On October 20, our student council helped with career day. Members guided the speakers to their rooms and assisted them. Career day was a great learning experience!



November – National Healthy Skin Month

It's time to pay attention to your skin. National Healthy Skin Month each November is sponsored by the American Academy of Dermatology. You may not realize it, but your skin reveals a lot about your overall health. This month makes you aware of what it takes to keep your skin healthy as well as understanding how to treat and prevent common skin problems. National Healthy Skin Month stresses how to correctly use sunscreen and offers helpful tips on how to check your skin periodically to prevent skin cancer.

HOW TO OBSERVE NATIONAL HEALTHY SKIN MONTH

1. Chill out

Put your feet up and manage your stress. Stress makes your skin break out and can make skin conditions like psoriasis much worse. Get your rest — between seven and nine hours a day. Exercise in the fresh air from time to time and breathe.

2. Hydrate daily

Sometimes the simplest actions give you the greatest benefits. Hydrating your entire body by drinking eight glasses of water daily is another cool way to moisturize your precious skin. Add lemons and other fruit to make your daily drinks even more refreshing. If plain water is boring, try adding cucumbers as well. Water clears out the dangerous toxins that hurt your skin.

3. Check your skin for spots and blemishes

Since November is National Healthy Skin Month, winter is an especially good time to check yourself carefully for spots with unusual shapes or colors that might indicate skin cancer. Look for moles that seem to appear. People with darker complexions aren't exempt from skin cancer. Although skin irregularities are not often apparent on darker skin, people of ethnic backgrounds tend to die more often from skin cancer.

4 FACTS THAT GIVE YOU "THE SKINNY" ON YOUR SKIN

- 1. Here's the thick and thin of it Did you know that your feet are padded with the thickest skin on your body and your eyelids have the thinnest?
- 2. You shed Some sources say that just like our dogs and cats, almost half of the dust we shed in our home is dead skin.
- 3. We renew monthly. Just like clockwork, our skin renews itself every 28 days.
- 4. Pay attention to your skin Skin changes may indicate health changes.

WHY NATIONAL HEALTHY SKIN MONTH IS IMPORTANT

- 1. Skin problems impact everybody At some point in our lives, we all have trouble with our skin. National Healthy Skin Month lets us review the common problems and some of the treatments. For example, eight out of 10 Americans suffer with acne at some point in their lives. Acne is a skin disorder that causes pimples to form blackheads or whiteheads from clogged passageways between your oil glands and your skin's pores. Other skin problems include eczema, dermatitis, and psoriasis.
- 2. Skin cancer inspired National Healthy Skin Month Skin cancer, the most common form of cancer, affects almost 20 percent of the population. For this reason, the American Academy of Dermatology remains committed to informing the public about the danger skin cancer presents. The two most common forms of skin cancer are squamous cell carcinoma and basal cell carcinoma. However, the majority of skin cancer-related deaths are due to melanoma.
- **3. Apply sunscreen all year long** Sunscreen is a powerful weapon against skin cancer. Without sunscreen, those pesky ultraviolet rays can do irreparable damage to your skin. Apply your sunscreen even during the winter months. It's recommended that you use an SPF 30 daily in any kind of weather. It also protects against aging and as the commercials put it, "the ravages of time."




October was Fire Safety Month and Black Hawk students enjoyed a trip to the fire station.



STATE TESTING

ACT Plus Writing---All Juniors

Black Hawk students in grade 11 will take the ACT with writing® which includes Reading, Math, English, Science, and Writing. The ACT is an in-person assessment that will be administered at school.

Save the date for March 12th or March 26th, 2024 (We can now choose between these two dates, if we take the later date the Make-up window will be on April 9) We will be making the decision by January so students can plan accordingly.

PreACT—All Freshman and Sophomores

The PreACT is a summative assessment that measures what students have learned in the areas of: English, Reading, Math, and Science. The PreACT is an online assessment that may help to predict how a student will perform on the ACT when they reach 11th grade and their readiness for college-level coursework.

March 18th-April 26th-Dates will be finalized by February

Forward Exam Testing Window

The Forward Exam is designed to gauge how well students are doing in relation to the Wisconsin Academic Standards. These standards outline what students should know and be able to do in order to be college and career ready. The Forward Exam is administered online in the spring of each school year at:

- grades 3-8 in English Language Arts (ELA) and mathematics,
 - grades 4 and 8 in Science and,
 - grades 4, 8, and 10 in Social Studies.

The Warrior Backpack program served 215 food bags and 158 snacks to students in the month of September. Thank you to all the volunteers who helped make this happen for our school!!



Riding The School Bus

If you are relying on the Black Hawk School District for transportation to and from school, it is imperative that you understand the expectations and rules that go along with being on our school buses. Failure to comply with the following directives, **WILL** result in removal from the bus route. Transportation from school is not a given, and a school district does not have to provide transportation for students. It is so important that you go over these bus rules with your children before the first day of school. **We do have functioning** cameras on each of our buses.

- 1. Be at your designated bus stop pick-up on time. It is the responsibility of the family to be ready to get on the bus. Our drivers cannot sit and wait. Please have your student ready to board the bus 10 minutes prior to expected pick up time. The student(s) should be visible to the drivers as they approach the pick up location.
- 2. Food and beverages will NOT be allowed on the school bus.
- 3. Students are assigned to a specific seat by grade level. If an older sibling is desired to sit with a 4K or 5K student, parents should notify the school upon receiving the seating chart for your bus. Students must absolutely remain seated during the bus ride. There will be no changing or jumping of seats on the school bus.
- 4. During the trip, each student shall:
 - Remain seated while the bus is in motion;
 - Keep head, hands, arms, and legs inside the bus at all times;
 - Not litter in the bus or throw any object from the bus;
 - Be courteous to the driver and other adult riders
 - Not eat or drink beverages on the bus
 - Not tamper with the bus, seats, or any of its equipment
- 5. Students are subject to the Black Hawk Schools Code of Conduct and Step System. Acts of harassment, bullying, vulgar language, abuse will result in students being referred to the building principal for behavioral consequences and plans. Studentsmay be suspended or expelled from bus routes for consistent misbehavior.

1st notice - Family contact, review of expectations.

Progressive discipline system if school violations occur on the bus.

2nd notice - Temporary suspension from bus route for up to 2 school days.

3rd notice - Temporary suspension from bus route for up to 5 school days.

4th notice - Temporary suspension from bus route for up to 10 school days.

5th notice - Removal from bus route.

Black Hawk Family Meal Accounts - Helpful Reminders:

Automated calls go out every Thursday, one call to families that have \$5 or less remaining in their account, and another call for family accounts that are negative.

You can check your family meal account balance on Skyward Family Access, or by calling or visiting the school office. Payments can be made to the office by cash or check, or don't forget about online payments through the Revtrak Online Payments link on the school website.

Applications for Free or Reduced pricing can be completed anytime throughout the school year. If your financial situation has changed & you are looking for assistance, forms & instructions can be found on the school website, or by asking the school office.

If your account is negative, and you are unable to send in lunch money at this time, please send your children with a cold lunch from home. Families are supposed to stay in a positive balance & staff do not want to turn away any children in the cafeteria line.

If you are a community member and would like to help families in need, you can make donations to Black Hawk Schools, to be applied to negative family accounts.



School District of Black Hawk Student School Drop Off and Pick Up Procedure

Changes Due To Construction

As we begin the excitement of a new school year at Black Hawk and the new remodeling and additions that are being added to our school, we will need to adjust some of the changes to our drop-off and pick-up routines here at the school. Our parking lot will be completely inaccessible to students and visitors at the beginning of this school year.

- 1. We have two entrances to the school building in the morning and two exits from the building in the afternoon. Door 2 (E. Center Street) and Door 5 (N. Division Street).
- 2. The school parking lot is not accessible for entrance or parking.
- 3. Door 2 and 5 will open at 7:45 a.m. If you drop students prior to 7:50 a.m., please make this a prudent drop-off. Our buses will be pulling into E.Center Street for a 7:50 a.m. drop.
- 4. Students who drive to school must park in the gravel parking lot, west of the Meske Center, where the old baseball diamond was located.



- 5. High school students MUST park in the student parking area if driving to school. You will not be allowed to park off school grounds. School consequences will be invoked for those who do not follow this expectation, including the extreme of banishment from driving/trespassing violations for repeat offenders who refuse to follow this procedure. High school students who drive, will enter the building at Door 2.
- 6. Buses will drop off students on East Center Street at Door 2, around 7:50 a.m. Persons dropping students off at school must adhere to state and local traffic laws involving school buses. School buses have priority to East Center Street during drop off and pick up times. Please respect the amber and red lights of the school buses. Do not enter into this area when the bus lights are on and students are being dropped off and picked up. The area in front of Door 2, should be clear of buses around 7:55 a.m.
- 7. Once buses have cleared, students may be dropped off on East Center Street at Door 2.
- 8. Additionally, students may be dropped off on N. Division Street at Door 5 on the **near end (east end of the street)**, **adjacent to the school building**. We would like to avoid students having to cross the street on Division Street. We kindly ask that cars do not permanently park on N. Division Street, taking up space. We ask that individuals do a quick drop of students and then maneuver off of Division Street to make room for additional vehicles who are

- dropping off students.
- 9. 4K,5K, 5th and MS/HS school students will enter and exit the building at Door 2.
- 10. 1st 4th grades will enter and exit the building at Door 5.
- 11. Visitors to the school during the instructional day (8:05 a.m. 3:26 p.m.) will need to park in the gravel parking lot, or find temporary parking off of school grounds.
- 12. Families picking up students after school must NOT park in the bus area of E. Center Street in front of Doors 2 and 3. You may be allowed to temporarily park on Division Street to pick up your student(s) at Door 5. Please adhere to the village parking restrictions in front of the fire station. Fire trucks need to be able to access Division street in emergencies.
- 13. Staff are not allowed to park on Division Street or in the bus drop off area of E. Center Street. Staff will need to find parking off school grounds or in the gravel parking lot.
- 14. Small deliveries will be made at Door 5. Large deliveries will be determined.
- If there are changes to your child's bus schedule, please provide a note with your children for both their classroom teacher and the bus driver. If a permanent adjustment is needed, we will require one notification at the beginning of the school year. Otherwise, notification is required in writing every time your child needs to ride a bus to a location after school.
- The district will not adjust our bus driver's regular routes to make special stops for student drop off.
- We respectfully ask that you be sensitive to your child's peers when scheduling birthday parties, or other friend gatherings at your home. Large parties of children riding a non-scheduled bus will not be permitted. Please don't send invitations or letters with your child to hand out at school to their friends. This creates an unpleasant environment for some children, and is a major distraction to our instructional objectives of the day.
- No student will be able to ride an unscheduled bus route without a permission slip.

We greatly appreciate your assistance in providing a safe and positive atmosphere at Black Hawk Schools.

Visitors During School Day / Parent Pick-Up Procedures

- Door 5 will be the entrance to the school building during the school day. Visitors to the building will have to buzz in at Door 5 for screening. When admitted to the school building, we ask that you transition directly to the school office to sign in.
- Please do not transition directly to your child's classroom and interrupt the instructional process. Please do not linger in the hallways. Proceed directly to the office.
- We respectfully ask that parents/guardians please report to the office to sign your elementary child in or out of the building during instructional hours (8:05 a.m. 3:24 p.m.). MS/HS students can sign themselves out in the office and meet authorized individuals outside of the building.
- Teachers will begin getting Ech 5K students ready for bus departure and parent pick-up at 3:15 p.m. 1st grade through 5th grade students will begin preparing for bus departure and parent pick-up at 3:20 p.m.
- We ask that parents who are picking their children up from school, meet their children at the south end
 of the building on <u>East Center Street at Door 2</u>., and escort them to your vehicle. If picking up at Door 5,
 please park on the school side of the street (East), to avoid students having to cross the road.
- Be visible so your child sees you as they exit the building.
- Please avoid coming into the school to pick up your child, unless it is absolutely necessary. The purpose of this request is to avoid hallway clutter and maintain safety at the end of a school day.

Recycling and Other Dumpsters

(Dumpsters are located next to Riechers Meats)

- Please do not place items with Freon/coolant in the recycling dumpster

- Please do not place trash in the recycling dumpster
- The other dumpsters (serviced by Faherty) are for school uses only

We do appreciate the donations. Improper use of the dumpsters costs the district and may result in a net loss.

School District of Black Hawk Regular Meeting September 13, 2023



The School Board meeting of the School District of Black Hawk was called to order at 6:00 pm in the FAB Room By President Dee Paulson. The following members were present: Kerry Holland, Jim Baumgartner, Dee Paulson, Mindy Stauffacher, Clayton Ruegsegger, Val Dunlavey and Jason Figi. Also present was Administration of Willy Chambers and Cory Milz, Bookkeeper Tammy Zimmerman and Guest.

Motion by Figi and seconded by Holland to consent to agenda which includes the August 9, 2023 minutes with the following changes to the teacher's settlement for 2023-24 that includes steps and lanes for those who qualify and remove vacation day payout and also support staff the following changes for 2023-24 and also included steps for those who qualify. The motion carried on a voice vote.

CHAMBERS: The General Fund investments the district has made using the services provided by PMA between the dates of April 20 and August 31, 2023, have made \$17,205.42 for the district. Thank you to Mrs. Dunlavey for pushing for the district to look at options for investments.

The most recent statement for the investment through PMA is attached. The statement includes the totals for the General Fund investments, the BCPL Loan investments, the bonds from the referendum, and a refunding account which is part of the original bond investment.

- The BCPL loan has been officially refinanced for 20 years at a 5.25%. We have the amortization schedule in hand as well.
- · Also please know that the district has paid out about \$459,000 out of proceeds towards project expenses.

Mrs. Kaster wrote a grant and received \$5,607 to use for opioid prevention. The notification letter from the DPI is attached.

I have not done anything with bus 60 yet. We did need it for the shuttle route on one occasion. Bus 65 had a leak and a part that was needed took a couple of days to come in.

The cross country co-op is on the agenda and we will talk about the concept at that time. We have some time to get a better handle on the golf co-op and would like to get further information before making that an action item for the Board. Mr. Ercikson indicated based on initial feelers that there is real interest in golf.

ERICKSON: The first month of fall sports is under our belts. The coaches have done a great job of staying positive and helping the student/athletes grow in their respective sports.

We have 14 girls participating in MS Volleyball - we do have some 8th graders rotate in with the 7th. The number of girls playing does create a little concern for the future.

We have 16 boys from BH participating in MS Football - that coop is overseen by Warren. Eight of the boys are 8th graders and make up the majority of the 8th-grade boys.

The high school football teams have been successful. The JV team lost a contest because Parkview/Albany was unable to field a JV team. There are several teams that have created similar scenarios for varsity teams in the area. I am currently working to fill our week 2 of the 24 and 25 seasons. Otherwise, we have those schedules complete. Next year we move to the Ridge and Valley football conference.

I attended the Six Rivers Conference AD meeting which was a large gathering. Many of the other football schools were in attendance. In 2024 the football-only conferences begin and the Six Rivers will be divided into a couple of different groups. As stated, BH/Warren will be in the Ridge and Valley Conference along with Potosi/Cassville, Boscobel, Wauzeka-Steuben/Seneca, Iowa Grant, Pec/Argyle, Riverdale, and Madison Abundant Life. Most of the discussion revolved around scheduling and an individual "sportsmanship" award in each sport.

Our workers have been great although I would like to get a few more in the pipeline to have some subs available.

I had a discussion with Pec and Argyle about cooperatives in several sports. The dates to approve coops are

Fall Sports - October 1--Winter Sports - February 1 -- Spring Sports - May 1

The particular interest that we have had involves golf, cross country, and our existing spring sports.

My conclusion is that there is interest in the MS level for CC but not a lot at the HS level. I would recommend that we try to get a MS CC team started in the fall of 2024. Then we can see how the interest sticks.

There is considerable interest in boys' golf. The ADs from both schools were open to having kids play JV this year but we would need to work out details. I communicated with the coach from Argyle/Pec today and he gave me more insight. He is very open to having more kids involved. There are only 5 boys who play varsity and 5 that play junior varsity for each match. Fees are split by the schools and include a course usage fee at Yellowstone where they practice and host a tournament. The biggest conversation that I think Black Hawk needs to have is how we will transport kids who are interested.
