


All of Mr. Polansky's Freshman Honors World History classes participate in a "Caste System Simulation" of ancient India. They pick their caste a day before to see their "fate" for how to participate during the next class.

The higher castes dictate the duties for the lower castes, and all have roles to play. It is a VALUABLE learning experience as students will learn about social inequities. The activity lasts from the beginning of the day until 2:25 pm.

"High Schoolers Learn about the World"

BaFaBaFa is the activity being shown. Half the students are in one classroom and the other half are across the hall in another. Each group is given a "culture" with norms, values and unique nomenclature. Students then trade classrooms as if they were an anthropologist trying to discover the intricacies of another society. After a student makes three "mistakes," they are sent back to their original culture where they can debrief and get closer to mastering the other culture. Each time a new student goes over, they discover something and inch closer to assimilating into a new society.


Elementary special education teachers are utilizing a new reading program this year. Piloted last year and in full force at all 4 elementary buildings for the 2023-2024 school year, students are being taught using Fundations. "Fundations uses a structured literacy approach based in the science of reading to make learning to read fun while also laying the groundwork for lifelong literacy. The program's research-based approach and rich materials allow K-3 teachers to confidently teach a structured reading, spelling, and handwriting curriculum using engaging, multisensory techniques.



Fundations is aligned with the science of reading and guides teachers to provide effective instructional practices". According to the Fundations material: "students receive a systematic program in critical foundational skills emphasizing: print concepts, letter formation, phonological and phonemic awareness, sound mastery, phonics/word study/advanced word study, tricky words (high frequency word) instruction, vocabulary, accuracy, automaticity/fluency, comprehension strategies, handwriting, and spelling." FLEXIBLE INSTRUCTION DAYS

The Trinity Area School District has been approved to utilize Flexible Instruction Days (FIDs). Trinity will move to remote instruction when schools are closed due to weather or other concerns. It is no longer a necessity to cancel instruction for weather or facility related issues. When a FID is announced, teachers will teach from home and students will learn remotely from home. If it becomes necessary to cancel in-person school, staff, parents, guardians, and students will receive notification via the Skylert System, local television, and radio sources. On FIDs the students will log onto their **Chromebooks and attend school remotely as they** have done during closures for the pandemic. Staff, parents/guardians, and students need to be prepared for short-term or sporadic closures due to weather related issues. Students should have their Chromebooks available daily at school and at home. Staff and students must be prepared to work from home at all times.
