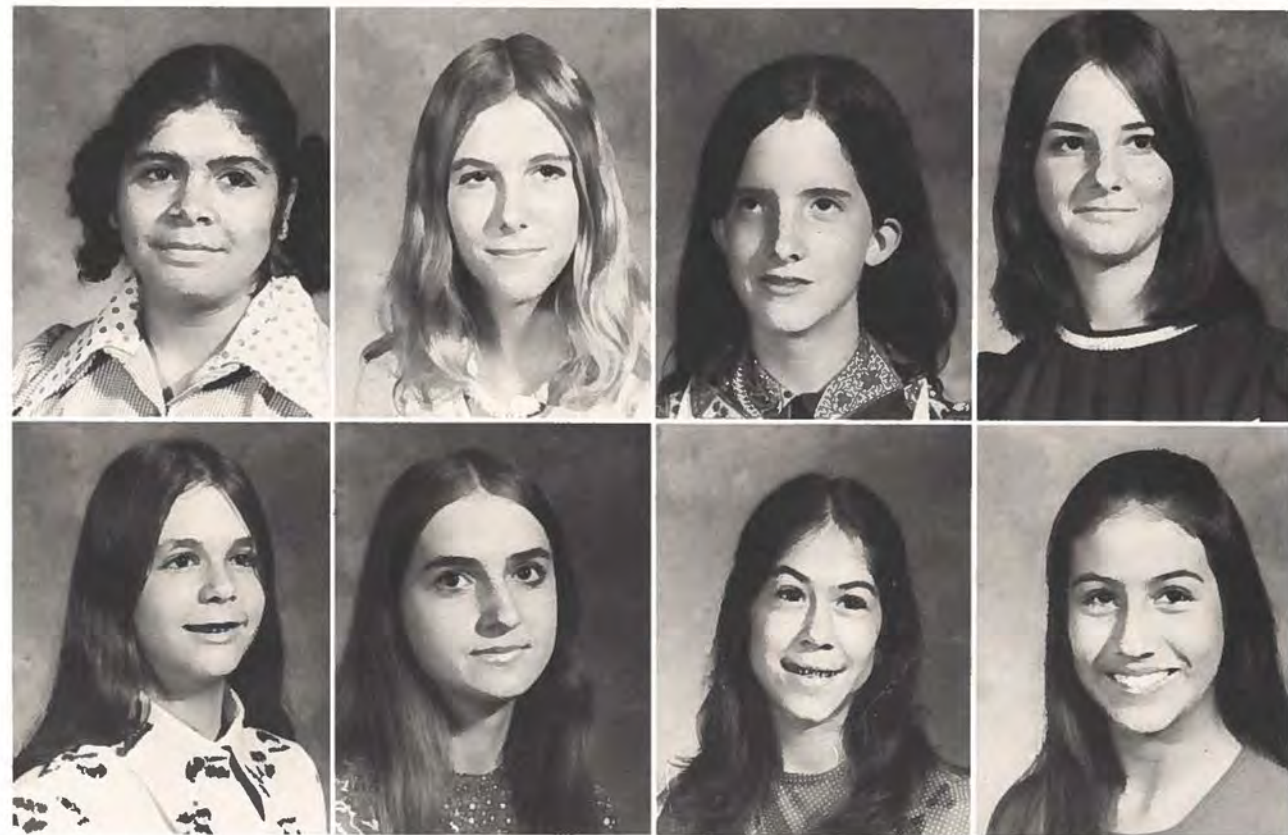

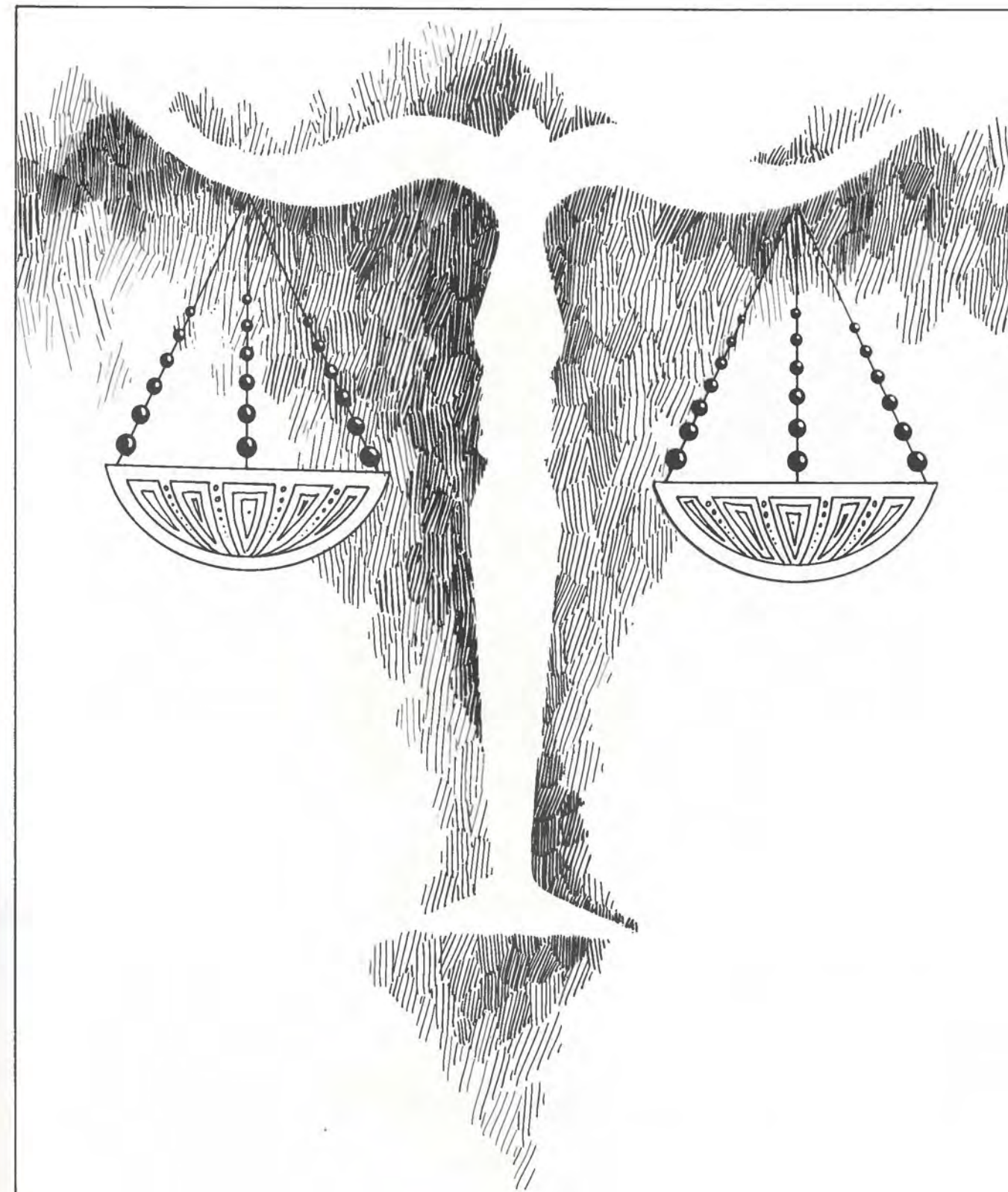

Religion Classes Learn Dogma, Liturgy, Prayer

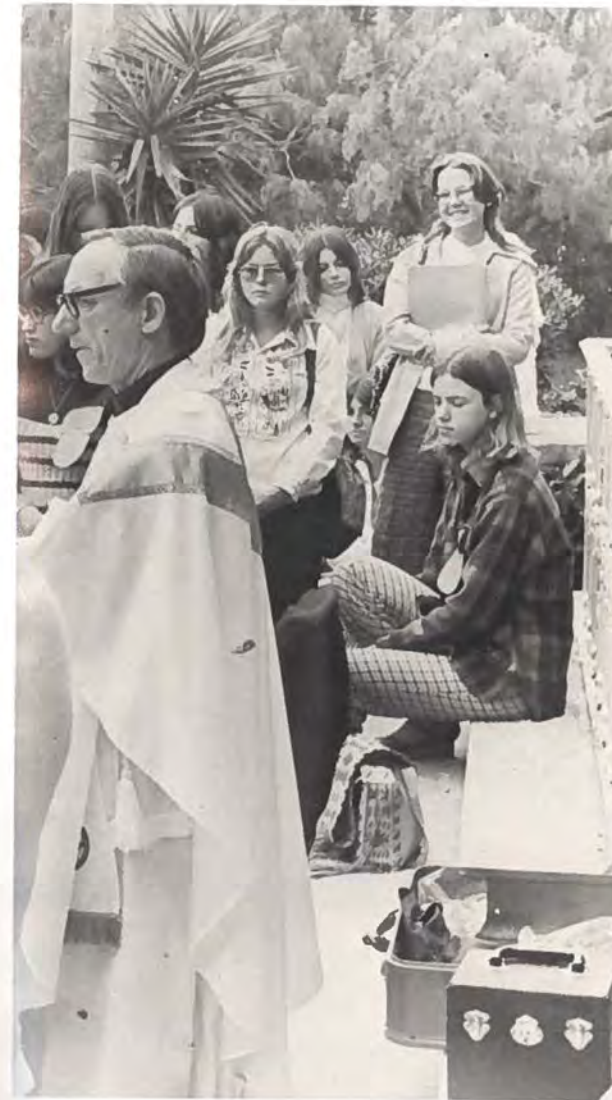

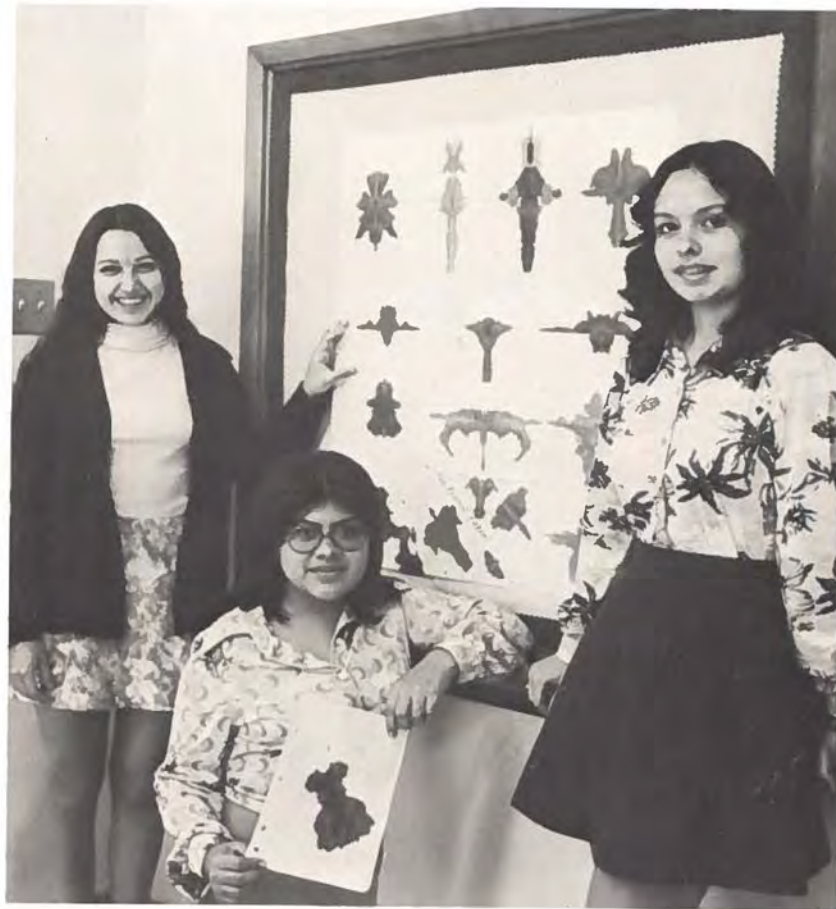

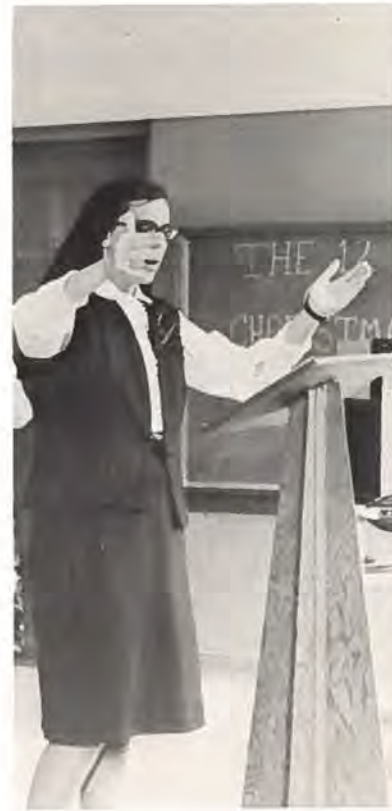

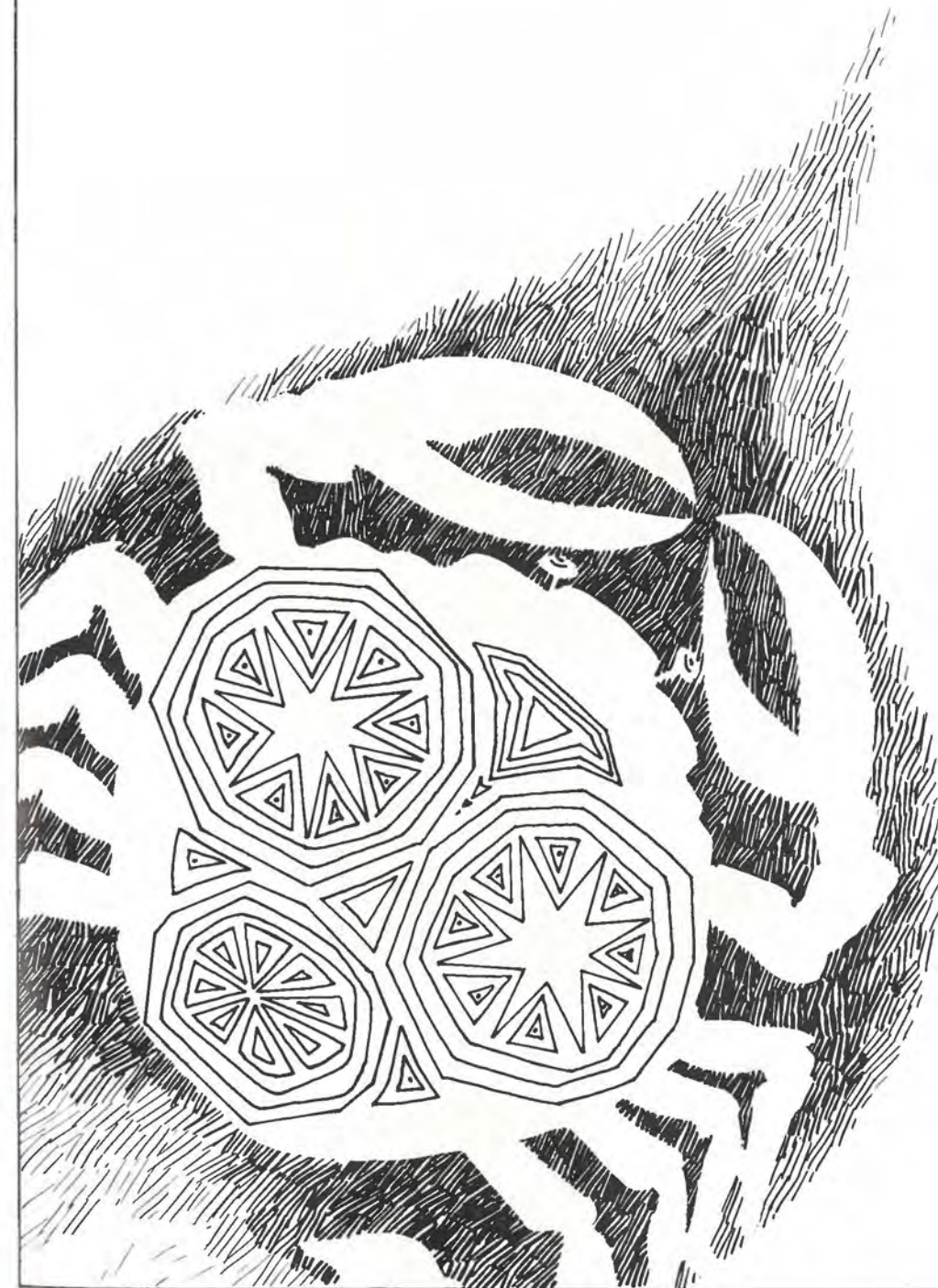

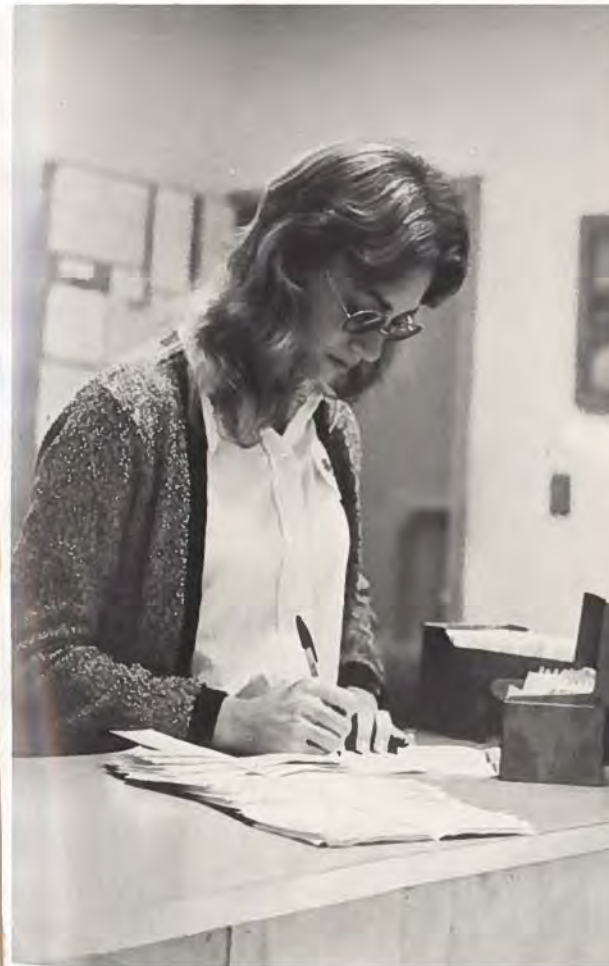

Track Team Enters Local, State Meets

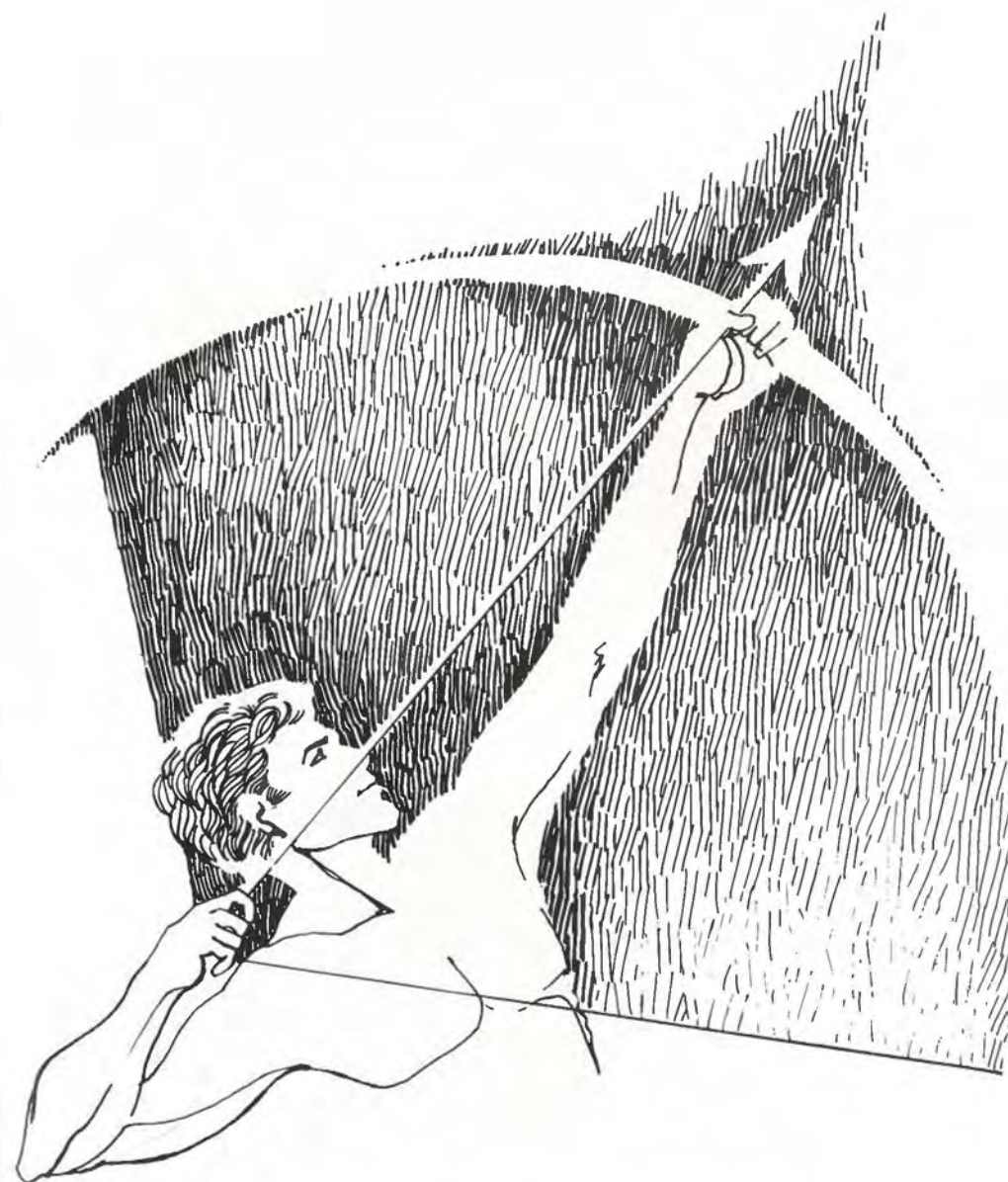
