

<b>HM American Red Cross Club (HMARCC)</b>	The HMARCC is affiliated with the American Red Cross’s Greater New York Region, and all members are official Red Cross volunteers. Together, we aim to alleviate suffering within and beyond our community through education and calculated action. We devote our efforts towards organizing material drives, attending Red Cross events, and doing our part in implementing disaster preparedness measures.
<b>Autism Acceptance Club</b>	The Autism Acceptance Club is a space where we discuss Autism and other developmental disabilities in depth. As there are not many other spaces that do this at HM, we organize events such as speakers, hand out sensory toys, and look to volunteer with local organizations that hire autistic adults.
<b>Cancer Awareness Club</b>	The CAC works towards involving the greater HM community in the fight against cancer. We intend to serve as a resource for our generation about cancer education and what we as the Horace Mann community can do to help find a cure. We also host awareness and help with fundraising events throughout the year.
<b>Feminist Students Association</b>	Feminist Students Association, or FSA, is a space to discuss feminist issues, agendas, and identities, both at Horace Mann and beyond. We aim to educate each other and learn together through dialogue about current and historical topics of significance.
<b>Green HM</b>	The purpose of Green HM is to discuss, plan initiatives, and hold events to make our school and the greater world more sustainable. We do so by identifying what can be improved and developing concrete plans that can be implemented at HM and around our local communities. One of the biggest events we plan is Green Week when club members organize workshops by giving presentations on environmental topics or planning other activities to get members of our community involved.
<b>Real Estate &amp; Social Policy Club</b>	The club’s goal is to encourage members to think about problems with public policies related to housing in low-income communities throughout the country like income discrimination and to also think about solutions. Members will learn about policy briefs and can choose a city or state in America to do independent research on.
<b>Reproductive Justice Coalition</b>	The Reproductive Justice Coalition aims to spread awareness of current events surrounding reproductive rights and advocate for change both in our school and our broader geographic community. The coalition’s collaborative model aims to create a space where community members can have their voices and ideas heard.
<b>Social Impact Investing Club</b>	The Social Impact Investing Club is a club that educates students about social impact investing and microfinance, as well as how beneficial it is to those around the world who have little access to financial services. The club will fund small loans to “unbanked” individuals in underdeveloped countries to empower their success. The Wellness Initiative Club strives to destigmatize conversations about mental health, and encourage the incorporation of healthy practices into students' everyday lives. We seek to make well-being a priority in our community, and ensure that students receive the support that they need.
<b>Business &amp; Industry</b>	
<b>Cryptocurrency Club</b>	The Cryptocurrency Club aims to educate and inform the students of Horace Mann about Cryptocurrency. We also want to provide a forum for students interested in crypto to discuss it, and to get interested students involved in the cryptocurrency community.
<b>DECA</b>	DECA is a national organization that prepares emerging leaders and entrepreneurs in the fields of Finance, Marketing, Hospitality, and Business Management. Horace Mann's DECA introduces students to these fields, helping members to apply their learning, and promoting competition. As part of DECA, students can bolster their business acumen and participate in national contests and simulations.
<b>Economics Club</b>	How can society efficiently allocate resources to best serve the needs of individuals, while maximizing productive potential? Although often categorized along with business, the study of macroeconomics focuses on how society as a whole can improve standard of living, rather than focus on the management of enterprise. In the Economics Club, Horace Mann students will compete in both more relaxed trivia events and also problem-solving competitions, and we will host discussions and debates about current events and their relation to economic principles.
<b>FBLA (Future Business Leaders of America)</b>	FBLA is the largest business student organization in the world, offering numerous competitive events in varying formats: tests, presentations, and roleplays. In FBLA, students will have the opportunity to attend state-wide and nationwide conferences to hear guest speakers, network with other students passionate about business, and participate in any of their 75 competitive events. FBLA hosts competitions in common business topics like finance, accounting, marketing, etc., as well as niche topics like agribusiness, cyber security, sports management, healthcare administration, and many more.
<b>Financial Literacy Club (FinLit)</b>	The Horace Mann Financial Literacy Club aims to bring together ALL HM Upper Division students to make informed research on healthy financial habits, understand the inner workings of financing college tuition, avoid costly debt traps, and learn how to cope with spending emergencies and negotiating techniques. Club members participate in a yearly Financial Literacy Competition with the aim of learning, enjoying friendly competition, and earning awards.
<b>Food for Thought</b>	Food for Thought aims to educate students about the importance of food science and nutrition. Specifically, to better understand the food industry, including how to read nutrition labels, the science/psychology behind advertising and label design temptation, body positivity and diet culture awareness, and the food you put in your body to fuel your mind (nutrition vs. calories.) This club also allows students to build their research and writing skills in nutrition and biological-based sciences by reading articles and research/experiment papers. If so, you're in luck—these are just a small sample of the topics we will discuss this year in Horace Mann Business League. All students interested in business, finance, economics, or anything related have a place here, as well as those who might not know as much about these fields and wish to learn more. We intend to hold frequent meetings throughout the year where we will host seminars, guest lecturers, interactive games like business-style Jeopardy and stock market simulations, and much more.</p>
<b>Horace Mann Investors Club</b>	<p>The Investors is a club designed to educate students on the world of investing, and foster enriching discussions about the subject matter. Throughout the school year, we will take a look at various investment markets, such as the Stock Market, Commodities, ETF's, Private Equity, Venture Capital, Crypto Currency, International Currencies, Bonds, Real Estate, Securites, and Investment Banking. Members will have the opportunity to learn about these different types of investing, contribute ideas, and work on investment projects with the club.</p>
<b>Market Prediction through Code</b>	<p>The use of automated prediction programs has become exponentially more prevalent in today's society with each passing day and will continue to do so, leading to a future where finance relies more and more on programming over human decision. Market Prediction Through Code is a club that incorporates both code and pattern recognition through AI and machine learning to create a way to simulate trade in the market without any real stakes or risk. Members will collaboratively create and improve on programs that recognize patterns in various markets and then produce results out of them, allocating "funds" into different assets, companies, etc. Each member of the club will also be able to simulate trade in various markets and "compete" with the program we create together. Members will be able to learn about coding, general finance, and machine learning in a community that will build connections and provide communal knowledge.</p>
<b>The Portfolio Management Club</b>	<p>Every day the market transforms, churning out limitless possibilities. It's an ever-evolving ecosystem where financial instruments, trends, and sentiments shift with the winds of global events, technological advancements, and economic fluctuations. The Portfolio Management Club is focused on understanding and acting on these changing dynamics. <b>Horace Mann for Islamic Awareness</b>	The Horace Mann Islamic Awareness club focuses on highlighting the true meaning behind Islam and Islamophobia both domestically and internationally. Through spotlighting the contributions of Muslims in our society and engaging in discussions on anti-Muslim hate crimes, our main goal is to educate others and understand the true meaning of Islam. We believe change stems first from education and, in that spirit, we plan on leading discussions on what Islam truly is and how Muslims have been negatively portrayed and treated because of the misinterpretation of their beliefs. 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### **Service & Outreach**

<b>Crafts for Comfort</b>	We teach students how to crochet and knit hats, blankets, stuffed animals, and other crafts to donate to various programs around New York City: these include cancer treatment programs at hospitals, homeless shelters, and senior centers.
<b>Horace Mann Music Outreach Club</b>	Our club is designed for Horace Mann students to express themselves musically while sharing their love of music with the school and the greater Bronx community. We aim to provide a space for not only students to improve their musical performance/ensemble abilities, but also for audiences to experience a diverse array of musical genres that they may not otherwise be exposed to. Our Club has performed at venues such as the Riverdale Senior Center, the Kingsbridge VA hospital, and more.
<b>Hospital Outreach Program (HOP)</b>	The Hospital Outreach Club aims to present students with opportunities to volunteer in medicine oriented settings such as hospitals, rehabilitation centers, and labs. In short, team leaders will provide club members with resources that will make these opportunities more accessible, lead workshops to guide members through application and cold-emailing processes, organize occasional club trips to certain clinics, and arrange projects such as making gift baskets to send to on boarded patients.
<b>JASA Connect</b>	Club members will learn from experts in the field about issues older adults face as they age in NYC. After learning about topics, club members will work on projects that directly combat each issue and support the seniors JASA serves.
<b>Middle Division Tutoring</b>	This club gives Middle Division students the opportunity to go to high school students for tutoring help in the Middle Division Academic Center and Writing Center. High school students will not be expected to remember all Middle Division concepts, and do not have to have attended the Middle Division as long as they are confident in their abilities and in teaching younger students.
<b>Saturday Morning Tutoring Program</b>	The Saturday Morning Tutoring Program pairs Upper Division student volunteers from Horace Mann with middle school students from public and parochial schools in the Bronx and nearby neighborhoods. The goal of the program is to establish a strong and productive relationship between each tutor and tutee, identifying skills that need to be strengthened, enriching the education of the tutees, and building leadership and collaborating skills. The program will be held in-person at HM.
<b>The HousingAid Initiative</b>	The HousingAid Initiative aims to raise awareness around the topic of housing insecurity as well as foster respect and an unprejudiced point of view throughout Horace Mann. While spreading awareness, our club aims to provide the housing insecure with essential supplies based on the season and items in demand. To come by these supplies we will host school drives and bake sales to fund and gain the necessary items. We aspire to partner with nonprofits to distribute these essential supplies to the housing insecure.

### **Speech & Debate**

<b>Debate: Parliamentary</b>	The Horace Mann Parliamentary Debate Team is the school's most decorated team, currently ranked sixth in the nation. It proudly boasts four of the nation's top 20 debaters (including the number one). Parliamentary Debate, or "Parli" as we like to call it, is a 2v2 external-prep-free form of debate. Unlike many other styles of debate, Parli

<b>Debate: Public Forum</b>	<p>promotes a chill and relaxed environment, free of multi-hour prep sessions and hard-to-understand resolutions. Through Parli, you will debate and become an expert on a wide range of topics, such as social movements, governmental policy, philosophy, superheroes, relationships, and more. Whether you need help coming up with an answer when cold-called on in History class or you just want to improve your public speaking skills in a fun community, Parli is the place for you!</p>
<b>Ethics Bowl Club</b>	<p>The Public Forum Debate Team is one of HM’s largest and most decorated student organizations and the school’s only nationally-recognized classic debate organization. In Public Forum, teams of two research and argue both sides of pressing national and international issues, from Medicare For All to nuclear No First Use. Debating competitively within New York City and on the national circuit (at tournaments like Harvard, Stanford, Princeton, Yale and the National Speech and Debate Tournament) allows students to compete in the world’s largest academic competition. Most importantly, debate offers students the opportunity to strengthen critical thinking, writing, and speaking skills, and join a vibrant community of friends and peers across the United States.</p>
<b>Mock Trial</b>	<p>The club will train and prepare students for the Ethics Bowl, a competitive tournament in which students debate and understand ethical and philosophical issues. Members of the club will represent and make up the Horace Mann Ethics Bowl Team.</p>
<b>Mock Trial</b>	<p>Mock Trial is a club for HM’s aspiring debaters, actors, and lawyers who want to see what it’s like to take on the role of either an attorney or a witness in court. Every year, we adopt a fictional court case created by the New York State Bar Association for which we prepare the parts of both the prosecution and the defense. After practicing our roles and dissecting the case, we send two teams to the Manhattan Criminal Courthouse, where they will compete in a simulated trial against other New York state schools for the opportunity to advance to the final round of the NYSBA’s Mock Trial Competition in Albany. We also participate in a number of different competitions throughout the year, including against other high schools and at Yale and Harvard.</p>
<b>Model Congress</b>	<p>We foster a knowledge and interest in American government and current events through a fun and competitive style of debate. Members create bills to solve issues they’re passionate about and debate the best way to address them. Through a fun and inclusive team environment, club members learn how to speak without preparation and craft logical arguments.</p>
<b>Model United Nations</b>	<p>Model UN is a terrific way to learn about politics and international relations, improve public speaking abilities, and meet new people. But more importantly, the team is a tight-knit community and a great way to make friends, both in your grade and in grades above. We welcome anyone to join and look forward to getting to know you!</p>
<b>Poetry Out Loud</b>	<p>In Poetry Out Loud, students appreciate, study and learn about great poetry and poets in a low-stress space. POL is a great outlet for poetry writing and recitation in a supportive and fun environment with like-minded students. Poetry Out Loud organizes the school’s chapter of the national recitation competition of the same name, and we also host open mic events and poetry workshops!</p>

<b>TedEd – Student Talks</b>	The Ted-Ed club is an environment where students utilize the vast resources provided by the Ted organization and engage in discussion with classmates to enhance their public speaking. All students, regardless of experience and skill, are welcome to participate, and encouraged to practice both creative and formal speaking. Additionally, students will have access to the Ted community, where they can share their talks and receive feedback from millions of peers.

## **Sports & Athletics**

<b>Athletic Mentor Program</b>	The Athletic Mentor Program organizes UD Varsity/JV athletes to mentor middle division teams in an effort to bridge middle and upper division athletics.
<b>Horace Mann Dance Company (HMDC)</b>	HMDC offers a collaborative space where HM students can express themselves freely through the art of dance. Each year we have a student-choreographed dance concert, a dance Dorr trip, and performances at on-campus events. Everyone is welcome to join!
<b>HM SK8</b>	HM SK8 promotes the life of the mind through the "life of the grind," i.e. skateboarding and learning about skateboarding with other HMers in a judgement free zone. Skaters of all abilities welcomed! HMSK8 is radical!
<b>Lions Cricket Club</b>	Want to learn a new sport? Come join us at Cricket club where we will teach you all about this new game. Through mini-games and fun lessons, we will culminate the year with an intra-school matches/tournament.
<b>Lions' Report</b>	Lion's Report is the HM Sports Media Platform. Our mission is to help create a strong and prideful sports culture within the Horace Mann community, sharing HM sports news and conducting post and pre-game interviews with members of our athletics community.
<b>Martial Arts Club</b>	The Martial Arts Club introduces students to the discipline, physicality, and philosophy of martial arts. It offers a space where members can feel immersed in the cultural aspects of multiple martial arts (Karate, Taekwondo, Judo, Muay Thai, Jiu Jitsu, etc.) while also learning self-defense and strengthening their bodies and minds.

## **STEM**

<b>Aerospace Club</b>	The Aerospace Club aims to ignite student interest in aerospace and aviation through meetings featuring hands-on activities and discussions. From exploring the history of aerospace engineering to engaging in collaborative projects like cardboard plane workshops, we offer a dynamic platform for learning and community involvement. Join us to delve into the fascinating world of flight and space exploration.
<b>Bioethics Club</b>	Bioethics Club aims to explore the intersections of medicine and ethics and discuss the conflicts that emerge as the scientific imagination extends into society. Students will engage with case studies that ground biological concepts in human experience, discuss the ethical implications of novel technologies, and ultimately develop service learning projects to address injustice in our healthcare system. We will supplement these activities with deep dives into scientific literature, documentary viewings, and visits from guest speakers throughout the year.
<b>Chemistry Club</b>	From COVID-19 vaccines to CRISPR-Cas9 gene editing, chemistry is at the forefront of modern scientific advancement. The aim of the Chemistry Club is to bring together HM students fascinated by what has been dubbed the 'central science.' Through preparation for the Chemistry Olympiad, fun

<b>Environmental Science and Engineering Club</b>	and exciting lab demos, and investigation into modern chemical research, we will pursue our shared interest in chemistry. We will also be offering chemistry homework help for any student who needs it, so whether you're on the Nobel Prize track or just scraping by in chemistry class, there's a place for you in the Chemistry Club!
<b>FRC Robotics 5806</b>	This club will empower and encourage students at Horace Mann to pursue their passion for environmental science and engineering. It will be a place for students to bring their findings, hold discussions, and listen to professionals to enhance their knowledge of these STEM fields. Our meetings will consist of interviews with guest speakers, researching peer-reviewed scientific papers, and fun competitions that increase awareness of environmental science and engineering.
<b>FTC Robotics</b>	Throughout the 8-10 week winter season, the 5806 FRC Robotics team creates a fully functioning, 150-pound robot to compete in several international robotics competitions. By collaborating with the Computer Science and Engineering Department as well as each other, we are able to develop the hands-on engineering and coding skills that are vital to anyone interested in building something new.
<b>Girls Who Code</b>	FIRST Tech Challenge students learn to think like engineers. Small, tight-knit teams of 10-15 people design, build, and code robots to compete in an alliance format against other teams. Club members learn both hardware/software skills and the FIRST value of gracious professionalism.
<b>Market Prediction through Code</b>	Girls Who Code aims to support female students in coding and hold open conversations about what it means to be a woman in technology. We will have monthly meetings which will focus on topics from coding puzzles to cool coding applications. Throughout the year, members will hear from professional women in the industry, including HM alums. We also plan to offer peer-tutoring for personal coding projects!
<b>Math Team</b>	The use of automated prediction programs has become exponentially more prevalent in today's society with each passing day and will continue to do so, leading to a future where finance relies more and more on programming over human decision. Market Prediction Through Code is a club that incorporates both code and pattern recognition through AI and machine learning to create a way to simulate trade in the market without any real stakes or risk. Members will collaboratively create and improve on programs that recognize patterns in various markets and then produce results out of them, allocating "funds" into different assets, companies, etc. Each member of the club will also be able to simulate trade in various markets and "compete" with the program we create together. Members will be able to learn about coding, general finance, and machine learning in a community that will build connections and provide communal knowledge.
<b>NeuroPsych</b>	The Math Team gives enthusiastic students with an interest in mathematics the opportunity to explore topics beyond class curricula and participate in competitions. We host weekly meetings in which we discuss interesting math problems, prepare for the numerous competitions throughout the year, and explain proofs of engaging theorems.
	The NeuroPsych club is dedicated to cultivating interest in and exploring the fields of neuroscience, psychology and the intersection between both subjects. We plan to investigate behavior and what happens in the brain, participate in the Brain Bee, and delve into the nuances of topics including

The club will also plan to explore scientific research and literature in neuroscience and psychology, host guest speakers and seminars, provide a space for open discussion, and pioneer community engagement projects for mental health.
<b>Programming Club</b>	We seek to learn more about the fascinating subjects of physics and astronomy, and any interested HM student is eligible to participate. We plan to compete in various individual and team-based physics and astronomy competitions, including the $F=ma$ Exam and the subsequent USA Physics Olympiad. We will hold student-led discussions in a tight-knit community, prepare for competitions, and solve challenging problems together.
<b>Science Olympiad</b>	The Programming Club is an open space for students who are interested in all fields of programming and computer science, including algorithms, data structure, machine learning, and more. We aim to hold both presentations and discussions on these topics in our meetings. In addition, we plan to host an annual hackathon.
<b>Students in Medicine</b>	Science Olympiad is a STEM-based team that attends regional (and often state) level scientific competitions. Through preparing for—and participating in—events ranging from geology to astronomy to the physics of airplane-building, we actively investigate and pursue subjects not typically focused on in school curricula, encouraging exploration in the discipline.
<b>The Forensic Science Club</b>	Students in Medicine was formed to provide students with a welcoming environment in which they can expand on their medical-related interests with like-minded people. At the same time, we hope that students, who may not already have a passion for medicine, can join and experiment in the field! Students will work together to simulate realistic medical scenarios and compete in national competitions to see if this growing field of career options may be for them.
<b>The Mighty Chondria</b>	The Forensic Science Club’s goal is to examine the cross-section between critical analysis of evidence and the methods used for investigation through the lens of a forensic pathologist. We aim to teach students to question and scrutinize the information and data they are presented with in order to make un-biased conclusions. We will teach these fundamental skills of Forensic Science through the context of past cases and practical techniques.

It grants someone the freedom to explore their interests that might not be included in the school curriculum, and do so in a way that they are not only pursuing what they love but teaching others about it and polishing their public speaking skills.
