Inflation vs Escalation

- In the Construction Industry, as with most other industries, there is an anticipated increase in the cost of materials and labor.
- We know that construction costs were lower 10 years ago and will be higher 10 years from now.
- The price of construction has risen sharply in recent years due to labor shortages and supply chain issues caused by the pandemic and other world incidents.
- Cost escalations are changes in the cost of specific goods in a given economy over a period of time.
 - For example, while the average inflation rate in 2022 was 8%, escalations in certain materials such as roofing and electrical components were much higher.

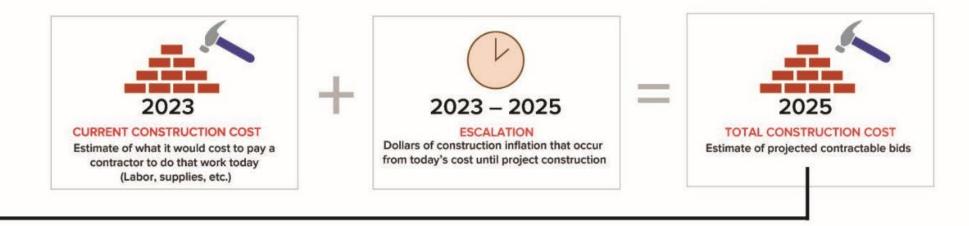

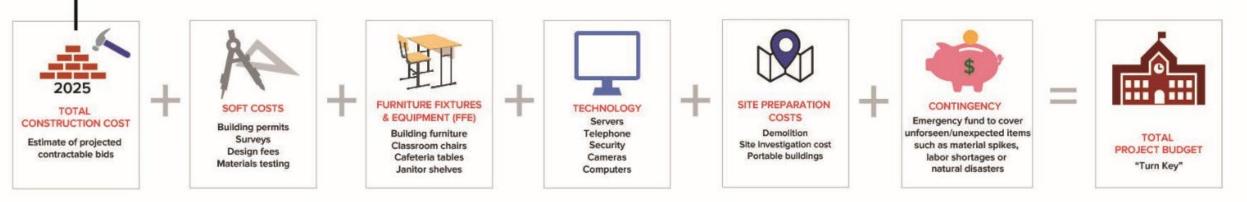
Pleasant View Elementary was completed in 2022 with 2021 Bond funds.

Budget vs Actual

- Budgets are based on historical data, both nationally and locally.
 - Goals for budgets are to be conservative in order to adapt to the unknown and to include an appropriate amount of contingency to be flexible to respond to the unknown.
- · Projects are competitively bid by multiple contractors.
 - Contractors are motivated to bid as low (but as realistic) as they can to win the job.
 - If actual costs are lower, it is a budget surplus to the district that they can either put toward other projects, realize as savings, or use to pay down existing debt.
 - If the actual costs are higher, the project may be redesigned to meet the budget, or contingency funds may be applied to the project.
- The Architect and the Contractor work under the direction of GISD.

Build-a-Bond

- If aiming toward Moderate Growth Scenario and growth exceeds this scenario:
 - Escalation costs should be less than budgeted.
 - Another bond election will be needed sooner to address growth.
- If aiming toward High Growth Scenario and growth is less than this scenario:
 - Buildings will not be built until they are needed.
 - Escalation costs could be more than budgeted.
