Class History

The second grade was in the same building with the same teacher. The only members of the present class who entered Richfield School in the second grade were Nancy Pecsok and Lewis Wagoner.

In the third grade the class was separated by putting part of the students under the supervision of Miss Alice Davey and the other half under the supervision of Miss

Barbara Schaffer.

For their fourth year the seniors were again separated. Mrs. Kathryn Shuey and Miss Schaffer were the teachers. This was the year the students started using the large play ground which was very muddy at the time, so not much playing was done, but the time was well spent in watching the work-

The seniors moved on to the next room under the supervision of Mrs. Esther Burkett for the fifth and sixth grades. In our fifth year we had Richard Ruck from Ceveland, Harold Schall from Wadsworth, and Audrey Stone from Shaker Heights join us.

The Public Address system was installed during our sixth year. Mr. Vincent Bell became superintendent that year when Mr. Harold Schweisberger was taken in-

to the army.

When the seniors were in the seventh grade, Mr. Glen L. Powell assumed the position of superintendent during Mr. Schweisberger's three year leave of absence. Mrs. Maurine Carr was our home room teacher. Charles Barnum was the only addition to our present class.

We were slowly preparing for our first year in high school in the eighth grade with Mrs. Florence Seese as our home room teacher.

The ninth grade brought about "Freshman Day" with the presentation of our banner and our class colors, blue and gold. Mr. Austin R. Keiser, minister at Bath and instructor of mathematics, was our homeroom teacher and class advisor.

Mr. John Tilton was our class advisor for the sophomore year. The class entertained the high school with a "Sweater Hop" on October

18.

Highlights of our junior year began with the Junior Carnival which was held on November 15. Proceeds from the Carnival were used to entertain the senior class of '48 at the Junior-Senior Banquet held at the "Canteen" in Cuyahoga Falls, followed by a movie, "Three Daring Daughters," at Loew's Theater in Akron on April 3. We a.so took the seniors as our guests to the Hanna Theater in Cleveland, April 24, to see "Blossom the stage show, Time."

Later in the year we went to see the stage show "The Red Mi.!" with Mr. Oliver Ocasek, class advisor. We were the guests of the seniors at their Prom in the school auditorium, May 1.






