

NAVIGATING ANOTHER PANDEMIC SCHOOL YEAR

I am pleased to share with you the 2020-2021 CCPS Annual Report which contains important financial information and describes significant accomplishments of Cecil County Public Schools' students and staff from the most recently completed school year of 2020-2021.


In September 2020, we opened our doors to welcome back a small percentage of students for face-to-face instruction while the majority of our students remained virtual. While we were able to gradually expand the number of face-to-face students, we were once again faced with another full system shutdown following a steady increase of COVID-19 positivity rates in November of 2020. We began the process again in January of 2021 and were able to slowly build back to students attending four full days of face-to-face instruction (with Wednesdays remaining virtual) while some of our students chose to stay virtual for the remainder of the school year. While these circumstances created unprecedented challenges, it did shed light on the fact that there were students who did better in a virtual format, which led us to create the Blended Virtual Program which launched at the beginning of the 21-22 school year.


While the 20-21 school year was still far from a normal year, there were still many accomplishments of both students and staff to be celebrated. Schools planned creatively to host traditional events in new ways to ensure safety, such as outdoor proms. We were thrilled to be able to hold more traditional graduations for the class of 2021 so that our seniors could have that milestone experience.

It continues to be my honor to lead this school system. On behalf of the Board of Education, I would like to thank you for your support for Cecil County Public Schools.

* Another Pandemic School Year

We are all in this together!

- CCPS was one of the very first school systems in Maryland to roll out a comprehensive offering of the COVID-19 vaccine to employees when the vaccine was first made available in January of 2021. This was covered by local media in addition to Channel 11 WBAL.
- Feed the Kids 2020, a group of volunteers from around the county dedicated to delivering meals to children around the county during the shutdown, was included on the George H.W. Bush Point of Light Award Honor Roll and also recognized as a Governor's Service Awards Pandemic Response Champion.
- CCPS school nurses worked with Cecil County Health Department and Christiana Care Union Hospital to administer doses of the vaccine to employees, students, and community members.
- Without an official sports season, intramural sports were offered in partnership with Cecil County Parks & Recreation during the fall of 2020 for high school students including flag football, soccer, field hockey, volleyball, cross country, corollary tennis, and golf.
- CCPS offered a comprehensive summer school program at 8 school sites that had a daily attendance average of over 1,000 students.



The most exciting construction project that progressed over the course of the 20-21 school year was that of the new Chesapeake City Elementary School. The original school was built in 1938 and was celebrated at the end of the school year with members of the community invited to walk through the building and share memories. The new school, which is located on the campus of Bohemia Manor Middle and High Schools opened for students in September 2021. The total project cost was \$26,560,000.
