River Valley Community,

As the leaves change and the harvest is in full swing, we see signs of the fall season all around us. Our students are enjoying many seasonal activities, including fall-themed classroom activities, the Homecoming Game and Dance, and the remaining weeks of our Fall Sports and Marching Band season. As we move through October toward November, we wanted to highlight the two issues River Valley Local will have on the ballot on November 7, 2023:

Issue 1: Bond & Permanent Improvement (PI) levy.

Issue 2: Renewal of the 1% earned income tax initially passed by voters in May 2019.

Property owners will see three items expiring and falling off at the end of the year (see graphic below). The proposed Bond and PI levy will be a tax rate decrease compared to what voters are paying this year on the three voted levies currently in place.

The combination of the Bond & PI Levy with the Income Tax Levy is part of the district's plan to address immediate, long-term, and educational programming needs, as well as have consistent funding for the district's daily operations.

I.) Issue 1: Bond and Permanent Improvement (PI) Levy - Combined (Effective January 1, 2024) See the chart below showing the levy items that are expiring (left) with the proposed Bond and PI (right). The new Bond & PI is a tax rate decrease in millage compared to what voters are paying now.

II.) Issue 2: Income Tax - Renewal (five year term) - Effective January 1, 2025 (after current 5-year term ends December 31, 2024). This is a renewal of the 1% Earned Income Tax Levy Renewal passed in 2019. The following are NOT subject to an earned income tax: Social Security income, retirement pensions, disability benefits, and other qualifying income.





Kindergarten Boot Camp

The HES kindergarten classes worked for a week and a half on appropriately using supplies. At the end of the week, we had a challenge/celebration day. The teachers decorated the rooms and gave each child a helmet to wear during their supply challenges. At the end of the day, we made a crown to show all of the supply challenges that had been mastered, as well as receiving a boot camp certificate of completion.



Communication Tools Help Our Students

Heritage Elementary houses the Specialized Skills Unit for our elementary students. In our classroom, we have six preverbal/non-verbal students. These students have friends throughout the school and teachers with whom they struggle to communicate. Our classroom was awarded a TEACH Grant through the Marion Community Foundation to purchase six communication apps and four Playground Communication Boards. With the new communication tools available to our students, we have already seen them being able to express themselves, make requests, and show their friends how they communicate. We are using them daily in the classroom and throughout the school environment. We hope these new tools will allow all students at Heritage to be heard because EVERYONE DESERVES A VOICE!



Innovation Lab News

This September, the math and science Innovation Lab Classes focused on improving their creativity, collaboration, and problem-solving. In the upper grades, students were immersed in mazes, as many of the lessons and activities were centered on designing and solving a variety of mazes. Students engineered paper plate and box mazes using various craft and scrap materials and Lego marble mazes, too! They had as much fun trading and solving the mazes as they had creating them! In kindergarten, first, and second grade, the students practiced creativity. They worked to improve fine motor skills as they painted fall trees using objects like broccoli and Q-tips. The younger students did some problem-solving, too, by figuring out how to build bridges and save as many Teddy Bears as they could in "The Floor is Lava." They also manipulated pattern blocks and used their number sense to make some great fall designs. We've been busy in the Innovation Lab and look forward to much more fun this year!




Becoming Real World Problem Solvers

Students in Mrs. Estep's class have put on their hard hats and have gone to work on a real-world project. Students were tasked with solving the STEM Challenge: How can we stop the problem of erosion in our local farmers' fields? Students worked together in teams to design a prototype to solve this problem. They used knowledge from science lessons on weathering and erosion, math skills for measuring materials, and writing skills to accurately record instructions others could follow to construct their prototype. We are learning that true solutions need to be able to be repeated. Team members built their prototypes. Each prototype was tested under the same controlled conditions to ensure an accurate test result. Students discovered firsthand what strategies worked and what ideas were unsuccessful. This excellent lesson in preservation is essential for scientists, inventors, and problem solvers. While the students' designs might not yet be ready to be released for public use, students are learning the relevance of knowledge learned in class and how to be real-world problem solvers.



Reading Intervention at Heritage Elementary

Mrs. Laura Rengert has started small group phonics and reading instruction with the 2nd and 3rd graders at Heritage Elementary. Mrs. Rengert is currently teaching 50 students who are working on improving their phonics and reading skills. The intervention program offers students daily 30-minute explicit, systematic, evidence-based instruction. Each group's reading instruction is based on phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension. The small group is designed to meet the needs of the individual students.




Rock Your School



Viking P.R.I.D.E.

Liberty Elementary is using Viking PRIDE and a rubric to support our Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) system. Students who are showing appropriate behaviors from the rubric may earn coins. These coins can later be exchanged for coupons for class rewards or, if students earn enough coins, the end-of-quarter reward. PBIS is an evidence-based framework for supporting students' behavioral, academic, social, emotional, and mental health. Studies show that PBIS improves social-emotional competence, academic success, and school climate. It also helps us create positive, predictable, and safe learning environments where everyone has the opportunity to succeed.



The "Egg"cellent Earth

The 4th-grade students have delved into the fascinating realm of Earth's layers and tectonic plates. With newfound knowledge from their readings, these young learners embarked on an exciting exploration of Earth's crust using a tangible model—an ordinary boiled egg! With this hands-on approach, students not only had the chance to visually dissect and examine the four distinct layers but also witnessed firsthand the dynamic impact of shifting tectonic plates on the Earth's crust.



Middle School News

We are off to a great start to the 2023-2024 school year! We have had a lot of neat things happening here at RVMS in our classrooms. Our students are learning a lot of academic information, but are also learning important life skills. Miss Klingel, the school counselor, has now made it to each Viking Period to discuss our services. We learned a couple of coping skills and talked about being a friend, being responsible for ourselves, and being grateful. Miss Klingel's office can be found in the main office, and she encourages students to come to her when they need to talk or have a problem.





Mr. Albert's Ag Science Students at the middle school have been very busy this semester. The Intro to Ag Science Students have been learning about the importance of agriculture. They learned that we need to be thankful for all the farmers who put our food on the table and the fiber we use for clothing. They are currently learning about the American food supply system. The students had to complete a "Farm to Fork" research project on their favorite food. They learned how it is produced, processed, manufactured, packaged, sold to retailers, and sold to consumers.

The Ag 1 students have been learning about important natural resources for agriculture. They just finished learning about how soil is formed, how soil can be eroded, and how important soil health is to agriculture. The students sampled soil from different gardens around the River Valley Farm Greenhouse during the soil health unit. They discovered the importance of pH and why nutrients like nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium are critical for plant growth. Each group of students had to write a fertilizer prescription for their garden. The Ag 1 students are now learning about water quality. They will be testing the creek that runs behind our baseball field for pH, nitrogen, phosphorus, dissolved oxygen, and turbidity.

Career Exploration 1 and 2 classes were visited by a guest speaker, Devin Durain, executive director of the Heart of Ohio Homeless Shelter. He talked to the students about running a nonprofit organization, as well as budgeting and managing employees. Students had many questions for Mr. Durian about his chosen work and how he came to his current position. It was a good conversation for all.

Mrs. Songer's 6th grade Social Studies classes started the year with a fun "get to know you" activity and showed how important it is to be kind and encouraging to others. This week we are working on the 5 Themes of Geography. We are learning how people, goods, and ideas move around the world, how we affect our environment, what types of physical features, landforms, and climate make up a place, etc. The students and I are having some great discussions.


Miss McGuirk's math classes started the year reviewing multiplication facts by playing Multiplication War. We have moved on and are working on the Statistics and Probability standard by finding the mean, median, and mode of data sets.





Mrs. Scheff's 7th grade English Language Arts classes have been learning about figurative language this week. On Tuesday, students analyzed figurative language in songs from their favorite artists, including Cardi B, Marshmallo, and Imagine Dragons. On Wednesday, Students went on a scavenger hunt to find figurative language within various poems. It's been a fun week of creating figurative language masters!

Mrs. Widrig's 7th-grade science class has been learning about matter. We have been exploring the difference between elements, compounds, and mixtures. Our first lab of the year was over the Law of Conservation of Mass. Students were able to model the Law of Conservation of Mass using yeast, sugar, a balloon, and LEGOs! Our next unit will be The Periodic Table of Elements.



RV High School News

This has been a great start to the year, and it is difficult to believe we are approaching the end of the first nine weeks. I would like to highlight some of the activities that have already taken place and share a few events that will be occurring in the near future.

On September 21st, approximately one hundred students attended the annual Farm Science Review, held outside of London, Ohio. The Farm Science Review is presented by The Ohio State University's College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences. The students who attended this trip got the opportunity to see presentations, new programs, and equipment that help with the advancement in the agricultural-related fields.

On September 28th, we had several students involved in Teen Institute attend the Drug-Free Rally that was held at Dayspring Church. At this rally, student speakers and guest speakers addressed the students about the importance of staying drug-free.

The Music Department, consisting of the Band, Choir, and Orchestra, has been actively preparing for the upcoming concert season.

The FFA National Convention will be held November 1st through 3rd in Indianapolis, Indiana. Each year we have members of the Vocational Agriculture program attend this event, which brings together members of the FFA from across the country.

The 2023 Marion County Junior Fair was held from July 3rd through July 8th. Fair is a time that our chapter and community members look forward to each year to show off their hard work and dedication. The River Valley FFA Chapter members had exhibits in all the barns and are proud to represent the chapter during shows and in public. The fair reentered a regular cycle of shows and events this year. All the livestock shows were moved back to Evers Arena while the livestock auction took place in the Coliseum. Two of our chapter members, Abby Isler and Grant Ferguson, were named the Fair King and Fair Queen this year. Tarynn Weir was named the Equine Queen, and Kayleigh Aiken was named the Pork Queen. Chapter member Jackson Kloha swept the poultry department this year, winning OME, Grand Champion Market Ducks, Poultry Showman of Showmen, and Intermediate Poultry Showmanship. Chapter President Abby Isler was Reserve Champion Heavyweight market hog, Outstanding Market Exhibitor for Hogs and Sheep, the winner of Sheep Skillathon, and Reserve Champion sheep showmen. Chapter Treasure, Makenzae Eager had the best single fryer. Delaney Meyers placed second in the poultry showmanship. Delaney Meyers offers this advice to young exhibitors at the fair, "Work as much as you can with your animal and have fun. Don't be too serious, but still work hard."

The FFA building at the fairgrounds helps to show the projects members worked on throughout the school year. The RV FFA represented well, with a large number of projects receiving a first-place sticker. It is always a fun



time to see what many of the other chapters across Marion County have worked on during the year. The FFA building allows community members to learn more about the FFA and see each member's hard work and dedication. The RV FFA officer team could be found working shifts in the building several times during the fair, and they were always willing to answer questions and inform the public.

To end a successful week, the Junior Fair Dance was held on Saturday after all the festivities had ended. Exhibitors and chapter members could be found dancing the night away and celebrating another successful Marion County Junior Fair.
