LCS English Department Presentation to the BOD

• We believe a beautiful, artistic paragraph or poem about something or someone can be more true than a mere newspaper account giving the bare facts about that thing or person. We thus believe great literature helps us see more fully and accurately what is already there. And, oh how we need this...



 In seventh grade we need to feel tortured with Dr. Jekyll as he thinks about his horrific exploits the previous night as Hyde before we can more soberly accept that if we give evil an inch, it will take a mile. In eighth grade we need to sing sadly "For Auld Lang Syne" with old Eben Flood before we can more empathetically realize what it feels like for people to outlive their lives. In ninth grade we need to be on Calypso's island with Odysseus and shed tears with him as he looks in the direction of Ithaca before we can more fully appreciate the word "home." In tenth grade we need to scheme with Sydney Carton as he takes Charles Darnay's doomed place in the cell before we can more fully believe in the redemptive power of loving sacrifice. In eleventh grade we need to stand alone with Gatsby as his dream is shattered and he keeps vigil over nothing before we can more fully feel the emptiness of selling out for a self-determined (and thus vulgar) purpose and hope and beauty.

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 So, we believe infinitely more is at stake in our department than continued impressive test scores. We know each day in our classes each day in our texts—can be a confrontation with truth, beauty, goodness, and perfection. The skills of composition and literacy are a means to this end—a means to this confrontation. We will continue to teach those skills, but we will teach them with the end in mind. With so much riding on such confrontations, it is vital the text confronting the student is worth it, able to stand up to the desires and purpose of the precious life waiting to be moved. We are committed to the great works—the works reminding us what drives tragedies and comedies and consequently reminding us our own lives can end up tragically consumed by the conflict in our hearts or comically triumphant through the healing of our hearts.

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 We are committed to the great works which show life is more than survival and gland responses, that the truth and beauty and goodness in our school's definition of wisdom (posted in every classroom) are not utopian dream words. They are real and fiery given shape by the great works' full and empty characters and plots, and given vibrancy through precise and fertile language. We know reading the great works does not automatically produce an inclination towards the Good, but we have experienced the part they can play in that journey, and so have our students.



Describe Program Continuity K-12

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 One thing the K-2 team has been working on this fall in literacy is putting together a document for each grade level that shows the details of every single literacy program we use, and which parts we use of each. Since the perfect language arts program does not seem to exist, we have picked the best pieces of many different programs over the years. This has proven to be a challenge to pass along clearly to other schools when we are asked about our literacy program. We also want to have something documented for ease of use for new teachers and across campuses. There is a reason that we don't use all of Open Court, only Riggs and nothing else, etc. We don't want to lose that information as teachers retire. This is a work in progress and the end product might be something like a K-6 spreadsheet and/or grade-level literacy binder.

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Describe Program Continuity K-12 (continued)

- Cherie Pedersen mentions how hard teachers have been working to keep continuity between the two elementary campuses.
- Some grade level teams are meeting on Zoom to keep teams aligned. Other teams have a Cherie or a Steve Ronen who moved over, so they don't have to have the same level of intentional meetings/procedures to coordinate.
- Having an electronic gradebook helps with coordination.
- Fifth grade has set up a system of covering for each other so teachers can travel and observe class at the other campus.



Describe Program Continuity K-12 (continued)

- Mrs. Perschau (7th grade) says the elementary teachers continue to do a
 great job of building on the writing skills that set up our Liberty students for
 success in writing. She's already seen the students' interest in improving
 their writing through a thorough study of grammar and applying a teacher's
 writing feedback to their subsequent assignments. They are showing their
 aptitude for expressing their thoughts, opinions, and knowledge on topics she
 covers in class.
- In anticipation of expansion and the need for coordination and unity, Mrs. Perschau went ahead and updated the unit organizers for seventh grade core English class.

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Significant Trends in Test Results

Significant Trends in Test Results (NWEA)

- -Our NWEA scores across LCS and LCHS continue to be solid.
- -Please refer to the principals' schoolwide data report for information on our K-6 CMAS and NWEA scores.
- -Our 7th-11th grades' fall reading median percentiles range from 78 to 88, with an average class median percentile of 82.
- -Our 7th-11th grades' fall language usage median percentiles range from 87 to 95, with an average class median percentile of 90.



Significant Trends in Test Results (PSAT/SAT)

- Our SAT score from the spring of 2023 was second in the state, and that is of course worth celebrating. 99% of our students met the evidence-based reading and writing (EBRW) benchmark. Our EBRW score (633) was third in the state.
- Also, this cohort (the class of 2024) gained more EBRW ground from PSAT 10 (spring of 2022) to SAT (spring of 2023) than all the other competing schools besides Vanguard. Our percentage scale score (score/760 on PSAT and score/800 on SAT) was 77.76 on the PSAT 10 and jumped to 79.13 on the SAT. This 1.37 jump is greater than Ridgview (.1 growth), D'Evelyn (.07 loss), Golden View (.58 loss), and Stargate (.59 loss). Vanguard grew 2.
- Thus, we can celebrate that this class not only ranked high in the state in EBRW, but that they grew more their junior year than most of the other high achieving junior classes in the state.
- Our current juniors were second in the state on the EBRW portion of the PSAT 10 last spring.
- Our current sophomores were fifth in the state on the EBRW portion of the PSAT 9 last spring.
- It will be interesting to see how our juniors performed on this month's PSAT test.

Key Accomplishments Supporting Guiding Philosophy

Accomplishments -- Elementary School

- Much of the content on the continuity slides counts as accomplishments and is well worth celebrating. Working hard and being successful in maintaining high standards and unity across campuses is a great feat.
- Amy Robinson (4th grade) was bribing her class with the reward being more *Pollyanna* reading time–every kid, boy and girl alike, was motivated and excited by this offer. Let that sink in!
- Cherie's class just finished Charlie and the Chocolate Factory. Some were making the connection between Charlie's opening of the wrapper with a character in an Open Court reader where a character was cherishing something. Other students made another connection with another story where someone in a library was opening a book very carefully. This is living, vibrant proof of the sort of "webbing" Liberty's founders envisioned with our literacy policies and our thinking framework.

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Key Accomplishments Supporting Guiding Philosophy

Accomplishments -- High School

- Mr. Hultin has a large class for Classical Philosophy this year. It is encouraging to see the students study Socrates and actually engage his philosophy through discussion. Some students are even buying their own copies of the books in order to annotate and engage with them more.
- —8th Graders are already engaging in high level Socratic seminars about *To Kill a Mockingbird*, discussing ideas such as what kind of world the characters live in. Who is successful in that world? Who is good? Are they the same thing?



Key Accomplishments Supporting Guiding Philosophy

Accomplishments -- High School (continued)

- Mrs. Scarlett is making great efforts to observe and network with fellow writing teachers at other successful schools (Vanguard, Ascent, Colorado College).
- Several of Mrs. Scarlett's Comp. II students went ahead and took the AP Lang/Comp. test in May and scored very well. This is a testimony to our composition training and the level of our students.
 We want to keep pushing alternative ways to get more college credit.
- Relatedly, our desire to push AP Lang/Comp. was successful. Mrs. Renstrom has a much more healthy-sized class this year.
- Mr. Dybzinski is enjoying the high level of discussions with this year's juniors. They are not just offering great insights about deep topics (a recent intriguing question was "In what way can beauty bring us home?"—from Poe's "To Helen"), but they are also listening well to each other and making sure their own thoughts take into account the comments preceding them.
- AP English Literature scores at 3 or above: 100% (10 fives, 10 fours, 4 threes). Mean: 4.25!

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Goals & Top Concerns

Concerns

- The school is growing. Not only have we been expanding (which will affect the 7th-12th grades in coming years), but we have also been retaining more students (our junior class, for example, is by far our largest junior class we have ever had). This is good news, but it comes at a cost. Increased students means teachers have to be more strategic to have worthwhile discussions and keep everyone engaged. Increased students correlate with increased academic support plans (and all the increased cognizance/workload that goes with those). Increased students means English teachers have to lower their grading standards to get the stack of papers back in a reasonable amount of time.

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- Concerns (continued)
 - Al is a daunting, real concern. We are already catching students using it for English assignments. Tools exist to try to spot it, but those same tools help students doctor their papers to pass the Al tests. We English teachers consistently talk about strategies to deal with this. Mrs. Renstrom (9th grade) offers one potential strategy: "The solution to the problem of potential plagiarism and general intellectual laziness is simply to return to some very oldfashioned methods. In 9th grade I implemented in-class, timed essays using 'blue-books.' While this was occasionally done in the past to help jump-start students for their future AP exams, I may use it exclusively in this new AI world. Students begin by completing a thesis worksheet, and then transfer that information to a formal alpha-numeric outline. During the timed writing session, they have access to these materials. To ensure that students have the necessary skills with mechanics and typing, once students have completed writing an essay, they can still use the computer to type the final essay and revise and make the corrections indicated by the teacher on the hand-written essay."

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Goals

- We want to avoid burnout/failure by letting our content push our own hearts to what is truly beautiful. We cannot pass on what we do not possess. We cannot model what we lack. This goal was in the presentation last year, but it is an abiding goal, and I want to leave it in as reminder for the whole department.
- It has been a long time since the elementary teachers (especially 4th-6th grade) had direct, intensive grammar training. Mr. Dybzinski would like to find a way to offer this in a crash course (an hour or hour and half) sometime at the beginning of next year to get everyone on the same page.
- We want to emphasize the invention stage in the compositional/rhetorical process. We are finding that it is common for students to give too little time to this step and instead move on to developing a thesis and structure and drafting before they really have thought deeply and widely about the potential evidence and directions they could go.

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- Goals (continued)
 - We want to keep evaluating our courses and cutting any fluff, limiting homework where we can, and making sure we are teaching the best of the best. As an example of this, Mr. Dybzinski has proposed replacing *The Red Badge of Courage* with *The Old Man and the Sea*. He is also switching out a Melville short story for excerpts from *Moby Dick*. Fewer pages...higher quality. These are the sorts of changes we want to make department wide—tweaks, really—that keep us growing and not resting on our laurels.
 - Mrs. Perschau made another helpful tweak to her course. She explains, "Last year 7th graders studied Anne Frank's *Diary of a Young Girl* in the third quarter rather than the last quarter. This allowed them to not only study the autobiographical work during the nonfiction unit but also end the school year on a more upbeat note. This was very successful as I was able to rewrite the prompt for their research paper to supplement the study of Anne's diary with the impact of the diary on societies around the world."
