

DEFINITION OF SPECIAL EDUCATION

What qualifies a child for an IEP in NJ IN GRADES K-12?

Children must meet two requirements to be eligible for an IEP: The child meets one or more of the 14 listed disabilities AND the disability affects the child's ability to learn without specialized instruction.

There must be an educational impact.

CLASSIFICATIONS

The disability adversely affects the student's educational performance, and the student is in need of special education and related services.

The following are the federal classification categories:

Auditory Impairment Autism

Intellectual disability Communication impairment

Emotional regulation impairment Multiple disabilities

Deaf/Blindness Orthopedic impairment

Other health impaired Preschool child with a disability

Social maladjustment Specific learning disability

Traumatic brain injury Visual impairment

HOW IS A PLACEMENT DECISION MADE:

The placement of students is an IEP team decision and several factors are considered, parents are an important part of the IEP team.

- Student's evaluations
- Parent input
- Teacher input
- Classroom observations
- Classroom data
- Least restrictive environment

Classification does not drive programming.

AUTISM PROGRAM

Our Autism classes are designed to meet the needs of our learners diagnosed with Autism who are in need of ABA instruction.

- Data collection overseen by a BCBA
- Language Development through individual programs based on the ABLLS assessment
- 1:1 ABA instruction in individual programing
- Data is collected on each response in each program
- Individualized reinforcement systems are embedded throughout the day
- Data-based programming are made in conjunction with teacher, case manager, and BCBA
- Maximum students in autism is 6 students
- Transition Skills Class

MULTIPLE DISABILITIES PROGRAM (MD)

Our MD program is designed to meet the needs of learners with several educational needs including activities of daily living needs, fine and gross motor deficits. Students benefit from instruction in a 1:1 or small group setting. Instructional modalities include multidisciplinary and ABA instruction

- Data collection overseen by a BCBA
- Language Development through individual programs based on the ABLLS assessment
- 1:1 or dyad instruction in individual programs
- Individualized reinforcement systems are embedded throughout the day
- Data-based programming are made in conjunction with teacher, case manager, and BCBA
- Maximum of 12 students in the classroom
- Transition Skills Class

LANGUAGE AND LEARNING DISABILITIES (LLDs)

Our LLD-S class is intended to meet the needs of learners with language impairments based on multiple measures. Learners are reading several grade levels below and multisensory instruction has not been effective to make gains. These learners benefit from instruction in small groups with ongoing progress monitoring. The general education curriculum is modified and highly structured, scaffolded supplemental programs are also utilized.

- Modifications to the GE curriculum
- Individual programs for students below grade level
- Use of multi-modalities to increase learning gains
- Progress monitoring in 8-week intervals with case manager, supervisor, and BCBA consultant
- Maximum of 12 students in the classroom
- Transition Skills Class

PULL OUT RESOURCE (REPLACEMENT)

Students with disabilities who are part of this program are educated with age appropriate peers in small group sections in ELA and/or Math

- Scaffolded, specialized instruction by a special education teacher
- Modifications to the General Education curriculum
- Small classroom size up to 9 students (10-12 students with an aide) to provide specialized instruction.
- The pace of the resource class allows for students to acquire skills and attain mastery of concepts through repetition and guided practice.

IN-CLASS SUPPORT

Students with disabilities who are part of the ICS program are educated with age appropriate peers in the general education classroom. ICS provides students the opportunity to be educated alongside their non-disabled peers with the support of modified curriculum.

Program consists of:

- Scaffolded, specialized instruction by a special education teacher
- Modifications to the General Education curriculum
- Provide accomodation per student need depending on what is in the IEP

Maximum number of students in the ICS class is 8

RELATED SERVICES

Students can get the following related services:

- Speech length and frequency depend upon IEP
- Occupational Therapy
- Physical Therapy
- Counseling

OPPORTUNITIES FOR STUDENTS

At the middle school and high school our students with an IEP have the opportunity to integrate with their non-disabled peers in many electives:

- Physical Education/Health
- World language
- Visual Arts
- Business Education
- Culinary Arts
- Music Education
- Technology Education

Our mission is to provide an individualized program for students ages 14-21 that will enable them to develop the skills they need to thrive outside post-secondary transition.

- 18-21 year old Colonial L.I.F.E.*

*LEARNING INDEPENDENCE FOR EMPLOYMENT



Our 18-21 program is an adult program for students who have graduated from high school but still have the opportunity to be educated by the school system through the age of 21.

This program is housed at Morristown High School but is an autonomous program. Students spend their mornings at Work-Based Learning sites where they work at local businesses.

They return to MHS for life skills instruction, food prep, job skills instruction, transportation training, life skills instruction, meal planning/cooking and more.

Students work out at the YMCA to fulfill the State PE requirement. Each student has a personal fitness plan developed with a trainer at the YMCA.
