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## SCHOOL PROFILE 2024-2025

Proctor Academy is an independent, coeducational boarding and day school for grades 9-12 located in the foothills of the White Mountains in central New Hampshire. The campus encompasses 2,500 acres of woodlands, pastures, three ponds, a ski area, and more than 45 buildings on the campus proper. Total school enrollment is 393 students, comprised of roughly 45% females, 54% males, and 1% non-binary, with boarding students comprising 70% of the total student body. During the 2024-25 admissions cycle, 530 students applied, 245 were accepted, and 120 matriculated. There are 103 seniors in the Class of 2025. Students hail from 27 states and 14 countries. Approximately 40% of the student body receives financial aid awards averaging \$30,000 per student. The faculty is comprised of 107 full-time teachers and administrators, providing a 5:1 student-to-teacher ratio on campus. The average tenure of the faculty is 16 years, with more than 70% holding advanced degrees.

- Taking inspiration from its motto “Live to Learn, Learn to Live,” Proctor’s mission is to educate members of its diverse community for lives that demonstrate honesty, compassion, respect, and responsibility.
- Proctor is committed to honoring each student’s unique gifts and recognizing individual learning styles.
- The school provides a challenging college preparatory curriculum augmented by five optional, term-long, off-campus learning experiences (Mountain Classroom, Ocean Classroom, European Art Classroom, Proctor en Segovia, and Proctor in Costa Rica) and an integrated academic support program (Learning Skills).
- Over the past decade, 75% of Proctor Academy students who attended the school for three or more years participated in a term-long off-campus program, ensuring Proctor graduates receive a global education.
- A third of the student body enrolls in integrated academic support through Proctor’s Learning Skills program each year. This commitment to celebrating diverse learning styles in every classroom enhances the educational experience of all students throughout Proctor’s 125+ academic courses.
- Proctor offers 30 art electives, 43 competitive athletic teams, 28 afternoon activities, a robust residential life and wellness curriculum, faculty advisories, community service opportunities, and an institutional commitment to Proctor’s environmental stewardship.
- Proctor has a longstanding belief that the most effective educational model operates at the intersection of experiential, hands-on learning and authentic faculty/student relationships within a nurturing community.

## SIGNATURE PROGRAMS

**Learning Skills** Core to Proctor’s educational model since the 1950s, Proctor’s Learning Skills program offers integrated academic support to a third of the student body each year. Learning Skills empowers students to become strategic and resilient lifelong learners who are confident self-advocates. Proctor’s approach develops positive working relationships with students, applies comprehensive academic coaching methods, and direct instruction of executive functioning skills. It does not, however, emphasize the remediation of weaknesses. Instead, each student gains greater self-knowledge as an effective learner, capitalizing on personal strengths to achieve academic success in challenging coursework. The goal for each student is academic independence, self-awareness, and confidence gained through real-world success.

**Wilderness Orientation** Since 1971, students have begun their Proctor careers by completing a wilderness orientation trip. Proctor believes this challenging experience is the best way for new students to build relationships while discovering the essence of Proctor. Upon arrival, each new student joins seven other students and two Proctor faculty members for a five-day and four-night backpacking trip in the White Mountains of New Hampshire. This orientation provides each person with significant insight into what Proctor is all about: experiential education and genuine relationships.

**Academic Concentration** Fostering independent scholarship and experiential learning, this program allows self-directed students to design an individualized program, experiential learning beyond campus, and a culminating capstone. Five Concentrations:

- Environmental Studies
- Creative Studies
- Social Justice
- Global Citizenship
- STEM

Each aligns with intentional interdisciplinary guidelines that students tailor to create their academic program and experiential plan. Students who fulfill the requirements of this rigorous, multi-year program develop skills in authentic communication, scholarly inquiry, and project management while learning to build connections between academic study and the “real world” application of theories in functional and global scenarios.

**Project Period** A five-day, immersive small group program starting off the Spring Term. Faculty bring the same richness present in their academic curriculum into their sponsored project, where they have the opportunity to immerse themselves alongside a small group of students (six students to each faculty sponsor) in a shared experience.

**Community Service** A vital part of the culture at Proctor is community service. The program involves roughly 60% of all students in any given trimester. Popular opportunities include Proctor Environmental Action (PEA), student leadership, child care center volunteer, organic gardening, a reading program at our local elementary school, food pantry collection, delivery and maintenance, and campus tours for prospective students (Green Key).

## OFF-CAMPUS PROGRAMS

**Ocean Classroom** This program started in 1997 and is an intensive living and learning experience offered during the fall trimester. 22 Proctor students are academically, socially, and physically challenged on the SSV Corwith Cramer, a 130' LOA, traditional, gaff-rigged schooner. The program begins with two extensive weeks of research and learning in Woods Hole, Massachusetts, travels down the eastern seaboard, and concludes in the Caribbean or Charleston, South Carolina. The ship visits historic ports along the coast and focuses on maritime life and marine science. Students receive 1 English credit, 1 Mathematics credit, 2 Science credit, and a Skills credit.

**Mountain Classroom** Since 1972, Mountain Classroom has been the cornerstone of Proctor's commitment to experiential learning. During the winter and spring trimesters, ten students and two instructors embark on a ten-week exploration of the American West. They examine the intricate relationship between nature and culture, encouraging academic inquiry in a place-based curriculum. Students receive 1 English credit, 1 Science credit, 2 Social Science credits, and Group Dynamics and Expedition Skills credits.

**Spanish Abroad** Since 1974, Proctor en Segovia has been offered as a language immersion term during all trimesters. Students live with a Spanish host family, study literature and history, and take excursions throughout Spain and Europe. Participants in the Proctor one-trimester overseas program receive 3 Language credits, 1 English credit, 1 Social Science credit, and a Skills credit.

**European Art Classroom** An art immersion program based in Aix-en-Provence, France, is offered each trimester. Eight students and two faculty members live in a community and travel extensively throughout Europe as they gain an appreciation for language, art, and literature. Participants learn extensive art skills and techniques while receiving 1 English credit, 1 Social Science credit, 1 French Language credit, 2 Art credits, and a Skills credit.

**Costa Rica Program** Proctor en Monteverde is suited for academically and socially mature sophomores ready for a cultural immersion adventure in Central America. Students live with host families while continuing their Proctor courses by attending a local school. In most cases, students receive 1 English credit, 1 Science credit, 1 Social Science credit, 3 Spanish Language credits, and 1 Math credit.

**Summer Service Learning Program** Proctor Academy has maintained a strong relationship with the Rosebud and Pine Ridge Reservations for over 50 years. Since 2016, students and faculty have traveled to the Rosebud Reservation to learn from and give back to the part of the Lakota Nation offered during the summer. The group stays with a local Proctor family, experiences traditional ceremonies (Sundance), learns about the Lakota people's history, and supports ongoing projects on the reservation with their strength and energy. The group visits local historic destinations such as the Black Hills and Wounded Knee.

## CURRICULUM / ACADEMICS

### Quick Facts

- Classes are 60 minutes in length
- Trimesters (Fall, Winter, Spring)
- Students are required to take 4 academic courses and 1 skills courses each term (Must take 5 courses)
- Students are **NOT** allowed to take more than 5 academic courses in 1 trimester without permission from the Academic Dean.
- Each trimester an academic course carries 1 full Proctor credit =1/3 Carnegie credit.
- Students must accumulate at least 12 academic credits & 2 Proctor skills credits each year.

*Note: Before the Fall of 2024, the World Language sequences were: Novice, Low, Novice Mid, Novice High, Intermediate Low, and Advanced Placement. Students could take two years of the same sequence, as the course integrated multiple levels. We have since switched to the above sequence.*

## Transcript Notes

- Proctor Academy DOES NOT provide a class rank.
- GPAs on Proctor transcripts are unweighted and noted cumulative and yearly.
- Each trimester of a course is considered a unit in itself, is individually listed on the transcript, and must be passed individually for the student to receive credit.
- Due to off-campus programs, some students might enroll in out-of-sequence courses in math and science. These courses are noted with an OS on the transcript.
- Students completing summer coursework receive academic credit as noted by "Pass" on the transcript. Academic work completed through an accredited outside program will have a final grade listed. Summer courses are not factored into the Proctor Academy GPA.
- Proctor moved from Blackbaud to Veracross in Fall 2024, so the transcript layout differs from prior years.

## Academic Recognition

Consists of students whose academic average is 85 or above.

### Head's List

Consists of students whose academic average is 90 or above.

### Effort Honor Roll

Identifies students who receive Honor effort grades in at least 60% of their academic/extracurricular activity responsibilities.
