Students of IWA, members of that "privileged minority," also took part in the search for a more promising future.



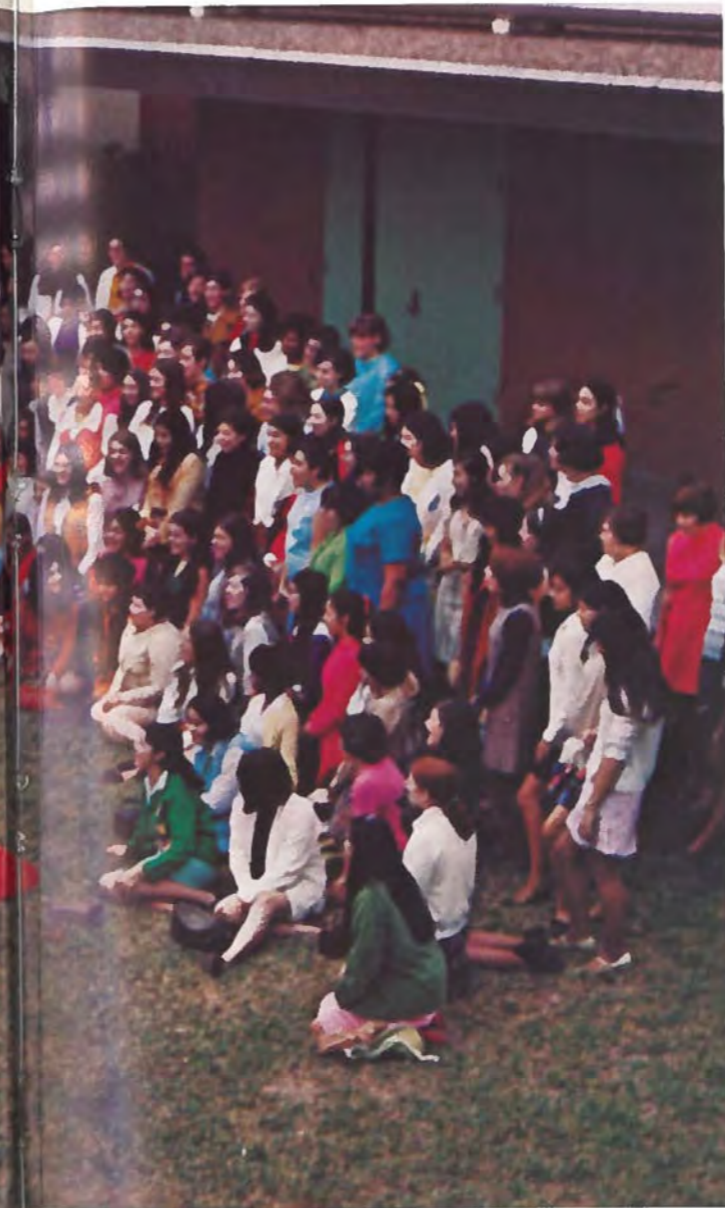

## Math Classes Include Algebra, Trig, Related Math



The Mathematics Department, headed by Sister Catherine Brehony, includes six courses taught by five teachers.

(a) Sister Anna Maria McDonagh, who had taught at Incarnate Word Academy since 1936, died after a short illness in December. She taught Algebra I and II, was a member of the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics and of the Coastal Bend Council of Teachers of Mathematics.

Many students and friends attended the funeral services held December 26, the day after her death, at Incarnate Word Convent Chapel. Sister Anna Maria made her first profession of vows on May 30, 1931 after coming from Sligo, Ireland to enter the Order of the Incarnate Word and Blessed Sacrament in 1929. She taught in parochial schools in South Texas before joining the high school faculty. Her work for the congregation included the office of treasurer general which she held since 1956.

Incarnate Word Academy owes much to the service and dedication shown by Sister Anna Maria.

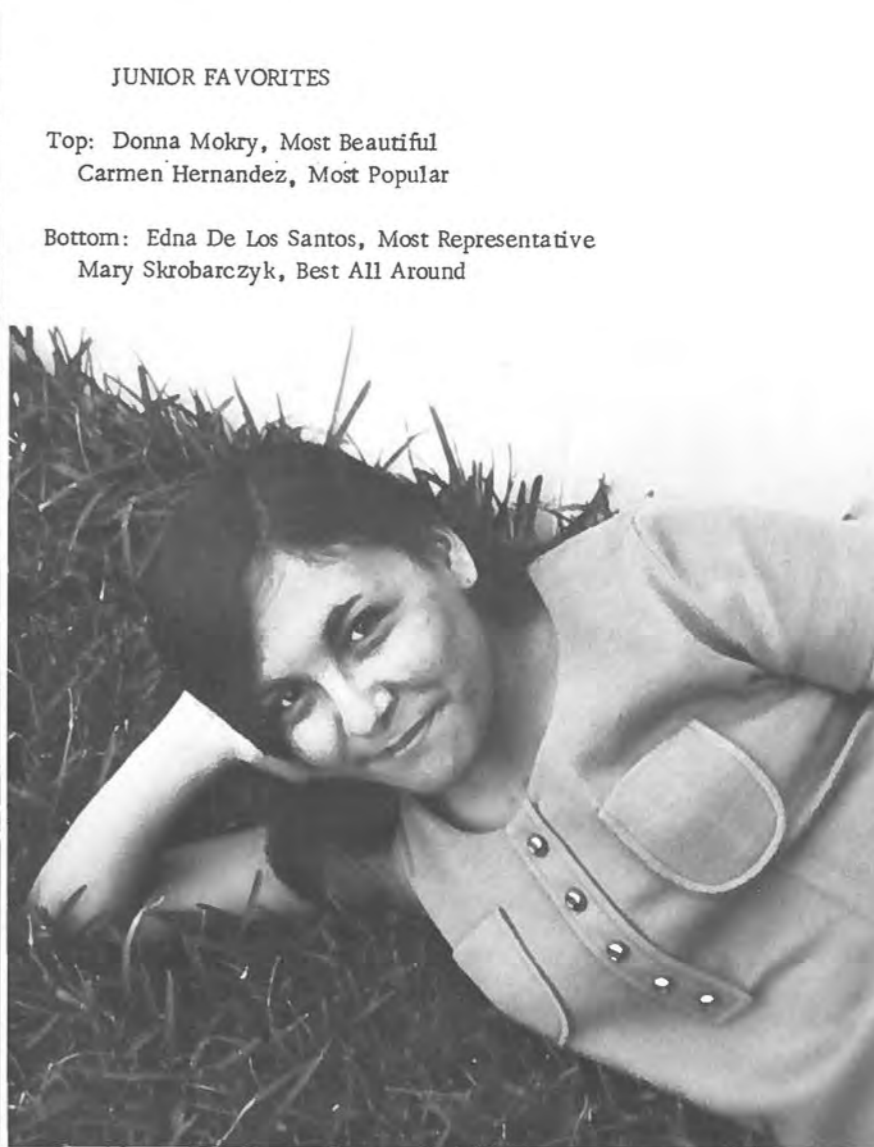
