Book Buddies and The PHS Library!



The buzz of excitement in the School Library was palpable on September 7th as parents participated in PHS's first-ever **Book Buddies** event. This new program at Back to School Night significantly increased our Library's collection of

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- reading choices for our students, as parents purchased and donated the new volumes beautifully displayed on Library tables.
 - Adding to the ambiance of this event was a generously designed charcuterie board with beverages, selected by our Parent Association. Attendees enjoyed visiting with other parents and staff while also selecting books to first share with their families and then donate to the Library.
- "We are extremely grateful to our parents for these lovely new additions to our Library," relates PHS Librarian, Mrs. Kat Bañales, "as this allows more choices within the literary genres." During this past summer, she reorganized the Library so that books are now
- divided and shelved by genres.

"For example," continues Mrs. B, as she is called by students, "in this 'genrification' system, we've divided Fiction into the subcategories of Adventure, Fantasy, Historical Fiction, Mysteries, Realistic Fiction, Science Fiction, Spooky, and Sports." Mrs. B has seen a marked increase in actual reading in the Library, as students can easily search for an interesting book based on their own personal interests.

As School Librarian, Mrs. B. welcomes each PHS class once per week for its Library Time, which begins with a song or movement activity for the younger students, followed by Mrs. B's read-aloud, which is centered on the Character Quality or theme for the month. The children then proceed to a hands-on activity associated with that day's lesson in the read-aloud, with time set aside to select books for personal reading. Older students follow approximately the same format during their Library

books for personal reading. Older students follow approximately the same format during their Library Time, with a longer component of discussion after Mrs. B's read-aloud selection. This well-designed period in the Library is an additional aspect of the PHS curriculum that is designed to enhance each student's ability and appreciation for reading and for literature of all different genres.





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Mr. Jason Lechuga, (left) PHS Director of Technology and math/coding teacher, with the computer that he and last year's Middle School students constructed during "Genius Hour." Starting with a discussion of all parts of a computer and their uses, students worked within a budget to theoretically design their own computer.

Later, in conversation with Ms. Shirley Omori and her computer needs in the School Office, the class selected the actual parts, ordered the materials, and built the computer at left, complete with RGB lights to give a rainbow effect. It is now being happily utilized by Ms. Omori.

Taking this knowledge home, one of the class's students worked with his father last summer and built his own computer—another product of PHS's hands-on learning!
