CLASS HISTORY

In September, 1931, seven members of the class of 1951 started on the long journey of public school life. Richard Horn, Richard Oviatt, Don Rand, Henry Smolinski, Don Sobecki, Betty Starcher, and Grace Tieman, under the able direction of Miss Lillian Dando, were the members of the first class to use the newly constructed addition to the old building.

In the second grade we were with some of the class of 1950 with Miss Alice Davies as our teacher. While in her room we mimeographed our own paper, serving as reporters, editors, and print-

We spent our third year in the same room with the

same teacher.

Mrs. Margaret Brewster served as our fourth grade teacher. When Mr. Harold Schweisberger left to serve in the army, Mr. Bell acted as superintendent. Dorothy Stallard was an addition to our room. Our big project was selling seeds. Enough money was made to purchase a clock for the class room.

In the fifth grade we were divided with some having Mrs. Brewster again, and others went to Mrs. Florence Garman's room. Don Sobecki who left after the first grade to go to school in Cleveland came back to Richfield, and Sonia Andel also joined our group from Miles Avenue School. Mr. Glen Powell took Mr. Schweisberger's place as superintendent.

In the sixth grade Mrs. Garman served as our

teacher, with the class again being united. During this year we elected class officers and skipped recesses to prepare for our promotion to the second floor and junior high school. Allan Benson enrolled from Cleveland Garfield School.

In our first year upstairs with Miss Patricia Springer as our teacher, we had a wild and wooly time with a contest among the boys as to who stood in the hall the most. Don Sobecki and Allan Renson took top honors (?). The boys played on the newly formed junior high team and took second place in the junior high class tournaments.

Sonia Andel, valedictorian; Grace Tieman, president; and Mr. Leon Friedman, our class advisor, spoke at our eighth grade graduation ceremonies which were held in the afternoon in the auditorium with parents and friends attending.

In our Freshman Day program we gave sketches of our impressions of the teachers' classes. After this Dan Emmett, our class president, presented our blue and white banner which had been designed by Lee Herman.

The girls went through the honors of the Y-Teen iritiation. Eileen Caban joined our happy throng in this year.

In the tenth grade with Mr. Friedman still our class advisor, we gave a party for the high school students in the gym and decorated it as a barn.

The boys joined the Hi-Y this year and took first place in the intra-mural volley-ball tournament. The girls brought home the girls' basketball championship.

In our junior year our big project was the Junior Carnival, from which we made \$625. A cast of seven gave a one act play, "Don't Call Me Junior," besides the usual concessions.

We took the seniors on a trip to Columbus, Ohio, on April 6, 7, and 8.

We selected and received our rings early in our junior year. We were treated by the seniors to a banquet at Stouffer's Restaurant in Cleveland, May 20. After the banquet we took the seniors to the show, "Annie Get Your Gun."

The boys took first place inin both basketball and volleyball tournaments. Our advisor for this year was Mr. Oliver Ocasek.

In our senior year Grace Komer was added to our group. At the mid-vear Grace Tieman, who had enough credits to graduate, left and Bill Selby transferred from Bath. We selected our class flower and motto early in the year. We attended the Ice Follies, a class entertainment, at the Arena on January 24.

We presented our play "Room No. 13" on Friday and Saturday evenings, April 20 and 21, under the direction of Miss Virginia Hejduk our class advisor

On Wednesday, April 25, we carried out the traditional Senior Day with all stud-

ents teaching classes and Allan Benson presiding as superintendent.

The juniors took the seniors as their guests to Washington, D. C., on Saturday. April 28, and returned May 1.

Our final social affair, the Junior-Senior Banquet, was served at Mozena's, Saturday evening, May 19, at 7:00 P. M.

Baccalaureate services were conducted Sunday evening, May 20, at the Richfield Town Hall. Reverend John Huston, minister of the Richfield Federated Church, delivered the message. Don Mitton, Craig Richmond, Linda Sommers, and Carol Roller were our junior ushers.

William C. Craig, professor of speech at Wooster College gave the commencement address in the Richfield Auditorium on Friday, May 25. The salutatory address was given by Donald Rand, the valedictorian was Sonia Andel, and Dorothy Stallard, class president, presented the class gift to the school. Melvin H. Rand, president of the Board of Education, presented the diplomas to the boys, who wore summer tuxedos, and to the girls, who wore white formals. Blue and white carnations to match the class colors were presented to the members.

This commencement ended our formal high school education, but we go forth remembering our class motto "Not at the top but still climbing."




