Attention parents! Please remember that on October 20th, the carryover for Free and Reduced Lunch status from the 2022-23 school year expired. Therefore, if you have not already completed and submitted your application for this year, please do so immediately by clicking <u>here</u> to complete the online application, or by requesting a paper application from the main office at your child(ren)'s school. If you are not sure whether you applied this year or to check on your child(ren)'s Free and Reduced Lunch status, log into Oncourse Connect and click on "Student Information." Both the status and any lunch debt balance will be populated in the column to the right.



If you did not have a chance to attend the Board of Education (BOE) Business Meeting held on Tuesday, September 27th, here is what you missed. Sean Burns from Sayreville War Memorial High School (SWMHS) and Ashten Poandl from the Sayreville Middle School (SMS) began the meeting by providing their respective Student Council Representative to the Board of Education Reports. Next, Mrs. Bloom expressed her opening

remarks, as did Mrs. Pieloch, who also shared a few district highlights. During the presentation portion of the meeting, the district presented the annual State of the Schools Address, which featured a presentation by Kean University on the district's new 2023-27 Vision 2030 Strategic Action Plan, which they facilitated the collaborative development of. After that, as part of the State of the Schools Address, the district reviewed the 2022-23 District Goals, as well as an introduction of the 2023-24 District Goals and the 2023-24 Budget Development Calendar. The Board then moved the action items from the Superintendent's Report onto the Board Agenda and approved them all. To see the Agenda, click <u>here</u>. Among other motions, on the Vision 2030 Finance and Infrastructure portion of the agenda, the Board of Education accepted a generous donation from Deborah Stolte for Bombers Beyond, in the amount of \$100; and a G. Vallette Clarinet, valued at \$1,500, to be used in the Sayreville War Memorial High School Music Department, by Ed Szeliga, in honor of his father, Joseph T. Szeliga. It also accepted an award from GrowNJKids valued at \$136,950 for professional development services, coaching, and classroom essential subscriptions for 49 preschool classrooms and teachers from Tools of the Mind. In addition, the BOE approved a professional services agreement with Teaching Strategies Gold for Early Childhood Teachers, which included

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instructional coaching, online assessment portfolios, and other forms of professional development in the amount of \$22,188.35 to be paid using funds from the ARP-ESSER-Accelerated Learning Coach and Educator Support Grant. Furthermore, the Board approved the submission of the Division of Early Childhood Services, Annual Preschool Operational Plan Update and Projected School Enrollment for the 2024-2025 school year. Lastly, it approved the purchase of the technology items, particularly staff laptops and student Chromebooks, from CDW Government in the amount of \$423,475.

On the Governance portion of the agenda, the Board of Education approved the <u>2023-24 School District</u> <u>Goals</u> and the <u>2024-25 Budget Development Calendar</u>. It also approved the <u>2023-27 Vision 2030 Strategic Action Plan</u> for a first reading, and a resolution thanking all the school district community members for their outstanding service in collaboratively developing it. On the Personnel portion of the agenda, as well as other motions, the Board of Education appointed new certificated and non-certificated staff for the 2023-24 school year. Likewise, the Board approved the transfer of non-certificated staff for the 2023-24 school year. In addition, the BOE appointed high school coaches for the winter and spring seasons, as well as an advisor for the fall drama and spring musical at the high school. It also appointed teachers for the general education and special education Literacy and Math Academies, Tier 3 Intervention Services, and English as a Second Language Tutorial Services for 2023-2024 school year. Finally, the Board appointed high school College and Career Group Facilitators for 2023-24 school year.

During the Board Discussion portion of the meeting, Mrs. Pabon reviewed what was discussed during the last Finance and Infrastructure Committee Meeting, as did Ms. Pieloch for the last Personnel Committee Meeting. Mrs. Bloom also shared news from the Middlesex County School Boards Association and Mr. Fernandez did the same regarding the Sayreville/South Amboy Rotary Club.

The next meeting will take place on **November 21, 2023**. The agenda for this meeting will be posted on the district website on **Friday, November 17th**. Thanks to our magnificent instructional staff, our students had a very productive and fun week of learning last week. Last Wednesday, the high school counseling office took almost forty students to the Career Council National Hispanic College Fair at Woodbridge High School. The fair included sixty representatives from colleges, universities, and technical and trade schools. The students were able to meet with admissions officers and financial aid advisors. They were provided with information about the schools, the financial aid process, and college life.

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Last Thursday, students in the Humanities/Social Studies classes were visited by state and local legislators


