

# SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

## DID YOU KNOW:

- Students absent more often in 1st grade are those who eventually drop out
- Truancy is a gateway crime to more serious juvenile offenses
- Truancy is also a precursor to dropping out of school
- The current drop out rate drains the nation of over 200 billion dollars in lost earnings
- 82% of all prison inmates are dropouts



## WHAT CAN PARENTS DO?

- Understand the laws regarding truant behavior
- Check school attendance weekly on Parent Portal
- Allow children to be absent for only those reasons listed as lawful
- Send notes to the school Registrar within 3 days of the absence
- Get children to school on-time



# WHAT IF MY CHILD IS TRUANT?

- **Five** unlawful absences, three consecutive unlawful absences, and/or excessive tardies will result in a conference with a school administrator to develop an Attendance Intervention Plan.
- Refusal to participate in the Attendance Intervention conference and then accumulating additional absences or unexcused tardies may result in a referral to family court.
- Parents convicted for educational neglect may be placed under court order, fined up to \$50 a day, and/or imprisoned for up to thirty days in jail for each unexcused absence thereafter.

# ATTENDANCE POLICY & LAWS

Any student who accumulates more than ten absences faces the possibility of being retained.

When your child is absent you must turn in a medical note or parent note within three days of their return to school.

Parent notes will only be marked as excused if the reason for absence is considered to be lawful.

Absences must meet one of the following conditions:

- Absences that are excused by a doctor or other medical professional
- Death in the family
- Court appearance
- A recognized religious holiday
- Special circumstances approved in advance by the principal

**If notes are not handed in within the specified time frame, your child's absences are considered unlawful/unexcused.**

There are serious consequences for unlawful absences.



## LAWFUL ABSENCES

The district will consider students lawfully absent under the following circumstances:

- The student is ill and their attendance in school would endanger their health or the health of others.
- An immediate family member dies or has a serious illness.
- A recognized religious holiday of the student's faith.
- Prearranged absences for other reasons and/or extreme hardships at the discretion of the principal.
- The student is participating in school-related activities that have received prior approval by the principal or his/her designee.

## UNLAWFUL ABSENCES



The district will consider students unlawfully absent under the following circumstances:

- The student is willfully absent from school without the knowledge of their parent/legal guardian.
- The student is absent without acceptable cause with the knowledge of their parent/legal guardian.

## CONSEQUENCES

- Students are classified truant when they have accumulated a total of three consecutive unlawful absences, five total unlawful absences, and/or excessive unexcused tardies.
- Consequences for truancy may include detention, parent conference, or in-school suspension.
- A referral to a school administrator to create an Attendance Intervention Plan may be a consequence of truancy status.
- Refusal to participate in the attendance intervention conference and then accumulating additional absences or unexcused tardies may result in a referral to family court.
- Parents convicted for educational neglect may be placed under court order, fined up to \$50 a day, and/or imprisoned for up to thirty days in jail for each unexcused absence thereafter.
