To apply for HOBY, please submit

- 1) A copy of your resume including any previous leadership roles
- 2) Short answers to the following questions, using only 75-100 words for each response:
 1. How have you demonstrated leadership ability? (Leadership may be defined as the ability to motivate others into action. Examples include involvement in your organizations, student government, school and/or community groups, participating in athletics or the arts, or effective communications with others.)
 2. How have you expressed sensitivity and concern for others? How have you show others that you are interested in their well-being? (Examples include a willingness to help others with their studies, to work on school and/or community projects for others' benefit, to assist with charitable fund-raisers, or to take a first-aid course.)
 3. In your school and community, what do you think is the most rewarding and challenging aspect of being a leader?
