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History of Summit —

Rockwood Summit High School opened its doors to freshman and sophomore students during the 1993-94 school year. During 1994-95, Summit added a third class and graduated its first class of seniors in 1996. Before Summit opened, Rockwood students in the Fenton area attended Eureka High School. Summit was built to hold 1500 students.

William B. Ittner designed the original 225,000 square foot building on the 66 acre site purchased with Bond Issue funds from the 1991 election. Summit was built during a time of rapid growth in the Rockwood School District and opened the same year as Marquette High School, bringing Rockwood from two to four high schools in one year. Dr. Dennis L. Peterson was superintendent at the time the building opened. Finances were tight in 1993. Summit and Marguette were built with cost-saving measures such as combining the theater and the Commons. The theater, art classrooms, drama room, and lobby were built with Bond Issue funds in 1998 and opened in May 2000. The current library and classrooms opened in 2010, and the expanded varsity locker rooms and new weight room opened in 2011. The library and weight room construction was funded with Bond Issue funds from the 2008 election. In 2015, we added turf fields, and in 2018, remodeled our science classrooms

Tom Hensley was the first principal of Rockwood Summit. He opened the building with a studentcentered philosophy that still pervades the campus today. The school colors, maroon and black with silver accent, and the school mascot, the Falcons, were chosen by committee prior to the opening of school. Summit's first Vision Statement was "Rockwood Summit High School provides our school community the desire, skills, and vision necessary to fulfill lifelong dreams."





The theme "Building a Tradition of Excellence" guided the work in the early years. The School Song was adopted in 2002. The current Vision Statement "One Summit. One Legacy. Inspiring Excellence." and Mission Statement "Working together to create opportunities for students to thrive" were written in 2015.

Summit continues to "Build on a Tradition of Excellence." Rockwood Summit prides itself as a college prep school with a focus on academics. Summit continues to focus on keeping doors of opportunity open for students upon graduation. Summit also encourages enrollment in challenging courses, keeping enrollment in AP courses open to all students. Newsweek magazine has recognized Summit as one of America's Best High Schools in the nation. Newsweek rankings are based on graduation rate, college matriculation rate, AP tests taken per student, average SAT/ACT scores, average AP scores, and AP courses offered per student.

Our school sets itself apart by providing authentic learning experiences for our students. In 2014, we opened the Monsanto Education Center for Sustainable Solutions for our students to learn how to create biofuels from plants and vegetable oil. Our radio station, RS Radio The Summit, took to the airwaves to become KFTN 92.7 in 2015. Our teachers continue to innovate their practices to provide authentic experiences to inspire our students.

History of Summit

The education of Summit students continues beyond the classroom walls. Students hone their skills by participating in 23 sports and/or 30+ extracurricular activities this year. Summit athletic teams hold fifteen state championships including softball (1998, 2006), baseball (2012), girls soccer (2018), girls lacrosse (2019), boys soccer (2016, 2019), boys track and field (2017), boys lacrosse (2012), cheerleading (2015), and dance team (2011, 2013, 2021, 2022). Individual athletes in swimming, track, wrestling, and golf also hold state titles and represent our school on All-State teams. Our award-winning music programs are held in high regard. The Silver Falcon Marching Band continuously places at the top of state competitions and holds a place on the national stage. The Concert Band and Symphonic Band continuously receive the highest rating awards at the state festival. The Summit Choral program involves over 150 students within five choirs. The Symphonic and Chamber Orchestras continually receive Superior and Excellent ratings at state competitions. Individual musicians from band, choir, and orchestra represent Summit as champions every year at Missouri state festivals. Rockwood Summit's journalism publications, the Talon (newspaper) and the Pinnacle (yearbook) also receive numerous national awards each year.

Summit is a true "community" school with numerous traditions that showcase the pride and spirit of our students, staff, and parents. Our students and staff take great care of each other at Rockwood Summit. One Summit. One Legacy. Inspiring Excellence.





Alumni Association

The Rockwood Summit Alumni Association was established in 2013 to create a connection between our growing alumni and our school. Initially, the organization focused on fundraising for scholarships and creating the Alumni Hall of Fame. Since that time, the RSAA has added fundraisers and scholarships.

Currently, we are working to increase our alumni involvement by improving communication and event planning. Ultimately, we want to do more for our alumni, school and community.

Cumulative Grades:

Student semester grades are determined based on overall student performance during the entire 18-19 week semester. End of course will vary. Same courses will end the semester with a cumulative assessment while others may end with a unit assessment, project, or portfolio.

Class Status:

Students need 6 credits to reach sophomore class status, 12 credits to reach junior class status, and 18 credits to reach senior class status.

Progress Reports:

Parents will be encouraged to check their childs progress grades every 6 weeks, grades are updated regularly in Infinite Campus.

"Accum":

The accumulated average of semester grades earned in grade 9 through the end of the last semester completed.

Schedule Changes:

All schedule change requests must be made by the 3rd day of the first semester. All level change requests (for example: moving from Honors Chemistry to Regular Chemistry or moving from US History to Honors US History) must be made by the 3rd day of the first semester. Please reach out to your counselor if you have any questions regarding your schedule.

Withdraw Pass/Withdraw Fail:

The semester grades to be assigned when a student withdraws from a class will be determined as follows.

- 1st 20 days of a semester: No grade
- 21-60 days of a semester: WP or WF

- After 60 days but prior to the completion of the semester: F





Academic Lab

What is Academic Lab?

Academic Lab is an opportunity during the school day in which students will have time to receive tutoring, make-up assessments or missed work, attend club meetings, and choose from a variety of offered activities. AcLab is designed to allow students to have a choice in how to best achieve academic success and enrichment. AcLab will consist of 2 sessions.

AcLab Focus

- Use AcLab for academic support
- Manage time to meet individual needs
- Opportunity to get specific help from teachers
- Quiet space for students to study, work on coursework
- Opportunity to make up tests/quizzes

Student Responsibilities:

- Planning own schedule
- Prioritize academic needs
- Report to teachers when requested
- · Communicate with teachers in the event of conflicts
- Be in a classroom, library, or testing room
- Stay in location until dismissal for the next block
- Follow all school rules

Academic Opportunities

The recommendation is for students to seek out and obtain academic support through teacher-led coursebased help sessions and open office hours.

- -Quiet rooms for studying or reading
- -A+ tutoring and peer tutoring sessions
- -Class make-up sessions

-Testing in Room 220 for make-ups, retakes, or extended time

Post High School Opportunities

Students will be able to seek out and obtain post high school support and opportunities. Post High School opportunities will include:

-Meet with Post High School counselor

-Meet with recruiters (college, military, tech/trade school)

-Obtain assistance with the college application process -SAT/ACT test prep

Counseling Opportunities

Students will be able to meet with their school counselor, school social worker, and support groups for academic advising and emotional well-being.

Library Opportunities

The Library will be available to all students and will provide a wide array of resources and services. Students will only be able to utilize the main area of the library. Students must contribute to an academic environment conducive to reading, studying, and working on assignments and projects. Students can seek assistance in finding library materials and information related to their academic and/or personal interests.

Extracurricular Involvement Opportunities

Club sponsors may use an AcLab session for their club to meet. Students should check the weekly announcements to know when and where the club may be meeting. Club meetings during AcLab are optional. If students feel attending a teacher tutoring session or in need of independent study time would be a more beneficial use of this time, they do not have to attend the meeting but should reach out to the sponsor to notify them of their decision.

Loss of AcLab Privileges

Students are expected to follow all school rules during AcLab. Students who demonstrate the inability to do so will be assigned to a supervised structured environment for a length of time to be determined by an administrator. Personal electronics will be surrendered to the supervisor upon arrival. Students will not be permitted to socialize during this time.



Graduation Requirements

Periodically throughout the school year, students will receive credit letters that explain their specific graduation requirements. If you have any questions, contact your guidance counselor.





Founded in 1988 in Conway, South Carolina, Renaissance is a powerful, innovative program designed to promote and recognize academic achievement in schools across the country. It is a process, a comprehensive change in attitude, and an entirely new way of thinking that brings about academic achievement to the forefront in schools.

The Renaissance program was established at Rockwood Summit High School during the 1994-1995 school year to acknowledge the educational achievements and outstanding contributions of the students, staff members, and school patrons through a process of reinforcement, recognition, and reward. It works cooperatively with the business community to provide incentives for academic excellence. Rockwood Summit has earned the prestigious recognition as a national model Renaissance School due the outstanding programs and support from the staff, community and sponsorship partners. The recognition programs at Rockwood Summit reinforce the belief held by all staff members that all students can learn and achieve their lifelong dreams.

The mission of the Renaissance Program at Rockwood Summit is to make an investment in the long-term success of our students. Recognition is the cornerstone of the Renaissance Program as we showcase academic achievements of Rockwood Summit students, recognize outstanding professional performance from our staff and promote the outstanding accomplishments of the school within the Fenton Community.



Academic Excellence Program

Students will be awarded for academic achievement on the basis of the previous semester's established grade point average. Students must earn a grade point average of 3.0 or better. Students who meet the criteria will receive a treat to celebrate their success.

Student of the Month Program

Each month, 2 students from each grade level are chosen as a student of the month from student and staff nominations to the selection committee.

Teacher of the Year Program

Each year, teachers nominate peers to be recognized as Teacher of the Year. From those nominated, teachers vote for the teacher of the year. The teacher of the year receives a special parking place at RSHS and serves as Rockwood Summit's Teacher of the Year Nominee at the District and State competition.



Falcon Flight Award

Falcon Flight is a prestigious award given to an individual student nominated by a Summit Staff member. Every staff member is eligible to nominate a student based on their own criterion for recognizing excellence within an individual student or their excellent contributions to the Summit community.

Academic Pep Assembly

Each spring, an all school themed Academic Pep Assembly, choreographed by students and staff, celebrates academic excellence at Rockwood Summit. Students and Teachers achieving excellence in academic and music performance areas, staff members and students of the month and most improved students are recognized with fanfare and fun.

We encourage all students to become involved in one or more of our many activity offerings and to learn from the positive experiences available in our extracurricular program. Below is only a sampling of clubs offered at RSHS this year.

Art Attack

We are an all inclusive art club. We make arts and crafts of all kinds and have fun. We meet several times a month and you can choose to work on your own artwork or work on the activities I have planned. We welcome anyone and everyone.

Asian Affinity Club

Rockwood Summit Asian Affinity Network (AAN) promotes and provides education regarding the unity, culture and heritage of our Asian classmates, and participates in the wider effort to encourage multicultural awareness. We also aim to promote leadership development. AAN serves as a social network to help Asian classmates acclimate to the community through school-wide and public events. The Asian Affinity Network also provides a safe space to talk about mental health

Best Buddies

Best Buddies creates one-to-one friendships between students with and without intellectual/ other disabilities. Members have the opportunity to be a part of a buddy pair that commits to talk/ hang out once a week and spend time engaging in an activity with each other monthly. Students may also join as an "associate member" without committing to a one-to-one friendship. All members attend monthly chapter meetings at Summit including fun parties and events!

Biodiesel Club

Biodiesel Club meets Mondays after school and does several things to get more students involved in science. Students help produce biodiesel from the cafeteria's waste vegetable oil, produce soap from the waste glycerin associated with the biodiesel reaction, sell glycerin soap to various businesses in our community, help maintain our two diesel test vehicles and have a fun time doing it.

Coding Club

The Coding Club provides participating students an opportunity to learn the basics of computer programming in a team setting. The club's main focus is on creating applications, websites, games, stem/steam workshops, and other projects.

Educators Rising

This group is open to any Summit student considering a career in education. Work together with your peers to embrace the calling of teaching as a profession and to be an advocate for education. Work towards participating in competitions at the state conference in March.

Envirothon Club

FCA

Fellowship of Christian Athletes

This organization meets every other Tuesday evening for food, fellowship, and fun. This includes encouragement and support through biblical lessons for all athletes. FCA focuses on serving our athletes by equipping, empowering and encouraging students in their relationship with Christ.



FUSE (Bible Study)

FUSE club meets before school weekly and is a Christian Bible Study group that is open to everyone! Students begin the day with a positive message and learn to become campus leaders.

Garden Club

Plan, plant and maintain our campus native garden. Learn to grow plants from seed and propagate indoor plants. Work on campus beautification planting projects that will improve our natural spaces indoors and out.

Gateway Book Club

The Gateway Book Club is for readers! We meet once a month to discuss books and to celebrate reading. While members usually read the same title prior to each meeting, the group occasionally decides to read "books of choice" to present at the next meeting. We promote reading by sponsoring one Book Club Night each semester and a Barnes & Noble Book Fair once a year.

HOSA (Medical Club)

The mission of HOSA is to empower HOSA-Future Health Professionals to become leaders in the global health community through education, collaboration and experience. Students choose an event, prepare and compete in state-wide competition as well as engage in the community through service projects, volunteer opportunities and fundraisers for HOSA's National Service Project.

This is a club sport offered at Rockwood Summit. The club plays in the Mid States Hockey League. The season runs from November-February of the school year.

Key Club

Science Club

Silver Sparklers

The Sparklers are an inclusive spirit group for students who are interested in Cheerleading and Dance. The Sparklers perform in the fall and winter with the Varsity cheerleaders at select home football and basketball games, and other school events such as pep assemblies, state sendoffs, and other school spirit activities.

S.P.A.C.E. Cadets

Students Promoting Awareness into the Community Everywhere SPACE Cadets is committed to increasing awareness related to cancer, honoring cancer survivors, providing opportunities to remember those who lost the fight and raising money for cancer research and cancer oriented charitable organizations. The organization also raises money throughout the year and donates the proceeds to various local organizations including the American Heart Association. SPACE Cadets also focuses on doing stress relieving activities.

Speech & Debate

The Speech and Debate team offers opportunities to compete for our school in debate and other performance activities. Speech events include humorous and dramatic acting, radio broadcast, poetry reading, and more. Debate is a team or partner event with topics focusing on current issues. We compete with other area schools in three to five weekend tournaments. Students can earn trophies and awards and accumulate points from the National Forensics League.


Technology Devices

Tobacco and Imitation Tobacco Products


