IMPROVED FACILITIES

Growing to fit the unique needs of our community

exington-Richland School District Five reached several milestones during the 2014-15 school year with the completion of a number of construction projects, including a ground breaking on the final project of a bond referendum that voters passed in 2008.

The district's new middle school in Chapin took shape to prepare for opening in 2015, and well-attended ribbon-cutting ceremonies were held for both Chapin High School and Irmo High School during the 2014-15 year.

Among the top accolades, 12 of District Five's teachers received National Board Certifications, bringing the district's total to 352 NBCTs. Other honors for District Five included:

DISTRICT FIVE ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

Preparing young minds for a future of excellence

istrict Five of Lexington & Richland Counties has 12 award-winning elementary schools serving students in the Chapin, Dutch Fork and Irmo communities: Ballentine Elementary, Chapin Elementary, Dutch Fork Elementary, Harbison West Elementary, H. E. Corley Elementary, Irmo Elementary, Lake Murray Elementary, Leaphart Elementary, Nursery Road Elementary, Oak Pointe Elementary, River Springs Elementary and Seven Oaks Elementary.

District Five elementary schools were rated among the best in the state, with a combined rating of "A" (94.1) on the ESEA/Federal Accountability System. All 12 schools received either "Excellent" or "Good" ratings on the state report card, and several District Five elementary schools were rated among the top in South Carolina by national rating and reviews website Niche.com.

The district expanded its 4-year-old kindergarten offerings during the 2014-15 school year, announcing the expansion of its tuition-based EXCEL 4K program to a second school location. District Five also enhanced its choice offerings in several schools. In 2014-15, the district's five elementary school magnet offerings included: Dutch Fork Elementary School Academy of Environmental Sciences, Escolares Academy at Harbison West Elementary School, The Leader in Me program at H. E. Corley Elementary, (LEAP) Leaphart Engineering Arts Program at Leaphart Elementary, and Seven Oaks Elementary School MEDIA (Mass Communications, Engagement, Digital Media, Interactive Learning, Academics) Magnet program. Other elementary schools in District Five open to choice include: Irmo Elementary, Oak Pointe Elementary and Nursery Road Elementary.

Enriching programs for students are provided in all District Five elementary schools. In December 2014, the Carolina Panthers and the Southeast Dairy Association teamed up to host a Fuel Up to PLAY 60 pep rally for over 600 students as part of a grant awarded to District Five for health and wellness programs at Leaphart Elementary and Nursery Road Elementary. Grants and programs like Fuel up to Play 60 are part of the reason District Five elementary schools are preparing young minds for a future of excellence.

Data teaming steers RSES academic decision-making

River Spring Elementary School teachers made sound academic decisions for students using a process called Data Teaming. This five-step approach includes analyzing assessment results, prioritizing students' needs, creating a SMART goal, implementing instructional strategies and monitoring the results along the way. Teachers worked collaboratively within grade level data teams to help their students in writing and math.

ound data confirms the strength of the process, as does results on state assessments and classroom assessments. One example of this was seen in a writing unit. Only 18 percent of second grade students were proficient in writing an informational text at the beginning of the unit, while 87 percent became proficient by the end.

Through data teaming, teachers were able to find ways to dig deeper and challenge themselves and their students.









The 2014-15 school year for River Springs Elementary Navigators included a recycled oil awareness project by our fifth graders, a recycling project by our kindergarten students, our school's annual Pancakes with Parents Day celebration and our staff "willing to do anything" to motivate our students.

istrict Five of Lexington & Richland Counties has two intermediate schools and three middle schools to serve students in the Chapin, Dutch Fork and Irmo areas.

New to the district is Chapin Intermediate School. In December 2014, the School District Five Board of Trustees approved a name for the district's new middle school. The new school for seventh and eighth grade students was named Chapin Middle School, while the school at the former location was renamed Chapin Intermediate School. District officials say the new school was created to help maintain good class sizes, prepare for ongoing growth in enrollment and maintain existing academic excellence.

A plan to change CrossRoads Middle School to CrossRoads Intermediate School was also approved during the 2014-15 school year. The school will continue to serve sixth grade students from the Dutch Fork and Irmo areas.

State and national accolades for District Five middle schools continued in 2014-15, with all schools receiving "Excellent" absolute and growth ratings on the state report card.

At Chapin Middle, an eighth grade student was named one of the state's top youth volunteers in the Prudential Spirit of the Community Awards. Two Dutch Fork Middle students competed in the 2015 MATHCOUNTS National Competition in Boston after placing among the top in the state competition, and one of the school's robotics team competed in the 2015 VEX World Robotics Championship. An Irmo Middle School student's allowance app placed among the top locally, earning him a chance to vie for startup scholarships through Google, Coca-Cola, Amazon and other businesses. Cross-Roads Middle gained national attention as a teacher and three students were named winners of the prestigious 2015 Belk Service Learning Challenge.

District Five middle schools received top state and national honors in 2014-15. A 2015 Belk Service Learning Challenge Award was presented to students Corbyn Player, Carson Ellis and McKenzie Smith and CrossRoads teacher Dr. Christopher Craft for their project to provide 3-D printed prosthetic hands to children in need. National awards like the Belk Service Learning Challenge Award are a testament to District Five's success in providing top quality education for top quality students.





istrict Five of Lexington & Richland Counties is committed to providing all students with the tools to succeed in each stage of their education. During the 2014-15 school year, District Five graduates earned more than \$121 million in scholarships. The awards for students from Chapin High, Dutch Fork High and Irmo High schools included both academic and athletic scholarships from colleges and universities nationwide.

At Chapin High, the number of scholarships offered totaled more than \$30 million in awards for academics, athletics and community service. Each year, District Five celebrates the accomplishments and completion of grade school with graduation ceremonies for its high schools. More than 1,100 District Five students graduated during ceremonies on June 4, 2015. This prestigious award is an honor for both our school and community. I am very proud of the Eagle family and their efforts to maximize the potential of each student at Chapin High School.









meaning any student can apply to attend its all-school magnet program.



It was an extraordinary year of highlights at The Center, and we look forward to the year ahead.





STUDENT ACTIVITIES

he Center's students have competed in a number of state and national contests, making the most of activities and events during the 2014-15 school year.

Several of our students won top prizes in the 2015 SkillsUSA South Carolina championship, earning them a chance to compete in the national competition in Kentucky. Additionally, two automotive technology students placed third in the state at the 2015 Ford/AAA Auto Skills competition, earning \$16,000 in scholarships.

Our FFA chapter for the district won several statewide and local awards in 2014 -15, including: a first place prize in Agricultural Mechanics at the state competition, first place finishes at the regional competition and other prizes.

It was another great year, and we look forward to more success, accomplishment and achievement in District Five Adult Education.



The event is the highlight of the program for these students, with hundreds of family members, friends and community members attending.

Among the graduates this year, 10 students were inducted into the National Adult Education Honor Society, receiving pins and special recognition during the well -attended graduation ceremony.

This annual event serves as both celebration for the adults in our program that have worked hard to obtain their academic goals and inspiration for others who are contemplating the program.

As our motto states, we specialize in second chances. The annual graduation and other programs help celebrate all that can be accomplished through the program.

NUMBER ENROLLED

District Five's Adult Education Program served approximately 350 students at five sites during the 2014-15 school year.

PROGRAM OFFERINGS

District Five's Adult Education Program provides several services. including: literacy assistance, ESL (English as a Second Language) programs, school equivalency high diplomas. WorkKeys/Career Readiness Certification, state high school diplomas, college and military entrance exam prep and more.

EXPANDED SERVICES

District Five's Adult Education Program is an official test center for the high school equivalency, paraprofessional and technical college entrance exams. In 2015, the program was approved as a GI Bill educational service provider.

2014-15 GRADUATES

Forty-two students earned high school diplomas, 31 obtained GEDs, and three students earned paraprofessional certificates during the 2014-15 school year. Twenty-nine 2014-15 adult graduates earned new jobs since completing the program.

ACADEMIC HONORS

One hundred twenty-seven students earned recognition for significant academic gains as measured by the federal reporting service that evaluates adult education programs.

DISTRICT FIVE PROGRAMS & SERVICES

Academics is the focus at Lexington-Richland School District Five, and it's the district's top programs and services that help keep a laser focus on instruction and make District Five a leading educational system in the state and nation.

From social workers who work one-on-one with students in need to School Resource Officers who help keep schools safe, District Five educators say they see the impact that strong programs and services have on schools.

*District Five serves more than 1,200 special needs students annually. The district held a Transition Fair in February 2015 to help special needs students "transition into careers and life after graduation."

*District Five provides safety training for its staff. It also has expanded its number of SROs, providing a law enforcement presence in all its schools. *The district's Snack Pack Food Program provides weekend food supplies to disadvantaged students. Currently, over 600 students receive assistance from the program.

*District Five's Ready By Five program offers home visits, community activities, screenings and resource networks to ensure that students birth to 5 are ready for kindergarten.

*Social workers in District Five provide vital services to students and families in need including counseling, emergency food and housing and referrals.

*More than 30 percent of students in District Five are state identified as academically gifted. The district has one of the highest rates for serving its AGP students.

4K PROGRAMS

At District Five, we believe that quality early education is critical to preparing our students to be successful. Amid renewed focus nationwide on the value of 4K, the Lexington-Richland School District Five Board of Trustees approved a plan in the summer 2013 to provide seven additional needs-based 4year-old kindergarten programs to several schools in the district.
