• CJC 1010 - Introduction to Criminal Justice (GT-SS3)

This is an introductory course covering the basic concepts and principles of the criminal justice system. A survey of the discipline, including the police, the law, courts, corrections, theory, and victimology, is examined. This course is required for all criminal justice majors and minors.

HSP 1010 - Introduction to Human Services (GT-SS3)

This class provides an overview of the Human Services Profession. Students examine the attitudes, values, and skills crucial for becoming an effective Human Services Professional. Understanding and working with various populations and cultural groups are essential for those working in Human Services. This course will examine various types of human service programs, research, program evaluation and current best practices in Human Services. Students will survey a variety of client populations and agencies.

• PHI 1010 - The Big Questions: An Introduction to Philosophy (GT-AH3)

Philosophy asks questions such as: What am I? How can I know things? What is real? Does God exist? Students confront questions like these in a rigorous, critical, and open-ended manner. Philosophy is unlike other disciplines: students learn not just what others have discovered, but also how to think about themselves, the world, and the relation between them.

NUT 2040 - Introduction to Nutrition (GT-SC2)

This course is designed to provide students with an understanding of the fundamental concepts of human nutrition, including digestion, absorption, metabolism, and the function of nutrients as they relate to human health and disease.
