Dear Members of the Lyme-Old Lyme Communities,



Mile Creek School Teacher Awarded Fellowship Grant

Ms. Pinney, kindergarten teacher at Mile Creek School, was named a 2023 Fund for Teachers Fellow and the recipient of an accompanying grant. Fund for Teachers is a US-based organization that invests in and funds unique professional development opportunities for educators. Since its origin, they have funded \$35 million in grants to over 9,200 educators to encourage summer experiential learning. Ms. Pinney was one of 396 teachers given a grant this year.

In her application Ms. Pinney described how she wanted to "absorb the siren songs, rich history, folklore and tradition residing in Scotland and Ireland." She explained she would accomplish this by attending festivals, exploring traditional music, and "rubbing knees with the greats" in order to expose and encourage students to share their own stories, increase engagement and ownership in their learning and help them create magic using their own voices.

"Working in elementary education, I knew that my kindergarten students would benefit from my experience in different methods of storytelling," explains Ms. Pinney.

For 22 days, Ms. Pinney traveled to several areas in Ireland, Northern Ireland and Scotland. Her jam-packed itinerary was filled with diverse and unique learning opportunities. She watched live music. learned to dance along with traditional tunes, played with puppets, took many tours, asked endless questions and was able to see storytelling through a variety of different lenses.

Ms. Pinney was delighted and surprised at how much impromptu, organic conversations with anyone and everyone during her travels informed her understanding of storytelling. Be it talking in the midst of a royal castle, on a train or bus or over curry fries as the sun set, "I truly loved talking with all of the people I met from different countries, backgrounds, places of travel and life experiences. I had some of the best story-forward conversations during these moments."



Another surprise was a planned trip to the Scottish Mask and Puppet Center in Glasgow. Ms. Pinney's expectations of the visit were low as the center is closed during the summer. She was pleasantly surprised by a magical day including an exhaustive behind the scenes tour of the facility which included masks, puppets, musical instruments and insight into how they put together productions. She left with two new friends as well as a tutorial on how to create stick and rod puppets which she plans to implement in her classroom and also in the community at large.

"Your perspective of a moment in time can be altered and shifted based on where you are within that experience," explains Ms. Pinney. "Are you the marionette wielding puppeteer or the delighted audience watching the show with big eyes? Are you eyeing the majestic slopes of a mountainside from afar or in the midst of breathlessly clamoring up the side of it? This learning journey has helped solidify that we should all strive to think about our situations through as many lenses as possible, as many perspectives as possible, in the hope that one will match with another's experience and create connection ... that is invaluable."

Lyme-Old Lyme Schools Rank in Top 10 for Connecticut SAT Testing Scores

Lyme-Old Lyme High School students ranked high in SAT testing scores. Results shared by the state show that Lyme-Old Lyme High School's average test scores for the 2022-23 school year ranked in the top ten for both math and English language arts tests, the second year in a row we have achieved this ranking.

Mrs. Vigen, instructional assistant at Lyme School, is Lyme-Old Lyme Schools Employee of the Year. Mrs. Vigen began her job in the fall of 2020 helping to welcome students back to school amidst numerous Covid restrictions. Her quick smile and ability to comfort both students and parents alike were quickly noticed. These same skills shone through as she was a constant in a kindergarten class that had some unavoidable teacher changes. Mrs. Vigen listened to her students' thoughts and concerns, reassuring them that they have many trusted adults at school to support them.

Mrs. Vigen does anything she can to help her students learn. Kindergarteners study the life cycle of frogs, and Mrs. Vigen has scooped frog eggs out of her pond, bringing in fresh pond water and boiled lettuce each day as a way to bring this lesson to life for her students. When she mistakenly brought in salamander eggs, she noticed it before her students and quietly corrected the situation before anyone noticed!
