Benefits of Native Plantings



Need little maintenance, once they're established

Need less water

Don't need fertilizers

Preserve biodiversity

Prevent flooding: soil & roots absorb rainwater

Support pollinators

Native Plants grow naturally in an area in which they evolved. Local animals and insects depend on these plants for food and shelter.

Many of the landscaping plants available in nurseries are alien species from other countries. These outcompete native species and degrade the habitat.

- Student feedback


- Gardens help students learn that food is not from supermarkets


