

ACADEMIC SUCCESS CONTINUES TO BE OUR PRIMARY FOCUS

Last year, District Five received the top rating from the state accountability system. Eighteen of our nineteen eligible schools received either Palmetto Gold or Silver awards for school performance and closing the achievement gap. Two of the district high schools were ranked as top performers in the state and nation by *U.S. News & World Report*, the *Washington Post* and *Newsweek*. The district also earned the top

DISTRICT FIVE LEADS THE STATE IN THE PERCENTAGE OF SENIORS TAKING THE SAT EXAMINATION.

Our students placed in the top five among all districts in composite SAT scores exceeding the state and national averages. Average ACT scores were also above state and national averages. The district also had more Carolina Scholars than any other district and \$125 million in total scholarships for our 2013 graduates.

BALLENTINE ELEMENTARY APPLIES THE SCIENCE STANDARD

Students learn science skills through mock crime scene investigation

Ballentine Elementary School's inhouse CSI field trip is one of our students' favorite hands-on experiences in fourth grade.

The program, developed and led by a former elementary/ middle school teacher, creates an atmosphere of inquiry and questioning as she addresses all components of science.

The students demonstrate an understanding of scientific inquiry, including the processes, skills, and mathematical thinking necessary to conduct a simple scientific investigation. Students practice the skills of observation as they gather information during a mock crime scene. Listening skills also are honed and inference skills applied to testimonies of witnesses to the crime. While

experimenting with blood typing through the use of synthetic blood, students practice reading charts and diagrams.

Using scientific tools, students ex-

perience extracting DNA and fingerprinting while simultaneously learning how to use science equipment safely. Microscopes are used to differentiate between hair and fiber. Fourth grad-

ers use mathematical calculations to determine probability.

As a final activity, students use their newly acquired skills to solve a "whodunit" crime. Through this day of back-to-back active learning, students are exposed to concentrated science vocabulary and to possible future careers.

STUDENTS' LETTERS ENCOURAGE CANCER PATIENTS

Letters help patients cope with treatment. sharpen writing skills

Cancer patients at Lexington Medical Center have a new way to cope with treatment thanks to first graders in

Samantha Werts' class this past school year. The students were part of a project with Lexing-Medical Center called "Letters to Cancer Patients." Werts said the program was created as a real-world writing exercise and community outreach project for the students.

"I wanted it to be real to them," Werts said. "My husband works with cancer patients at the hospital, too. We talked one night and decided that this project was something that could help strengthen my students' writing skills and help cancer patients feel a little better at the same time."

Considered a novelty in the lives of today's tech-savvy students, hand

written letters help students just learning to read and write "sound out" the words and learn from their errors, educators say. The letters can be teaching tools for cancer patients as well as lessons on hope and positivity, says Lisa Phillips with Lexington

Oncology, a hospital physician practice.

"As a cancer survivor myself, I remember how special it made me feel when others extended acts of kindness towards me and my family," Phillips said. "Our patients feel the same way. The letters are a ray of sunshine ... received with

smiles and occasionally happy tears."

The letters were sent twice monthly. Chapin Elementary student Stanberry often wrote to his pen pal about baseball, opting to add illustrations. "I'm writing letters because I want my friend to feel better," said Ryan, who often used the salutation "Dear Friend," in his letters.

PLTW Certification Means Students May Receive College Credit for Biomedical Science Courses

The Center's Biomedical Science program received a national certifi-

cation usually reserved for longstanding programs.

The accreditation by Project Lead The Way (PLTW) was announced in May 2013. The school opened in August 2012, offering Biomedical Sciences and other programs with science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) focuses. "It's high-

ly unusual that a program would receive PLTW certification in its first year," Center Director Dr. James Couch said. "I think what the program has been able to accomplish here speaks to the quality of the curriculum, students and our staff."

The Center's Biomedical Science program is expected to grow in the 2013-2014 school year. The certification provides

students with an opportunity to receive college credit at PLTW affiliated colleges and universities, including the University of South Carolina.

As part of the rigorous certification process, a team of state, university and school officials visited The Center to review the program and facilities. Couch said the team noted the school's impressive equipment, teaching supplies, students, and staff as part of their evaluation.

Julie Krusen, a National Board Certified teacher with The Center's Biomedical Science program, said: "The PLTW certification gives us notoriety. We're following national guidelines, so we know we're preparing students for that next step."

The program includes a sequence of courses and hands-on, real-world problem-solving activities.



Students earned top prizes and awards at The Center for Advanced Technical Studies.

District Five students taking courses at The Center for Advanced Technical Studies (The Center) were recognized for their skills, projects and activities during the 2012-2013 school year. The Center opened in August 2012, offering Biomedical Sciences and other programs with science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) focuses.

Among the organizations gaining attention this year was the InvenTeam, which was recently named a recipient of the Lemelson-MIT Excite Award for its proposal to create a self-guided wheelchair. As an award recipient, they are finalists for a \$10,000 national grant. In June, the InvenTeam received a service learning award at the 2013 Education and Business Summit that included \$100 for future service learning projects. The District Five InvenTeam won first place in team competition in the Region II USC Science Fair with 1700 students from 70 different

countries. "So far, these kids have come up with many successful projects like the self-guided wheelchair, the bent arm trebuchet and a kitty litter fan that uses ultraviolet light to kill bacteria," said Dr. Martin Cwiakala, teacher at The Center and InvenTeam advisor. "I am not at all surprised with their success. All of these projects they designed with little guidance from me."

Housed at The Center for Advanced Technical Studies (The Center), District Five's FFA chapter signed its official charter in February 2012 with the National FFA Organization (formerly Future Farmers of America) and has already received high honors. Two students from The Center were among the 38 top students from around the state selected for this year's South Carolina Commissioner's School for Agriculture, an academic summer program coordinated by the state Department of Agriculture and Clemson University.

Several students from The Center won top prizes in a state-level trade, technical and professional skills competition for public high school students. Two teams from District Five won first place in the SkillsUSA South Carolina Championship held earlier this month. The team of Shelby Stroud, Jessie Bundrick, Ally DiFiore, Carson Ham, Nathan Oliver, Taylor Bonvillain and Chandler Turney earned the top prize for their knowledge of correct meeting procedures. The team of A.J. Geib, Taylor Bonvillain, and Chandler Turney placed first in the Chapter Display division. Ten students attended the national finals in Kansas City.



Spring Hill High School was awarded a Magnet Schools of America Grant.

SPRING HILL STAFF

Spring Hill High School has 47 certified staff members. Among the staff: 21 percent hold bachelor degrees, 66 percent hold masters degrees, 13 percent hold doctorate degrees and 32 percent are National Board Certified teachers.

SPRING HILL STUDENTS

Spring Hill High School had more than 560 students in its first year, including approximately 362 9th graders and 200 10th graders.

GRADE LEVELS

Spring Hill High School had only 9th and 10th graders for the 2013-2014 school year. It will have 9th, 10th and 11th graders only for the 2014-2015 school year.


