#### **CSDA Happenings**

**Grade 4:** Fourth graders are finishing up both their social studies projects on the Abenaki tribe and their science projects on animal adaptations. The students are presenting their projects to their classmates.

**Grade 5:** Fifth grade students have presented their Native American Scrapbook projects and will start their learning of exploration of North America. Students have also been conferencing with their teachers on their personal narratives.

**Grade 6:** Sixth graders continue to work toward an understanding of meteorology which will lead to their practicing of weather forecasting. They are also making their way through their personal narrative edits with grammar review and attention to important details in writing.

**CSDA Unified Arts:** In the library, students continue listening to and discussing the read-aloud. They will also begin learning about physical and digital encyclopedias and how they are a great place to start a research project.

#### **RMMS Happenings**

**Pre-K:** Next week, preschoolers will begin a unit on nocturnal animals. They will read about bats, owls, frogs, spiders, and raccoons. They will also have fun building a bat cave.

**Grade K:** Students will be wrapping up a unit titled, 'We Are Readers!' Classes learned how to look at the pictures, remember the story, and then tell it in their own words using transition words. They have worked hard to match words and pictures as they read as the characters.

**Grade 1:** First graders will be wrapping up their small moments stories and are excited to begin learning about opinion writing. In Fundations, they are working on glued sounds -all, -an, & -am.

**Grade 2:** Second graders are becoming experts in nonfiction! Next week, they will learn how to write nonfiction books. In math, they will begin adding two-digit numbers within 100 using number lines. In social studies, they will begin a Native American unit.

**Grade 3:** Students are practicing opinion writing and shifting to a nonfiction focus in reading. In math, they are finishing up learning and testing their multiplication facts and properties. In social studies, classes are learning about American symbols as part of their heritage unit.

**RMMS Unified Arts:** In art, students are learning about the color wheel. Kindergarten and first grade students are being introduced to this. Second and third grade artists are learning to mix the secondary colors by using only primary color paints.

#### **ECZEMA AWARENESS**

Eczema is a condition where your skin becomes dry and itchy too easily, leading to allergies and inflammation. Atopic dermatitis (AD) is the most common type of eczema. "Atopic" means the tendency to develop allergies. "Dermatitis" means inflammation of the skin. Fall weather can mean more challenges in managing eczema. More info:

#### **Daylight Savings Time - Fall Back**



When the clocks move backward on Nov 5th some children may have a sleep disruption. They may be overtired or more stimulated at bedtime and can be dysregulated. They may have a harder time sleeping. This can mean shorter attention spans in school, lower frustration tolerance, and general irritability at home.

- To prepare for the "fall back," you can move your child's bedtime gradually later (about 15 min each night) a few days prior so that they feel ready for sleep once the clocks change.
- Without any action, the effects of the change usually resolve within a week or two.

#### **COVID-19 - CORNER**

What should we do if we test positive for COVID?

Contact the school nurse. Follow the CDC Guidelines for Isolation. Symptom start date or test positive date is Day Zero. Days 1 - 5 Isolate at home. If no fever and symptoms have improved wear a well-fitting mask on return to school from Days 6-10. The school nurse will provide you with the return to school date and recommendations at school.

What should we do if someone in the household tests positive?

Contact the school nurse. Follow the CDC Guidelines for exposure to COVID Start wearing a well fitting mask for 10 days from exposure. If you have any symptoms, test for COVID right away. If no symptoms,do a home COVID test on Day 6. If negative, continue wearing a mask through day 10. If positive, follow the Isolation guidelines. The school nurse will provide you with the recommendations for school.

#### What symptoms should I look for?

Symptoms may range from mild to severe and may appear 2-14 days after exposure to the virus. Anyone can have mild to severe symptoms. Possible symptoms include: Sore throat, Congestion or runny nose, Cough, Fatigue, Muscle or body aches, Headache, Fever or chills, New loss of taste or smell, Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, Nausea or vomiting, Diarrhea
