
Commencement

Norma Rice


Norma, blond and blueeyed, is sometimes called "Salt" since her trip to Gettysburg.





Senior Class History

Senior Class Prophecy

September 16, 1972. Today, we returned to the ruins of Bath High School, which had been blown up by the Chemistry Class in an attempt to split an atom.

At the bottom of the heap of rubble, we found one of the steel files, which had been kept in the office by Mr. Pugh We pried it open, in the top drawer was a Hi-Spy dated March 24, 1967. In it was an article, written by Mr. Pugh which concerned his trip East of the autumn before. We will now reprint some of the valuable information extracted from this archive.

Apparently, Mr. Pugh had been on his way to New York to try out a new hair restorer, which had been invented by Charlie Squires, who was also a debate coach in the mental ward of Bellvue Hospital.
