CROSS COUNTRY

Last Wednesday (10/25), the Livingston High Boys' Cross-Country team participated in the Trans Valley League (TVL) Championship at River Bluff Recreation Park in Ceres. The Wolves secured a second-place finish in the culminating race of the season, with stellar performances from *Cristian Lucatero* and *Anthony Aguilar*, who claimed the 4th and 5th positions, respectively. Additionally, *Moises Cortes* also delivered a strong performance, landing within the top 10 runners. This second-place finish, combined with two previous 1st place victories earlier in the season, solidified the TVL Championship for the Wolves. This marks the first boys' team championship since the Wolves joined the TVL in 2019. The Wolves are back in action this Saturday (11/4) in Angels Camp at the CIF Sac-Joaquin Section Subsection Meet. Livingston High's debut flag football season wrapped up last Thursday, October 26th, with a second-round playoff defeat to Christian Brothers High School from Sacramento. Christian Brothers, the #2 seed in the Sac-Joaquin Section Division 2 playoff bracket, entered the game on an impressive 8-game winning streak, during which they outscored their opponents by an average of 36 points. Unfazed, the Pack took an early lead when LHS quarterback *Elizabeth Avila* connected with *Tati Alvarez* for an 18-yard touchdown pass. The Falcons responded, tying the game at 6-6 just before halftime. In the second half, Christian Brothers scored to secure a 13-6 lead, which they maintained despite the Pack's late-game efforts.

Playoffs bring an end to the season for all but one team, and despite this playoff loss, the season can be deemed a resounding success, both quantitatively and qualitatively. The Wolves concluded the season with an impressive overall record of 18-11, notably winning 15 of their last 20 games. Within this impressive stretch, the Pack posted an 11-3 record, securing a Tri-Championship in the Central California Conference, alongside Atwater and Merced High. With 15 out of 19 players on the varsity squad set to return, the future of flag football holds exciting promise.
