14 schools were recognized as Palmetto Gold Schools, and our graduating seniors earned an unprecedented \$146 million in college scholarships.

District Five is also proud of the wide array of enrichment opportunities we provide for our students. Our athletics and arts programs continue to enhance the educational experience and give voice and an outlet for student talent and interest. We had many very successful athletic campaigns including state championships in boys and girls soccer, track and field, and cheerleading. Several teams were runners-up for state championships. The State newspaper named a District Five high school "Athletics Program of the Year" and Varsity Brands honored that school as the "National Most Outstanding Student Section." Our band programs continued to shine this year. All our bands had very successful seasons including a state championship at the 3A level. The District's choral programs received numerous accolades and our student artists were honored at the Congressional Art Competition and many state and local art contest. The District musical "Seussical" featured students from all of our high schools and was a fantastic production. The District's JROTC programs continue to be recognized as state and national leaders including a Silver Star

Commendation. Our FFA Chapter is the largest in the state and has earned many top awards as well. Our students are so talented!

We believe that all students can learn. but not every student learns in the same way. Diversity of talents, interests, learning styles and backgrounds is what makes us a great community of thinkers and problem solvers. That is why we focus on providing great school choices for our parents and students. This includes 10 possible choice programs across nine of our schools. Choices span a wide variety of interests at every grade level. We truly believe that in District Five, "Every Choice is a Great Choice." An important part of our choice options at the high school level is the Center for Advanced Technical Studies (The Center). It continues to be a national model for career-focused education. This year, more than 10,000 visitors came to The Center from across the country and there were even several visits from Chinese delegations. For its work in creating and supporting The Center, the District Five Board of Trustees was awarded the coveted Magna Award from the National School Board Association.

District Five also boasts some outstanding educators and staff; the District ranks 20th nationally for the number of National Board Certified teachers. At the state level, District Five educators received the South Carolina Association of School Administrators (SCASA) Lifetime Achievement Award, the SCASA Administrator of the Year Award, the Inez Tenenbaum Leadership Award, the Distinguished Teacher of Reading Award, the Digital Learning Innovator Award, the Financial Educator of the Year Award, and Teacher of the Year awards for Business Education at both the middle and secondary level.

Our students also give back to our community. District Five staff and students provided labor, care and comfort in the aftermath of the devastating floods in October. They truly lived up to the "D5 Strong" motto. A District middle school was a state leader in the "Hate Won't Win" campaign. Their efforts brought together people and organizations from across the state and nation. Students were honored for their work on the Prosthetic Hand Project and named as Gold Level Service Award winners by the Jefferson Awards Foundation. And, a student was selected as a Distinguished Finalist for the Prudential Spirit of the Community Award. Students and staff also had fun supporting the District Five Dance Marathon for Palmetto Health Children's Hospital, "Hoops for Hearts," "Pink Out," Special Olympics camps and many other charitable causes.

Other accomplishments this year include the Student Nutrition Best Practice Award from USDA for the very successful "Farm to Five" program, an equally successful launch of "Project Search" offering competitive internships and employment for students with disabilities, and a Live Life Blue Workplace Wellness Award from BlueCross BlueShield of South Carolina.

The District continued to make great strides improving our school facilities. The new Chapin Middle School opened its doors and received an award for excellence in school building and design. The new Health Science Center was opened at Dutch Fork High School and Chapin Intermediate School was rededicated. Renovations and maintenance projects were completed at several other school facilities. The new and renovated facilities provide our students a safe place to learn and grow and are a real source of pride for our community.

Thanks to our community, businesses, school leaders, teachers, parents and students who all came together for another outstanding year. As we look forward to the next school year, we will continue to pursue excellence in all we do so that our students are ready to conquer tomorrow's challenges.

Opportunities for Discovery

his school year, teachers and administrators committed their professional learning to implementing a workshop model in math. This model included guided math. District and school-level administrators provided professional development and support for teachers through classroom observations and opportunities for reflection. Teachers set individual goals for implementation and worked collaboratively to enhance instructional practices during Data Teams, professional development, and grade level planning.

The culture in classrooms was one of student responsibility and excitement. Teachers provided learning opportunities that were standards-based and studentfocused. Students engaged in creating, collaborating, and discovering. Teachers





incorporated math games, manipulatives, problem solving, communication, writing, and small group instruction for students to master grade-level standards and mathematical practices. By incorporating a workshop model into math instruction, students can identify practical applications to the work they do in class. One teacher said the workshop model provided an opportunity for students to discover, rather than just receive information.

helps teachers to integrate and apply the environmental sciences across the curriculum in reading, math, social studies, writing, and the arts. Community partnerships provide students with multiple opportunities each year to participate in field studies at parks and natural areas across South Carolina.

Raising the Bar in Academics

Results from the spring 2016 magnet survey for teachers indicated extremely high rates for students participating in tasks that require critical thinking skills, participation in tasks involving problemsolving skills, students using feedback to improve their work, and students reflecting on their learning.

Results from the spring 2016 magnet survey for students indicated that since becoming a part of the Academy of Environmental Sciences at Dutch Fork Elementary School students improved their reading, writing, mathematical, science, problem solving, and critical thinking skills by high margins.

All students learn about their impact on our environment, and how to affect positive change in their community.



Environmental projects include: Certified Schoolyard Habitat garden, greenhouse and raised bed gardens, nature trail with outdoor classroom deck, observation beehive in the media center, indoor vermicomposting, outdoor traditional composting, tagging of storm drains, live plants inside to increase air quality, car idling awareness campaign, school-wide recycling, replacing incandescent lights with CFLs, and florescent light disposal.

FOOD WASTE GRANT

A food waste grant was awarded that allows Dutch Fork Elementary to recycle all food and have that food processed and returned to us as compost material.

All grade levels engage in social action projects that include but are not limited to raising and releasing trout, monarch butterfly conservation, breathe better campaign, and storm drain and best management practice identification around our school.

With a focus on desired outcomes, we will continue our tradition of excellence at Irmo Middle School.



ur vibrant learning community is made up of individuals from all areas of Lexington-Richland School District Five coming to us with various backgrounds, interests, beliefs, and experiences. While challenging and motivating each other, students share knowledge, celebrate successes, and work together to achieve common goals. One such goal is academic excellence. Since opening in 2013, we have staked our place among high schools in establishing that excellence. For 2015-2016, we administered 746 Advanced Placement exams to a student body of 976 with an overall pass rate of 72%. Ninety-nine percent of our students passed the End of Course Algebra 1 exam, 96% passed Biology 1 and



English 1, and 91% passed the US History exam. ACT and SAT scores exceeded state and national averages. Our inaugural graduating class consisting of 156 students earned a total of \$32,944,749 in scholarships. We are planning to introduce scanning replication to enable students to actually develop patent worthy projects equal to the quality of real-world university incubators.





nstruction and assessments are aligned with the SC state standards. Our instructional team is one of the best in the state. Proof of this is our consistently high pass rates for all areas the hiah school equivalency of examination. We have maintained pass rates that exceed state and national averages. Many of our diploma and high school equivalency graduates continue their education and training within four vears at technical institutions across the nation and branches of selective service. Many others are rewarded through job promotions and new employment positions. Over the past four years, our program has awarded 125 diplomas, 177 high school equivalency diplomas, and 312 National Career Readiness credentials. Scholarships received by our students include Life, Hope, Project Hope, and Quickjobs. In addition to the gains and credentials attained by our



adult students, their families are empowered through academic gains due to timely identification and intervention with infant and pre-school children within these homes through our partnership with Parenting Services in providing family literacy services.

INSTRUCTIONAL EXCELLENCE

Mary Hugee, coordinator of our high school equivalency program and all transition and family literacy services, was selected as the Region IV Transition Specialist of the Year by the SC Association for Adult and Community Educators.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Our students were two of the first three individuals in the state to receive a high school credential by passing the newly adopted Test Assessing Secondary Completion.

SUCCESS STORIES

A woman from Turkey struggling to speak English attended classes day and evening. In four months she received her equivalency diploma and a job with Regions Bank.

PREPARED STUDENTS

From July to April, we had a 95.5% pass rate for students who took all four subjects of the GED exam. Data for the first two years of the 2014 exam version showed that nationwide college freshmen with GED credentials outperformed high school diploma graduates.

It provides academic assessment, instruction, parent education, referrals for appropriate community support college and career services. and skill development readiness and Children receive school services. readiness, developmental, and health screenings, referrals to appropriate community resources, and school

readiness instruction. Families participate in interactive child and parent education time during home visits, and monthly literacy nights. The aim of the initiative is to increase capacity for economic stability and break the cycle of poverty and underachievement. This fall, we will implement 360 Literacy, a program that will serve 100+ students targeted as at-risk of not graduating on time with their 4-year cohort. 360 Literacy integrates the principles of prediction, intervention, and prevention in a supportive, after school environment. We anticipate the launch of a CNA program, our first component of a healthcare career pathway, this spring. Students can work towards the entrance requirements for the CNA course while receiving their high school credential, employment skills training, and WorkKeys Certification at one convenient location.

DISTRICT FIVE PROGRAMS & SERVICES

Academics is the focus at Lexington-Richland School District Five, and it's the district's top programs and services that help keep a laser focus on instruction and make District Five a leading educational system in the state and nation.

From social workers who work one-on-one with students in need to School Resource Officers who help keep schools safe, District Five educators say they see the impact that strong programs and services have on schools.

"Under the leadership of our school board, District Five has very deliberately worked to bolster its programs and services as a part of creating a quality education for families," said District Superintendent Dr. Stephen Hefner. "This investment in our programs and services is what sets District Five apart. We continue to maximize our resources through collaborative partnerships with our community and our business and education partners."

* District Five serves more than 2,200 special needs students annually. The district held a Transition Fair in February 2016 to help special needs students "transition into careers and life after graduation."

* District Five provides safety training for its staff. SROs provide a law enforcement presence in all schools.

* The district's Snack Pack Food Program provides weekend food supplies to disadvantaged students. Currently, over 670 students receive assistance from the program.



At District Five, we believe that quality early education is critical to preparing our students to be successful. Amid renewed focus nationwide on the value of 4K, the Lexington-Richland School District Five Board of Trustees approved a plan in the summer of 2013 to provide seven additional needs-based 4-year-old-kindergarten programs to several schools in the district.

From tuition based 4K programs to programs for students in need, District Five is committed to the success of every students.



* District Five's Ready By Five program offers home visits, community activities, screenings and resource networks to ensure that students birth to 5 are ready for kindergarten.

* Social workers in District Five provide vital services to students and families in need including counseling, emergency food, and housing and referrals.

* Almost 30 percent of students in District Five are state identified as academically gifted. The district has one of the highest rates for serving its AGP students.
