Interview: The Pure Impact of the Arts

Throughout the years, the arts have impacted humankind tremendously. Music, performing arts, visual arts, literature, film, architecture, and painting have all connected people globally for generations. The arts are something very special and rare in our history. Even some of our own faculty and students connect with music in a special way. I interviewed the main teachers involved with the arts and some honorable arts students here at WAHS about the impact of the arts on each of their lives. Throughthis interview, consider how the arts can or have already impacted your Did the arts change your life? If so, how?

Kalla Barrett (SOPHOMORE)- "I used to struggle with stress and often boredom, but when I started playing instruments, singing, and acting it felt I had found a missing piece of myself."

Hans Kuder (SENIOR)- "It gives me a source to outlet some of my emotion and express myself. I have had days where the arts were the only thing I had to look forward to, and it can completely turn your day around."

Kassie Ritter (SENIOR)- "Drawing/painting brings a sense of enjoyment and fulfillment that nothing else is able to. It's something I can be proud of. It's hard for me to ever really define what kind of person I am, but the first thing I'll ever be certain of is my love for art."

Mr.Costenbader (ART TEACHER)- "I struggled in some of my core classes in school. I wasn't failing, but I did what I needed to do to get "okay" grades. It was my high school art teacher that pointed out to me that if you want to become a successful artist, you need to be well rounded. Art has connections to all disciplines. Art eventually helped become more well rounded, gave me confidence and purpose."

What is your most sentimental or life changing experience within the arts?

Hans Kuder (SENIOR)- "One of my most life changing experiences with the arts would've been my first time making it into a district band for the first time. The thing that amazed me the most was that the emotions in the air were not just shown by one person. Rather, it was everyone sharing the emotion and creativity even if we didn't know each other, we all knew music.

Mr.Costenbader (ART TEACHER)- "For me it is seeing students realize their true potential and reaching their goals. I have students who have become professional artists and art therapists/teachers. It is also very satisfying to students who will not choose to be professional artists, but discover the pure joy of expressing themselves through art." Mrs.Wetherell (MUSIC TEACHER)- "During my senior year of college, the whole music department was preparing for a mosaic concert at Eisenhower Auditorium which seats 2,500 people. There was a soprano solo called "Dulcissime" that the soloists didn't get their starting note. Everyone in the music department wanted the solo. I was intimidated by all of the performing majors auditioning, but I received the big solo!"

Mr.Hall (MUSIC TEACHER)- "In 2015 I had the privilege to perform chamber and opera music throughout the Mezzano region of Northern Italy. My time in Mezzano culminated in a performance of Beethoven's 6th Symphony "Pastoral," which remains a deeply personal piece of music that inspires both joy and serenity." If WAHS did not offer creative outlets through our school, do you think you would do as good/be as motivated in your academics?

Kassie Ritter (SENIOR)- "Not at all. Art and piano class are the two classes I look forward to most. Without them, I'd not have the motivation to show up every day."

Hans Kuder (SENIOR)- "I don't think I would be as motivated. I don't think I would do as well without arts since it helps me to be something other than a student.

How the U.S. Government Almost Shut Down & What's Next

On September 30, 2023, the nation feared a government shutdown and its consequences for the nation. Government shutdowns occur when there are budget disagreements between the House, Senate, and White House. If Congress was not able to pass legislation to fund the government by midnight on September 30, 2023, it would have led to a government shutdown. This would imply that government operations would cease; however, the essential ones would continue. Federal agencies deem which government operations are essential and which are not.

President Joe Biden and Speaker Kevin McCarthy agreed to cap federal spending for the next two years in an attempt to avoid a federal debt default. This agreement was passed on a bipartisan basis. McCarthy had to rely on Democratic votes due to a group of right-wing lawmakers disagreeing with the proposition. According to right-wing lawmakers, they believed that it allowed far too much spending and went back to the funding levels agreed to in it.

The Senate was moving toward a bipartite spending patch. This would keep the government open through November 17, 2023, and provide six billion dollars in aid for Ukraine and six billion dollars in natural disaster relief for the United States. McCarthy, however, did not earn the minimum threshold of votes from the Republican side. He turned to the Democrats to pass the bill without aid for Ukraine. Republicans would ultimately pass three spending bills.

With a 216-210 vote, Kevin McCarthy was removed as speaker of the House — allowing the Republicans to have a new candidate running for Speaker. The current candidate for the Republican Speaker is Steve Scalise. However, he is not guaranteed the position due to the Republicans' thin majority. He will need 217 votes from the Republicans to be elected Speaker of the House.

National Emergency Alert System Testing

The federal government reported it will conduct a nationwide emergency alert system broadcast on Wednesday, October 4th at approximately 2:20 PM ET. Don't be alarmed, this is merely a test of a new system that FEMA is testing in coordination with the national government. As reported by the federal government, the alert will contain a series of loud alarms designed to attract attention.

These alarms will go off on phones, televisions, and radio devices. The alarms are still said to go off, even if the devices are set to silent mode. The test will last for about one minute on radios and televisions, and phones will receive the test about a half-hour in.

The emergency alert system was nothing major to worry about, like most people initially speculated. At 2:18 PM ET, the federal government began the alarms. All phones should have received an alert and a text message that reads: "THIS IS A TEST of the National Wireless Emergency Alert System. No action is needed." These alarms sounded similar to the regular weather alerts.

The purpose of this testing was to ensure our EAS (Emergency Alert System) and WEA (Wireless Emergency Alerts) systems would work in the scenario of an emergency. The EAS system was sent out to radios and the WEA was sent out to cell phones.



Travis King Released from North Korea

Army Pvt., Travis King returns to the United States after being released by North Korea where he was held in custody for two months. King, while he was serving in South Korea and was on tour of the Demilitarized Zone on the inter-Korean border, sprinted into North Korea. On the initial reports of this incident, it was believed that King was open to seeking refuge in North Korea or a third-world country.

But, North Korean Central News Agency would say that Travis King was "disillusioned about the unequal U.S. society." Military experts speculate that King could be charged under the Uniform Code of Military Justice — specifically Article 85 for dissertation or Article 86 for going AWOL (absent without leave). But at this moment, it is unclear if the army is going to take that step.

Army secretary Christine Wormuth came forward and stated that any punishment that King would face would come from his own decisions after he completes the reintegration process. Before running into North Korea, King had already been involved in criminal charges and was court martialed by the Army in South Korea.

CNN previously reported that King was expected to be administratively separated from the military after being found guilty in a court martial hearing related to assault and other charges. Now, Travis King is on temporary duty orders to Joint Base San Antonio as he completes the reintegration process, which Army spokesperson Bryce Dubee said includes "medical care, decompression, and debriefing." King was reunited with his family over the weekend after the long two months of being in custody and his reintegration into society.



NASA Astronaut Breaks World Record

On September 27, 2023, NASA astronaut Frank Rubio came back down to earth after being in space for a total of 371 days, officially breaking the world record of 355 by Mark Vande Hei.

Rubio was initially projected to be in space for 6 months. On September 21, 2022, he went into a Russian-operated Soy-us MS-22 with a crew from Kazakhstan. After their space orbit, the group was going to return to Earth. However, when their shuttle was unexpectedly hit with space junk, it experienced a coolant leak. It was consequently deemed to be highly unsafe for them to come back to earth. Roscosmos, a State Space Corporation, needed time to prepare another Soyuz ship to send out to the crew — extending Rubio's duration in space to a total of 371 days.

Following Rubio's time in space, he landed in a remote area in the country of Kazakhstan. As reported by Rubio, if he had known he had to stay in space for over a year beforehand, he would decline. He explained, "That's only because of family things that were going on the past year. Had I known that I had to miss those very important events, I just would have to say 'thank you, but no thank you."

Rubio experienced difficulties with his mental health when reality hit him that he was going to be stuck in space for over a year. He had stated that his family's resilience throughout this unexpected inconvenience and the supportive company of his Russian crewmates, Sergey Prokopyev and Dmitri Peteli, during their time stuck in the orbit of space is what had helped get him through his 371 days in space.



NATO Country Could Soon Be Having a Pro-Russian Leader

The country of Slovakia may soon be under the rule of Robert Fico, a pro-Russian leader. Now, this is Slovakia's fourth election in five years. With this, Fico ended up winning the parliamentary elections for Slovakia.

Fico's Direction – Slovak Social Democracy party, SMER, won 22.9% of Slovakia's vote. This was higher than anticipated. The Progressive Slovakia (PS), a liberal and pro-Ukraine group, only won 18% of Slovakia's votes. With these numbers, Progressive Slovakia is Fico's biggest opponent.

There are a total of seven political parties that reached the 5% threshold to enter the parliament coalition negotiations. Fico will have to negotiate with at least two additional parties to gain a majority in parliament. He recently reported that Zuzana Čaputová, a Slovak politician, has given him 14 days to negotiate with the other parties.

In the scenario where Robert Fico is elected leader of Slovakia, he will cause political issues for NATO. NATO, an alliance between 31 countries in North America and Europe, exists to protect its members. In the past two years, the countries of NATO have been looking into adding Ukraine to the alliance. Nonetheless, under Robert Fico's rule, Ukraine's ambitions of joining NATO may be immediately blocked. He will also stop supplying Ukraine with weapons and resources in the war with Russia.

Robert Fico was a two-time prime minister from 2006 to 2010 and 2012 to 2018. This will be his third time running for prime minister in Slovakia. In his second term, he was forced to resign due to mass protests and controversy over the murder of journalist Jan Kuciak and his fiancée, Martina Kušnírová. Kuciak was reporting corruption by Fico and his group, SMER. Now, Fico has been granted another chance due to the current chaos in the Slovakian government.



From Destruction to Recovery: The Floods in Libya

On September 10th, 2023, the collapse of the Derna dam claimed over 6,000 lives in Libya. Approximately 16,000 individuals have been displaced as a result of the collapse.

According to Rick Brennan, a director for the Mediterranean World Health Organization, "[Authorities] are still looking for people in collapsed buildings, but the chance of finding survivors is diminishing by the hour. We expect, unfortunately, that most of the missing will not be found alive."

The destruction of the country was triggered by Storm Daniel. Storm Daniel, also known as Cyclone Daniel, is currently the deadliest Mediterranean storm in history. The intensity of the storm led to the drastic bursting of the Derna dam. Karsten Haustein, a climate scientist at Leipzig University, suggested, "The warmer water in September does not only fuel those storms in terms of rainfall intensity, it also makes them more ferocious."

The representatives of Libya noted the unexpectedness of the flood. Aly, the Emergency and Ambulance Authority spokesperson, shared, "Libya was not prepared for a catastrophe like that. It has not witnessed that level of catastrophe before." Nonetheless, such shortcomings prompted future preventative measures.

Libya's allies have also offered their support services. The United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund (UNICEF), a humanitarian agency, provided medical supplies, hygiene kits, and clothing for those in need. UNICEF has also implemented child-protection systems. Specifically, they established child protection screenings and psychosocial support throughout the country.



The Deadliest Earthquake Morocco Has Seen

On September 8th, 2023, at roughly 11:11 pm local time, a 6.8 magnitude earthquake struck the country of Morocco. Its epicenter was located around the High Atlas mountain range, approximately 44 miles from the well-known tourist city of Marrakech. Due to the shallow depth, this earthquake was more destructive than what the country is used to. Morocco has seen many earthquakes in its days; however, this was the deadliest they have seen since 1960.

In regards to the 1960 earthquake, it had taken around 12,000 lives. Earthquakes of magnitude 5 or higher have struck the region since 1900; however, none have had a magnitude greater than 6.

The 6.8 magnitude earthquake has been recognized as the most devastating earthquake in the province of Al Haouz, killing nearly 1,500 people. Towns were completely destroyed and homes were ravaged. The extent of the damage caused 8% of Morocco's GDP to be used solely for repairing and rebuilding. According to the World Bank, Morocco's GDP for 2022 was only 134.18 billion. The rebuilding process will take an extensive time and money.

Morocco has been a popular tourist destination for decades and will likely continue to remain that way for years to come. With all of these damages, the destination might slow down a bit, but in time, once rebuilding is done, it should continue to flourish.



Ukraine War: Russia Expands Mobilization

February 24th, 2022, has become a date that will forever live in history. Seventy seven years after the last major conflict in Europe, the Russian Federation launched a surprise invasion of Ukraine under the pretext of "Denazification" - or ridding Ukraine of its alleged Nazi influence. Entitled a "Special Military Operation" by Kremlin officials, Russian President Vladimir Putin stated that the so-called operation would come to an end in seventy two hours. Therefore, Russian troops would be parading in Kyiv, the capital of Ukraine, in no time. Nearly two years later, Russia is showing signs of desperation as Ukraine launches its long-awaited counteroffensive. Warm bodies for Russia are a necessity in order to plug the gaps being made by constant Ukrainian attacks, but they're finding these bodies in a most unusual place.

It wasn't too long after the initial invasion that Russia made rapid gains. In just days many regions fell under the control of Russian occupation forces, with the most notable being Ukrainian regions of Kherson and Zaporizhzhia. On September 23rd, 2022, Russia held referendums in four of its occupied Ukrainian territories known as the aforementioned Zaporizhzhia and Kherson, with the addition of Donetsk and Luhansk. This referendum, which many in the international community have deemed rigged, was on the annexation of the four regions into the broader Russian Federation. This would essentially make these four regions a part of Russia and subject to Russian law and authority.

One week later, on September 30th, Russian authorities closed the referendum with 93.1% of people saying "Yes" to joining Russia. Obviously this was called out by the international community, as many refused to recognize the annexation as legal or legitimate. Despite this, Russia continued with its war and protracted the implementation of Russian law into its newly acquired territories.

Mobilization is a military term used to describe when a government begins forcing vast swaths of its population to join its armed forces. In Russia, all constituent regions of the Federation are subjected to a call of mobilization if the Ministry of Defense and President enact it. On October 28th, 2022, Russia launched its first mobilization in eighty two years with 300,000 men being conscripted and ready for deployment in Ukraine. Though this failed to achieve anything, sources vary. When it comes to the Ukrainian Ministry of Defense, it is claimed that from October to December of 2022, Russia lost between 72,000 and 90,000 men. Even if this number was unconfirmed, it is staggering and the Russian government knew that.

Thus far, Russia has continued to rely on the remaining 300,000 men they've deployed to Ukraine. Russia has also been making calls to expand laws in regards to mobilization to Kherson and Zaporizhzhia. This would essentially force Ukrainian civilians to wage war on their countrymen on behalf of the Russian government. All of this has emerged while Ukraine continues to drive its forces southward to liberate its occupied regions. With this move, Russia has shown the world its desperation towards fresh recruits in order to hold off the ever determined

No Worse Neighbor: The Artsakh Conflict

When one imagines the end of a nation's existence, many thoughts are brought to mind: a valiant last battle against a foreign foe or a solemn signing of a treaty after a grueling war. Rarely ever does one imagine an entire country signing away its independence after a mere 24 hours of fighting. However, this was the case for a small Caucasus nation known as Artsakh. Though small, this very event could be the prelude to a much more devastating show.

Artsakh, informally known as the Nagorno-Karabakh Republic, was formed as an ethnic break-away region in the nation of Azerbaijan in 1991. Unlike Azerbaijan, which is a Turkic nation, Artsakh is, or, rather was, majority composed of ethnic Armenians. From the previously mentioned independence date of 1991 to 1994, Artsakh, with the aid of Armenia, would wage a successful war against Azerbaijan as they finally ended with Artsakh occupying seven Azerbaijani provinces and uniting with Armenia.

As one could imagine, such a loss greatly angered the Azerbaijani government and a "Frozen Conflict" would soon sprout in the region. A "Frozen Conflict" is defined as a prolonged string of short military engagements around or in a given disputed region. For the next 28 years, Artsakh would live in relative peace besides the occasional disturbance of border clashes or artillery exchanges. However, this would change in September of 2020 when Azerbaijani forces launched a surprise invasion of the occupied regions administered by Artsakh. Quickly, the world's eyes were drawn to the southern Caucasus as footage poured out of Artsakh exposing Israeli and Turkish supplied Azerbaijani drones which annihilated entire columns of Artsakh troops. Within weeks, the conflict ended. Artsakh was reduced to its pre-1991 independence borders.

Despite legally being a part of the Republic of Armenia, Artsakh was offered little in assistance by Yerevan, the capital of Armenia, when it came to deterring the Azerbaijani threat. The Armenian public viewed the inaction of the Armenian government as nothing less than traitorous with protests quickly sweeping Armenia proper. Protests called for the resignation of the then-Prime Minister, Nikol Pashinyan. They hoped he would reignite the conflict with Azerbaijan and cancel-out the Russian orchestrated peace settlement. Unfortunately this failed, leaving the Artsakh isolated from its ancestral motherland.

The victory was praised in Baku - the capital of Azerbaijan - though Azerbaijani leadership must have believed that the mere existence of the now-turned rump state of Artsakh was a very threat to Bakus hold on Azerbaijan proper. The next three years were grueling. Artsakh's population steadily dwindled as Azerbaijani forces blocked aid-corridors and harassed idle Russian peacekeepers. One week from the three year anniversary of the humiliating defeat in the 2020 war, Azerbaijani trucks emblazoned with stylized alphabetic symbols reminiscent of the Russian "Z" and "V" from the ongoing Ukraine War as it rolled into Artsakh with artillery smashing into the capital - Stepanakert. Within 24 hours, Artsakh officially announced the disbanding of its armed forces. Days later Artsakh would agree to cede independence by December, 2023 leaving over 100,000 ethnic Armenians to have fled their ancestral homeland.

Nagorno-Karabakh Conflict

The Nagorno-Karabakh conflict has been a long-standing dispute between Armenia and Azerbaijan since 1988. Nagorno-Karabakh is a disputed territory with a majority population of ethnic Armenians in the South Caucasus.

In 1988, tensions began to rise when Armenians living there demanded the transfer of the Nagorno-Karabakh territory, which was owned by the Azerbaijan Soviet Socialist Republic at the time, from Soviet Azerbaijan to Armenia. Armed fighting between Armenia and Azerbaijan was kept relatively under control by Soviet rule. However, when the Soviet Union collapsed in 1991, so did peace in the region and tensions turned into an outright war.

By 1994, fighting ceased and Armenia had control over Nagorno-Karabakh. Around 30,000 lives had been lost and 1 million people had been displaced from their homes - 700,000 Azerbaijanis were expelled from Armenia and 300,000 Armenians living in Azerbaijan.

For about 26 years, sporadic incidents between the two republics were just proof that war would eventually rekindle. In September of 2020, substantial fighting broke out along the border of Azerbaijan and Nagorno-Karabakh leading to the second war between Azerbaijan and Armenia. After forty-four days, seven thousand lives lost, and 40,000 people being displaced, the war ended in a cease-fire and Azerbaijan re-established victory and control over Nagorno-Karabakh.

Over the past three years, hostilities have increased, and in late September of this year, the majority of the small population of Armenians left in Nagorno-Karabakh began to flee to Armenia after the arrival of Azerbaijan's army and seizure of the disputed territory. Over 400 Armenians have been killed, and 100,000 of the 120,000 of them have fled west through the Lachin Corridor, the border between Armenia and Nagorno-Karabakh, to Armenia. The Azerbaijan government has demanded that the ethnic Armenians there either submit to Azerbaijani governance or depart. The use of starvation tactics and army intimidation demonstrate the ethnic cleansing of Armenians by the Azerbaijan powers.

Armenia's prime minister, Nikol Pashinyan, said in a recent government meeting, "There will be no more Armenians left in Nagorno-Karabakh in the coming days." Thousands of people are being kicked out of the only home they've ever known.

Russia, the nation that's played the biggest role in mediating the Nagorno-Karabakh conflict, has stayed silent and refused to intervene to open the Lachin Corridor. Armenians across the world are forced to watch the ethnic cleansing of their people, and all they can do is call on leaders of other nations to help them.



Bus Crash Containing Students

Unfortunately, as a bus was transporting highschoolers on their way to band camp, it crashed. The bus rolled and slid over Interstate 84 and fell into a fifty feet ravine in Orange County, New York. According to Nassau County Executive Bruce Blakemanwo, two adults were killed, sixteen children and two adults put into hospitalization, and five remaining in critical condition.

More specifically, the two passengers that died were identified as 77 year old Beatrice Ferrari and 43 year old Gina Pellettiere. Pelletiere was listed as the school's director of bands on their website. She was the chairperson of the Nassau All-County Division 5 Symphonic Band for many years, and a guest conductor for both Nassau and Suffolk All-County Festivals. According to a close family friend, she left behind a two year old son. The government states "There's a lot of families that need some love tonight. And we extend that from 20 million New Yorkers."

A faulty front tire was a factor of the crash, governor and investigators mention. The investigation is ongoing as the National Transportation Safety Board is investigating the crash. They will look at seat-belt usage, the mechanics of the bus, and its "general crashworthiness," among other factors, HUMM said.

Dianne Feinstein

Hard-working U.S. politician and former mayor of San Francisco, Dianne Feinstein, sadly passed away on Thursday, September 29, aged 90. In recent years, Feinstein dealt with several health issues but remained in office, doing what she loved: helping people. One of her most notable accomplishments is how she led San Francisco as mayor after a tragic event of political violence, which resulted in the death of George Moscone and Harvey Milk.

Dianne Feinstein was born in San Francisco in 1933. Her uncle, Morris Goldman, was a "Democratic Party wheeler-dealer." He took her to a Board of Supervisors meeting when she was 12. Feinstein then went on to study history at Stanford University. After graduating, she was selected as a fellow of the Coro Foundation, a program meant to train her for government service.

In November of 1992, Dianne Feinstein became California's first female senator. A year later, she was made California's senior senator when Alan Cranston retired, getting reelected five more times. During her time in office, she accomplished many things. These accomplishments include being the first woman to chair the Senate Rules Committee in 2007 and to chair the Senate Intelligence Committee in 2009. She was also the first woman to serve on the Senate Judiciary Committee.

The 2023 Hollywood Writers strike ended on the 27th of September after 148 days. A strike like this hasn't happened in sixteen years. However, the Writers Guild of America reached a tentative agreement with major Hollywood studios and is returning to work.

In the agreement, one of the main issues was regarding AI, or, Artificial Intelligence. The studios agreed on some AI protection rules. For example, studios will be required to tell writers if something was written with AI or inspired by it. This is intended to ensure that writers are fairly compensated for their work.

This leads to another concern of the Writers Guild, pay. Writer pay has not increased to compensate for inflation in the past five years, many writers weren't making livable wages. The agreement states that writers' pay may be increased by as much as 5%. Another concern of the WGA is the dishonesty of studios regarding the amount of hours their work was being watched, the agreement requires more transparency with the reported hours.

The WGA had very specific demands for this agreement and received most of what they wanted. Most of the Writers Guild of America members were expected to accept this deal. The voting for this deal started on October 2 and ended on the 9th. Meanwhile, writers have returned to work and are spreading their creativity once again.


