When a bond issue that included the field hose was defeated in November 1978, the Revere Booster Club decided to build it themselves. Under the leadership and work of club president Dr. William Moats, they worked to raise over \$250,000. A majority of this was done through five major donations of \$25,000 (Mr. Russell Dancey, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hissong, Mr. Stanley Lojeck, and two anonymous donors). The booster club then appealed to the community for smaller donations—170 different local families, businesses, and organizations contributed to the project! As the results were promising; Dr. Moats, Reno Alessio, Dr. Alfred Magoline, Dr. John Weingart, and Dr. Thomas Kelly went to the bank and signed a note for the remaining amount needed with an interest rate at about seven percent. With Reno Alessio donating his time as the construction manager and the actual construction was done at a charitable cost by the Earnest Alessio Construction Company, the project was ready to begin.


On May 30, 1979 a groundbreaking ceremony was held for the new Revere Field House, work was complete on it by the Fall, and it was officially dedicated on October, 18, 1979. The new field house provided onsite locker rooms, heated concession stand, and permanent restrooms to the stadium.

With the state-of-the-art field house complete and being occupied, a financial crisis occurred for those that had signed for the bank loan. In the early 80s, the interest rates skyrocketed to 20 percent and the interest accumulated on the loan far beyond what the committee could raise. In order to repay the loan, the Revere Booster Club held their first Reverse Raffle, with a car donated by Bigelow Chevrolet as the grand prize.

In 1995, the field house received an addition—included a new football/baseball locker room, a new concession stand, expanded weight room, and a new trainers room.

In 2000, the field house was rededicated and named after <u>Dr. William E. Moats</u>. The honor was bestowed upon Dr. Moats after his longtime presence in the district—former standout athlete (football, basketball, baseball, and track), former Revere Booster Club President, and longtime team physician.

As an athlete, the 5'10 and 145 pound Bill "Willy" Moats earned one letter in track, three letters in football and baseball, and four letters in basketball before graduating in 1954. He attended Wooster College where he was a four year letterwinner (1955-1958) as a member of the baseball team. Dr. Moats served as a team physician from 1963 To 1999 In addition, he has been affiliated with Summa Health System since 1964. He has spoken and researched intensively on the topic of Sports Medicine. He also has served as the Medical Director of Akron City Hospital Sports Medicine, the Ohio Ballet, and for the Akron RoadRunner Marathon.



Boosters working at Revere

Fieldhouse funds are guaranteed

BATH — When the new fieldhouse for Revere High School is built, each student will have the opportunity to lean against his or her own brick. Adults may lay claim to a locker, a desk or even a commode.

Those who do will have been involved in a fund-raising campaign, sponsored by the school's booster club, to get the fieldhouse built.

Dr. William Moats, a member of the booster club and a member of the committe spearheading the fund drive, said the committee is asking area residents to donate specific amounts of money for specific purposes to get the fieldhouse.

THE OVERALL cost, he noted, will be about \$250,000. The fund drive already has netted \$160,000 and, Moats said, an Akron bank has guaranteed a loan for the rest while the drive continues.

Ground breaking is set for May 30.

The fieldhouse was part of a proposal put before the voters in November. Voters were asked to approve a 4.5-mill levy to fund a variety of projects. Voters rejected the hike in taxes by close to a twoto-one margin.

Joseph Pappano, head football coach and member of the boosters, said the club had talked about taking on the project even before the levy's defeat.

Moats said he knew nothing about fund-raising but he decided to talk with a successful man who did. The man asked to remain anonymous, Moats said, but he gave some advice.

"People will give rather than be taxed," Moats quoted his adviser. The novice fund-raiser said the advice was followed by a donation of \$25,000 and the campaign was off the ground.

TWO OTHER anonymous donors stepped forward and gave \$25,000 each, as did Stanley Lojek, owner of a truck dealership in Richfield which, like Bath, is in the Revere School District.

The rest of the money is coming from students, who are "buying" bricks at \$2 each, and from adults, who are working with the boosters.

Revere High to build new athletic facility

BATH — Revere High boosters are nearly ready to break ground for construction of a new athletic fieldhouse.

The building, which will cost \$250,000 and be paid for through private donations, will provide locker room space for boys and girls participating in outdoor sports. The facility is scheduled to be completed in August.

"We've been working on the project for about two years," said Revere High booster club president Bill Moats. "We're more than halfway there in donations. We should be breaking ground in two to three weeks."

Moats, former head football coach Fred Ost, current coach Joe Pappano and Fred Magoline have been the chief fund-raisers and directors of the booster club project.

"We've needed the facility with the addition of soccer and girls' sports," Ost said. "And it will benefit the football team and fans, too."

A CONCESSION stand will be included as part of the building along with public restrooms. The building will contain locker rooms, a training and medical room, a weightlifting room, equipment storage space and a meeting room.

Permission was granted by the Revere school board to build on the land between the football stadium and the high school. The Alessio Construction Co. is building the one-story project and Ernst Troike is the architect.

A fieldhouse had been included in a high school improvement bond issue which failed last November. That bond issue also included a natatorium, an all-weather track, new lighting for the football field, new locker rooms and tennis courts.

"When the bond issue failed, we went ahead with our plans," Moats said. "We felt we wanted to do something positive in the community in a time when all tax levies and bond issues seem to be going down the tubes."

Four donors helped the project with contributions of \$25,000 each. The landscaping for the 60-by-112foot facility is also being donated.

"We've received contributions from people with children in school and others who just live in the community," Ost said.


