I would like to share with you the 2013-2014 Annual Report which contains important financial information and significant accomplishments of Cecil County Public Schools students and staff from the previous school year. As you will see throughout this publication CCPS continues to excel.

This year's Cecil County Teacher of the Year, Kelly O'Hara of Elkton High School, was named one of seven finalists for the Maryland Teacher of the Year title. Kelly is Cecil County's fourth consecutive finalist for this title. It was very exciting to once again receive the phone call from State Superintendent Dr. Lowery informing me that we had another state finalist. We are exceptionally proud of the fact that we have we had four straight years of finalists, and especially that three of those four are Cecil County graduates, including Kelly. This is yet another indicator of the dedicated and talented employees that work in our schools and offices each and every day. We are also proud of the continued progress made in both graduation and dropout rates. Cecil County's graduation rate has improved 10% since 2009 and the dropout rate has decreased 4.5% since 2010. Kelly is an alumna of Elkton High School where she now teaches. She earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in History Secondary Education from Salisbury University in 2005 and a Master of Science degree in Curriculum and Instruction with an Administration I certification from McDaniel College in 2011.





CCPS Aquires Property for Future School of Technology

This photo was taken on October 25, 2013 when Cecil County Public Schools leadership and county officials gathered at the site of the future Cecil County School of Technology at 912 Appleton Road. The gathering marked the official changeover of the property as the Basell sign was replaced by a sign reading *Future Site: Cecil County School of Technology*. The new school will open for students in August 2015.

"This is a day of celebration for Cecil County Public Schools as we officially acquire the 912 Appleton Road site and begin its conversion into a school," stated Dr. D'Ette Devine, Superintendent of Schools. "The people of Cecil County have shown overwhelming support throughout this process and because of those efforts, we are going to be able to expand the opportunities available to our students. This new school and property will be an important asset to this county and we commend the wisdom of the elected officials and members of this community who had the foresight to recognize its potential."



In June, school officials announced that Charlestown Elementary School received a Superior ratings from the Maryland School Construction Program following their state inspection. CCPS has received thirty-one "Superior" ratings in the past seventeen years. This is Charlestown's second Superior rating. Dr. Devine joined Mayor Dean Geracimos and officials from Cecil County Government and the Town of Chesapeake City for a ribbon cutting ceremony for the completion of the Bohemia Manor Water & Sewer Extension Project.





The renovation of Perryville Elementary School has begun and will continue for the next two years. The extensive project began at the conclusion of the 2013-2014 school year. Students were temporarily reassigned to either Bainbridge Elementary School or Charlestown Elementary School according to their home address. The newly renovated school will open at the beginning of the 2016-2017 school year.



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
