Recent events like the Parkland, Florida tragedy and closer to home in Noblesville give us all pause and concern for school safety.

Danville Schools share in this concern and have engaged in improving several safety measures in past years. These improvements include a complete overhaul of our school safety plan, including proper response protocols and identification of multiple reunification sites for each building.

Each school building has been updated with state of the art security cameras inside and out. All doors are locked throughout the school day; visitors must be buzzed in for entry and must also submit to a background check prior to going beyond the office area.

These measures are in addition to having a full time school resource officer

through our partnership with the Town of Danville.

This past school year and summer saw several safety upgrades. South Elementary received a double vestibule entry with the addition of a second set of safety doors. All door control access boxes were updated at Danville Community High School, including upgrades to the check in cameras at the primary entrances.

Danville Schools has also upgraded its employee and volunteer background checks to comprehensive criminal history checks, including multistate and national databases.

Most recently, we participated in the free metal detector program and are making policy plans for their use.

The best security is achieved through timely communication. To further promote communication,

all school radios have been upgraded and repeater units have been added to enhance school bus communications. Our staff members also receive regular school safety plan training.

This fall, Danville Schools plans to lead a full self-audit of our school safety measures and will also receive a state level safety audit later this school year. We believe the safety and security of our students and staff members is extremely important and will continue to seek advice and implement meaningful security measures.

partner with the Town of Danville to provide a school resource officer, and have successfully applied for and received funds from the secured schools safety grant for three years in a row to offset these school district costs. This has saved local taxpayer funds while providing a great safety service to our students.

Warrior Welcome Day helps our students hit the ground running on the first day of school! Held the week before school starts, it gives students at Danville Community High School and Middle School the opportunity to walk their class schedule, try their locker combinations, and sign up for clubs and activities.

Danville Community High School Assistant Principal Aimee Harvey said the majority of her students participate in Warrior Welcome Day, along with many of the freshman who attend a special orientation just for them that morning.

"Warrior Welcome Day gives students the chance to get back in the frame of mind of





school, without it being the first day," she said. "This is also the freshman's first real look in the building and it gives them the chance to connect with some faces."

Crew Leaders, a group of hand-selected juniors and seniors, attend freshman orientation and wear their Crew t-shirts the first few days of school to help the new students.

"This is all about the comfort level of the kids more than anything," Harvey added. "So they come in ready to go."

ReadUP program a success at South Elementary



ReadUP, a fully-funded program with United Way of Central Indiana, is now in its third year at South Elementary. We host the only ReadUP program in Hendricks County and the only program that meets after school.

"At the end of this school year, we will have had 48 students graduate from ReadUP, with over 75 volunteer tutors from the community offering their support," South Librarian Mrs. Renee Bowman said.

ReadUP students receive 90 minutes of additional literacy instruction each week, from September through April. Tutors cheer their students on through relationship building, encouraging a love for





reading, and following their progress all year long.

"Holiday parties and End of Year parties allow both students and tutors to celebrate their hard work and enjoy each other's company," Mrs. Bowman added.

Typical ReadUP students start the program reading below grade level and end the year reading at or above grade level, with a proven track record of 100% student pass rate of the IREAD-3 assessment the first two years of the program.

We match our ReadUP students with a team of two tutors. Our tutors have various backgrounds and include retired teachers, parents of former students, even staff members.






"ReadUP is truly one of the best parts of my week," said ReadUP volunteer and Director of Academic Services Morgan Walker. "There is nothing like seeing a student finally read a word they struggled with or get so excited about a story we are reading they don't want ReadUP to end. Thanks to the Hendricks County Community Foundation, the future just got a little brighter for Danville Community High School senior Michael Oliver. The 2019 Lilly Scholar said that he owes this accomplishment to hard work and the support of his family.

"My family has been super helpful on this journey," Michael said. "My cousin was a Lilly Scholar, so learning from her and the rest of my family about what it means to be a Lilly Scholar has been great support."

Receiving full tuition and a \$900 yearly stipend with this award, Michael said he plans to attend Taylor University and pursue an education in politics, philosophy and economics. He hopes to attend law school and see where the future takes him.



f you want to impress your friends or family around the dinner table, here are a few fun facts about Danville Schools.

Did you know that all of the Danville Schools are "A" rated by the Indiana Department of Education and that our third through eighth grade students' ISTEP scores are in the top 5 percent in the state? Each and every one of our third graders were at or above grade level reading this past year as measured by the state IREAD3 test.

Danville Community High School offers 24 different advanced course options and received the College Board AP Honor Roll award for the third year in a row. This year, DCHS was one of only 373 schools to receive this award in the U.S. and Canada combined.

But, did you also know that Danville Schools rank in the bottom 12 percent statewide in funding per child we receive from state revenues? Not all schools are funded the same amount per child. This negatively affects our abilities to pay competitive wages to our Danville instructional staff and jeopardizes classroom quality for students compared to other districts.

In 2018, our operational revenue losses due to tax caps "circuit breaker" were

over \$1.1 million which also makes it difficult to buy new buses, pay competitive wages and to make needed facility repairs.

Regardless of the challenges, we wanted you to be aware of the value your schools are returning back to the community. We do so appreciate our community's support and thank you for your patronage of Danville Community Schools.

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COST CUTTING CORNER

Danville Schools believe in being good stewards of taxpayer dollars. Through competitive bidding of our cash investments, DCSC gained a 73

percent increase in our certificate of deposit rates for 2019. DCSC will also retire \$1.1 million dollars of debt in 2019 and is eligible for an AA++ credit rating, the highest rating attainable by public schools.

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140 years of Danville Schools

With a little bit of digging at the Danville Public Library, and with a lot of help from its dedicated historians, the history of Danville Schools begins to unfold. Students have been calling our halls home for 140 years now, before beginning their journey and embracing their future.

On May 16, 1879, the very first Danville graduation ceremony was held at the Royal Theater with only one graduate - Belle Kennedy. This year, 190 seniors will walk across the stage to get their diploma.

Our current school buildings are just four in a long line of locations in the last 140 years, with Danville Community Middle School at 10-years-old, South Elementary at a surprising 27-years-old, Danville Community High School at 47-years-old, and North Elementary reaching an impressive 56-years-old. "It is an honor to be a part of the history of DCHS and to be able to represent such a great class," senior class president Laney Gilbert said, holding a composite of the 1928 class. "It's very humbling to be on the wall with the people who have made my experience at DCHS so impactful."

It's been an amazing year at Danville Community School Corporation! - All Danville Schools were 'A' rated by the Indiana Department of Education.
- Over 200 Danville senior citizens signed up for their Silver Pass, a new program that gives them free access to school events.
- DCHS was listed to the AP District Honor Roll for the third straight year and offered over 20 dual credit, AP and honors classes for our students.
- •The Little Warrior Learning Center preschool program launched at North

Elementary this year, and will be adding a third classroom in the fall of 2019.

- Danville Schools placed in the top 5 percent in state testing scores.
- •Our safety plan audit and on-site visit resulted in a 100% compliant distinction from the state and a second school resource officer was added to our team.

- •The DCHS football season ended in the sectional semifinal, becoming the first time the school has had three consecutive winning seasons since 2007.
- •The DCHS volleyball team became Conference and Sectional Champions and

- •DCHS coach Pat O'Neil was inducted into the Indiana Baseball Hall of Fame.

- •This year, our FFA students celebrated the chapter's 20th anniversary. Among the many accomplishments, the Horticulture Team competed and won at the National contest and the Horse Evaluation Team placed first at the state contest. Danville Community Schools consistently seeks to be good stewards of taxpayer dollars. This summer the middle school will have building repairs, including resealing the joints and windows to protect our investment from water infiltration. This fall, our students will receive new personal computer devices to assist in their education.

This combined investment is nearly \$500,000. This cost will be covered by incremental proceeds (savings) from a bond that was refinanced in 2015 without costing taxpayers additional funds to pay for these expenses.
