Grammar School Overview

GRAMMAR STAGE

In the Grammar School, basic factual content and rules—the “grammar”—of each subject is mastered. The curricular emphasis during these years is on learning basic facts and figures during the time when children love to memorize (and when they are best at doing so).

PARENT INVOLVEMENT

The parent's role in Grammar School is that of a co-teacher. As such, one parent needs to lead in the co-teaching role and become familiar with the grade level's curriculum and basic teaching techniques to actively engage and implement lessons on School@Home days. There are also ample opportunities for parents to volunteer on-campus and to attend in-class presentations and grade level special events.

SCHOOL TRADITIONS

Special Grammar School traditions include Chapel, Veritas ROCKS, a winter Daddy-Daughter Dance, Mother-Son Event, and an annual Food Drive.

COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS

Opportunities for Grammar School students to connect to the entire community include Defender Family Night, Fall Roundup, and more.

Special Events

HISTORY CELEBRATION

As your family wraps up their year of History Study, we will celebrate each of the cultures and time periods studied with a Grammar-Wide Celebration. Games, costumes and food make this event an occasion the whole family will remember and reminisce for years to come.

READ ALOUD CELEBRATION

Students come together at the end of each At Home GS Read Aloud to celebrate unique aspects of each book, such as a play or puppet show, an on-campus scavenger hunt, pie eating contest, and more.

FIELD TRIPS

Students attend an average of 2 field trips each year. These trips build on prior learning, engage in wonder and beauty, and build community.

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Core Subjects

MATH	This course covers number patterns; numbers to 10,000, place value—thousands, hundreds, tens and ones, addition/subtraction of 4-digit numbers, multiplication and division facts, multiplication/division of 3-digit numbers by 1 digit numbers, two-step word problems, mental calculation in addition/subtraction of 2-digit numbers and multiplication/division of 10 and 1000 by 1-digit, bar graphs, fractions—equivalent, mixed numbers and improper fractions, geometry—angles, right angles, area and perimeter, decimal notation, and beginning algebraic concepts.
HANDWRITING	Students spend a portion of the year reviewing cursive letters and are expected to write in cursive on all assignments after the Christmas break.
READING	The love of reading is best caught when students read a book that fits them. Students receive individualized instruction by reading through basal readers with a controlled vocabulary. As students are ready, they transition into appropriate chapter books and specified comprehension questions are introduced. On home days, families will read a variety of classics through our assigned Grammar School read aloud.
SPELLING	Students continue to build their knowledge of single and multi-letter phonograms and study the spelling of the most frequently used words. Several spelling rules are introduced and reviewed as words grow more challenging.
MEMORY WORK	With the desire that families would memorize Scripture together, all Grammar School students memorize a passage of Scripture along with the rest of the school. "Thinking Points" are provided to facilitate meaningful discussion around the dinner table.

In Grammar School, courses are combined into one core block and teachers structure the school day to include instruction of all subjects. This daily schedule is a general guide of a typical school day.

School@Home Day generally 5-6 hours per day

To prepare for each week, co-teachers will access and download homework from Family Portal, our online school management system. Co-teachers will then guide their student through the homework provided by the classroom teacher and can expect to spend approximately 2-2.5 hours on Language Arts, 1-1.5 hours on Math, and 30-40 minutes on Science/History per day.

Presentations & Projects

In order to provide ample opportunities for students to become comfortable and confident in their public speaking skills, Third Graders have two major presentations during the school year. Rhetoric skills learned in Grammar and Logic schools build toward the capstone Senior Thesis, a 20-minute memorized speech that students present and defend in the spring of their Senior year.

A Note on History & Science

History
Students in Grades 1-4 will be introduced to a sweeping view of history from Creation through modern times as they study and learn together family style. Each year, the curriculum will highlight specific historical times and events in order to make Biblical connections, examine culture and arts, read rich literature, and participate in living history events.

Science
From Creation to Marie Curie, students follow science as it unfolds in history. Throughout their Grammar School career, students will be exposed to a variety of scientific topics, including medicine, physiology, biology, chemistry, geology, electricity, magnetism, heat, light, and sound waves, as well as the famous men and women behind the different scientific fields and discoveries.

SCIENCE

MATERIALS

Story of the World (SOW)
Aesop's Fables

OBJECTIVE (THE LEARNER WILL)

TLW hear about how the Greeks transition from barbarians to a civilized culture.
TLW understand what a myth is and listen to several of Aesop's Fables.

ACTIVITIES

1. Sing/Chat through History Pegs
2. Read Story of the World (SOW) Ch. 20 - Greece Gets an Alphabet.
 - a. Have several students narrate the chapter, one sentence each.
3. Students will write their names using Greek letters.
4. Read two of Aesop's Fables, noting he was a famous Greek storyteller.

HISTORY

In First through Fourth Grade, history and science tend to alternate days. During most weeks, classes will receive science lessons on Monday and Tuesday and history lessons on Wednesday and Thursday.

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Sample Homework

Homework is written by classroom teachers.

HOMEWORK

READING (45 MINUTES)

1. Student will read the assigned pages for the day and complete the assigned questions.
2. Sign TUESDAY reading log (located on reading tab in binder).
3. Complete "Own the Word" vocabulary page by filling in the definition, part of speech, synonym, and a context sentence.

SPELLING (30 MINUTES)

1. Complete Spelling Enrichment Activities from lists L-4.
2. Review Rule 1-13 and multi-letter phonograms.
3. Dictate words 11-20 from list L-4.

HANDWRITING (10 MINUTES)

1. Complete p. 24-25 and p. 44-45 reviewing letters Nn & Mm.

READ ALOUD (20 MINUTES)

1. As a family, read Chapter 13-14 of *Pinocchio* and discuss. Throughout the week complete the designated writing assignments from the Read Aloud Reading Guide.

GRAMMAR (20 MINUTES)

1. Teach FLL Lessons 15 and 16: Adjectives & Articles.

MEMORIZATION (ALL WEEK, 20 MINUTES)

1. Read Scripture: Psalm 19: 9-10.
2. Review History Pegs.
3. Review Poem: *I Wandered Lonely As a Cloud*.

MATH (90 MINUTES)

1. Do Rapid Recall Track 2, Day 4.
2. Warm Up: Lesson 21.
3. Review Lesson 22 and 23 and complete the mixed practice problems from Lesson 23.

LATIN (20 MINUTES)

1. Review Chapters 16-18 and complete p. 17-18.
2. Watch Song School DVD for Ch. 3. Listen to tracks 4 and 5.
3. Review all flash cards.

HISTORY (60 MINUTES)

Scholé History/Science Explorers students will complete this on Friday.

1. Sing/chant through History Pegs.
2. Show examples of mosaics (ancient and current - search 'ancient greek mosaics).
3. Follow instructions sent home on Mosaic Tiles to help student creat their own mosaic tile in their history notebook.
4. Read Story of the World (SOW) Ch. 20 - The Stories of Homer.
5. Complete SOW Ch. 20 map.

FRIDAY FLEX DAY OR SCHOLÉ

READING:

1. Read assigned Independent Reading Program (IRP) story/ pages.
2. Sign Reading Log for Friday.

MATH:

1. Do Rapid Recall: Track 2, Day 5.
