Class History

In the year 1938 eight of the class of 1950 started the long road of education in Richfield. The bright little first graders attended classes in the three room portable that stood on the west side of the school. The beginners were Mary Hancock, Donna Kudrna, Joann Horn, Donna Muegge, Dorris Slater, Henry Vogel, Bruce Boston, and Donald Raines. Miss Inez Embrie was the teacher.

In the fall of the class's second year of school, its members moved into the main building, which was almost completed at that time. During the year Doris Dressler joined the class, coming from Portage Path School in Akron. The class was divided into two groups and placed under the direction of Miss Lillian Dando and Miss Alice Davis.

David Zeman was the addition to the class of '50 in the third year. He started school in Parma. Again the class was in two parts, this time the teachers being Miss Davies and Miss Barbara Shaeffer.

In the fourth grade, with Mrs. Shuey as our teacher, the class was once more together as a unit. At this time Kathleen Neillie and Edward Schall joined us, Kathleen having previously attended school in Independence and Ed in Wadsworth. Percy Horn, after an illness, became a member of the class in that year also.

Jeannette Hall, from Westlake, and Robert Norris, from Seiberling in Akron, became members of the class in its fifth year of existence. But again it was the class's fate to be separated, the instructors being Mrs. Margaret Brewster and Mrs. Esther Burkett, Mr. Vincent Bell became superintendent that year at Mr. Harold Schweisberger's induction into the army.

With the opening of our sixth year of school, the class was once more reunited, not to be separated again throughout our high school years. Mr. Glenn L. Powell became high school superintendent to fill Mr. Schweisberger's position during his three years' leave of absence. Judy Slingluff, from Bath, was the addition to our class that year.

With the entering of the seventh grade comes the thrill of "going upstairs". Mrs. Emily Miller was the home room teacher for the seventh year. Theda Babbitt, having come from Memorial School, and Roger Janis joined the class in that year.

Phyllis Kline, the only addition to the eighth grade, came from Boston School, Mr. Leon Friedman was our home room teacher. The highlight of that year was the graduation ceremony. the first eighth grade ceremony held at Richfield. Kathleen Neillie, who had placed first in the eighth grade tests, delivered the junior valedictory address. Donna Kudrna, class president, also spoke. Mr. Friedman and Mr. Powell addressed a few remarks to the class after we were presented with our diplomas and special awards. The graduation was held in the afternoon with parents and other students as guests.

During the early part of the freshman year the girls were initiated into the Y-Teens. Another event which is still clear in the class's memory was a group party held in Vogel's barn. The following spring the class collaborated to present the annual Freshman Day program. Following a selection of short skits, Ed Schall, class president, presented our green

and white banner, designed by David Zeman, to the high school. Mr. Oliver Ocasek was our freshman advisor, and Mr. Schweisberger returned to his position as high school principal.

Carol Gladwin and LeRoy Smith were the additions to the class in our sopho-The boys in more year. the class were initiated into the Hi-Y as permanent members. Mr. John Tilton was our class advisor for the first semester, but we had no regular advisor for the second semester as he was obliged to take Mr. John Steinert's place as advisor of another class. Our Mardi Gras entertained the high school on October 10, 1947.

We held our Junior Carnival on Saturday, November 6. The play, entitled "Are We Dressing?", with a cast of six, opened the evening's program. The class used the proceeds from the carnival when the junior and senior classes journeyed to Columbus for a three day trip on April 14, 15, and 16. We also took the seniors to the Hanna Theatre to see the musical, "Brigadoon," on March 16. On April 19 the class, accompanied by our advisor, Mr. Ocasek, saw the stage production Showboat". We were the guests of the senior class of '49 at a banquet held at the Richfield Smorgasbord which was followed by a dance in the school auditorium. Judy Slingluff was class president. Joyce Isaksen, from Collinwood High School, joined the class in our junior year. Theda Babbitt completed the required number of credits the following summer and did not return as a senior in the fall.

Bob Hardy, having spent two years in the Navy, joined the class of 1950 as we began our senior year with Miss Virginia Hejduk as advisor. On October 11, 1949 Bath and Richfield communities voted to consolidate the two high schools and a bond issue was passed later which provided for a new building. The first of the year was spent in planning for the eventful second semester. Our time was consumed with reading plays, having pictures taken, and beginning plans for the senior publication. On April 6, 7, and 8 we were the guests of the junior class on a trip to the state capitol.

"We Shook the Family Tree," the senior play, was presented to the public on April 28 and 29. May 5 was Senior Day with the seniors serving as teachers. David Zeman was principal.

The Junior-Senior banquet was served Saturday, May 20, at Stouffer's Restaurant in Cleveland. After the banquet the Juniors treated the Seniors to the movie "Annie Get Your Gun."

The Reverend Charles Spencer delivered our Baccalaureate message on Sunday evening, May 21, in the Town Hall.

On Friday, May 26, 1950 our high school career reached its completion as we received our diplomas from Mr. Melvin Rand, president of the Board of Education. At the evening exercises the class of 23 wore white formals and summer tuxedoes. Phyllis Kline and Kathleen Neillie, valedictorian and salutatorian respectively, delivered short messages. Ed Schall, class president, presented the class's gift to the school. Professor E. Turner of the University of Akron was the guest speaker. On this note the century class of Richfield High School becomes an entry in a record book, but in the memory of each member it will remain forever inscribed.

Class Prophecy

Miss Dressler is now starring in "We Shook the Family Tree" which Miss Gladwin directs. "We Shook the Family Tree," by the way, was the senior play given when the class graduated, so it seems very fitting.

Arriving almost behind them are Mr. Robert Hardy and Mr. LeRoy Smith. Mr. Hardy, you know, topped the list of the country's most eligible bachelors this year. He is now president of the National Bank, one of the youngest men to become president. Mr. Smith has recently been appointed to the post of ambassador to France.

Miss Mary Hancock, one of the most distinguished business women in the U.S. is next to arrive. Miss Hancock started as an airline hostess and is now the manager of the Capitol Airlines. Arriving with Miss Hancock are Joann Horn and Kathleen Neillie, the creators of the newest fashions in the world today. Also with them is Phyllis Kline who draws their marvelous creations for Vogue Magazine, which is now under the expert management of Miss Donna Muegge and Mrs. Robert Wilson (the former Dorris Slater).

Looking over the crowd, I spied the noted professor of Harvard University, Bruce Boston. It has been said that some of Professor Boston's theories surpass those of Albert Einstein.
