Fourth Grade Focus . . .



Grade four teachers have been working on exposing students to a variety of online components, including Google Classroom, and incorporating numerous opportunities for students to use technology in daily lessons throughout the school day has become routine. We highly encourage students to continue to log on at home to complete any of their assigned homework, or to utilize the many educational programs that they have access to.

We have finished our first module topic in math, and are now working on Module 3: Multiplication and Division. It is important that students know their multiplication facts up to, and through the 12s. Please encourage your child to practice their facts daily or use the REFLEX math website to help improve their fact fluency.

This month we will continue reading various genres in our HMH Into Reading series. Students will continue writing responses to our reading and apply the learned reading strategies to help them monitor their own comprehension of texts. Some target skills that we will be focusing on are retell and summarize, main idea and details, problem and solution, theme, and figurative language. We strongly encourage having your child read for at least 20 minutes each night to practice their reading, fluency, and skills.

In science, we completed our unit of study about “Waves.” The next unit of study will be, “Powering Thru the Fair.” Students will be taking a virtual field trip to the NYS Fair in order to investigate the energy used there. They will be participating in a variety of hands-on experiments that will explore ideas such as speed, collisions, and energy conversions.

In social studies, the geography, resources, and regions of our state continue to be explored. Reading and interpreting a variety of maps relating to New York is also a key feature of our unit. All of which will lead us into our new unit of study on the Native People of New York.

Please continue checking take-home folders and agenda books each evening and help students be prepared for each school day. We thank you for your continued support and all that you do at home to continue making learning a valuable experience!

Third Grade Thoughts . . .

Our third graders have transitioned to LADSBS, and are learning so much! We finished Module 1 of our reading program, HMH *Into Reading*, where students explored what makes characters interesting. As we begin Module 2, the students are excited to learn about poetry and letters in order to build their knowledge about how people express themselves. In math, our students learned the foundational skills of multiplication and division, and are moving onto learning about place value and problem solving with units of measure. We are beginning our weather unit, which has been an engaging unit for the third graders - from analyzing weather patterns to learning about weather tools, our students love being meteorologists!

Additionally, the Miller Place and Sound Beach Fire Departments visited our school to teach our students about fire safety! The students loved interacting with the firefighters, and learning what to do in case of an emergency.

Third grade students have had a great start to the school year, and we can't wait to see how much they will continue to accomplish this year!





Fifth Grade Flash...

What a great start to the school year! The students have been adjusting nicely and we have been delving into the curriculum as well as making new friendships! The month of October was filled with lots of learning as well as fun! We had our fifth grade trip to the Bronx Zoo and a great time was had by all!



Academically, we have been moving right along! In math we are well into Module 2 which is multiplication and division. Memorizing multiplication facts at home is a great way for students to practice and be prepared for the upcoming lessons. We should be starting our “Toy’s Matter” unit which is a kit with many different hands-on lessons for the students. They really enjoy learning and exploring matter through this unit. We have started our ancient civilizations unit and students are enjoying learning about the Aztec, Inca and Maya.

Nurse's Note...

Sore throats are one of the most common reasons for visits to the LADSBS health office. Most sore throats are related to common cold viruses or allergies but sometimes it may be a symptom of Strep Throat, Hand, Foot and Mouth Disease or the Flu or Covid-19.

COXSACKIE VIRUS (Hand, Foot and Mouth Disease)

Hand, foot and mouth disease is a viral infection caused by the Coxsackie virus. It causes a blister-like rash that involves the hands, feet and mouth. The virus is spread by direct contact with the nose and throat discharges, blister fluid and feces of infected people.

Symptoms: Fever, poor appetite, runny nose and sore throat can appear 3 to 5 days after exposure. A blister-like rash on the hands, feet and in the mouth usually develops one to two days after the initial symptoms.

Treatment: There is no specific treatment. Treatment is aimed at fever control and maintaining good oral hydration.

Complications: The illness is typically mild; complications are rare.

Prevention: Children who feel ill or have a fever should be excluded from school until they are fever free for 24 hours, and the child feels well. Thorough hand washing is the best way to prevent spread of the virus.

STREP THROAT

Strep throat is a common bacterial infection and is easily spread from one person to another through coughing, sneezing or shaking hands. That's why it is so important to teach children the importance of hand washing.

If your child has been exposed to strep throat, please watch your child for the following symptoms which usually appear 2-5 days after exposure.

- Throat pain
- Difficulty swallowing
- Red and swollen tonsils, sometimes with white patches or streaks of pus
- Tiny red spots on the soft or hard palate — the area at the back of the roof of the mouth
- Swollen, tender lymph glands (nodes) in your neck
- Fever
- Headache
- Rash
- Stomach ache and sometimes vomiting, especially in younger children

For accurate diagnosis, a throat culture needs to be taken. Symptoms generally occur 2-3 days before a culture will show positive results. If medication is prescribed for strep throat, your child needs to be on the medication for 24 hours before returning to school.

Fifth grade has hit the ground running with decimal multiplication and division, converting metric units, and adding and subtracting decimals. Each grade continues to work on multi-step word problems as well as fluency with multiplication facts.

Halloween brought some spooky math activities for all grades. Keep working hard to get those green lights on Reflex Math!! Our students are learning that we can do hard things...and with a growth mindset, anything is possible!

Helpful Hints...

- **Early Pick Up:** When you know ahead of time that you will be picking your child up from school, it is very helpful that you send a note in to that effect. If anyone other than a parent picks a child up from school, we require a written note from the parent, even if the person picking up is on your contact card. If your appointment/plans are cancelled and you find you no longer need to pick your child up, please call to let us know. - **Emergency Closing Information:** Green “Emergency Closing” forms were sent home over the summer. If you have not already done so, please provide information as to how your child will travel home in the event of an early school closing due to an emergency or inclement weather. If your child attends SCOPE after-school child care, be reminded that after-care closes in the event of an emergency early dismissal. Please let us know your alternate arrangements, and make sure to have the forms back to us before November 9th.
