### As 2020–21 ends, here's need-to-know info

#### GCPS makes plans for 2021–22 school year

Plans for Fall 2021 call for a return to in-person learning for nearly all Gwinnett schoolchildren. This decision considers students' academic and social-emotional needs, lower rates of infection, the availability of vaccinations for staff, and guidance from health experts and organizations. GCPS is committed to safety for its students and staff and will continue mitigation efforts such as the wearing of masks, provision of PPE, and strict cleaning regimens. GCPS will continue to rely on guidance from the CDC and other health partners in developing plans for the fall. A small percentage of families opted out of in-person learning for 2021–22 and their children will participate in a modified digital learning option. Over the summer, watch for additional information about the 2021-22 school year posted to the GCPS website. We look forward to welcoming our students to a new school year!

#### It's time for kindergarten registration!

GCPS is busy planning for our students' return for the 2021-22 school year, including the first day of school for our newest students-kindergartners! If your child or the child of someone you know will be five years old on or before Sept. 1, now's the time to register in an easy, registration closes May 13. two-step process.

Step 1: Complete online registration on the GCPS website.

Step 2: Before May 28, schedule an appointment at your child's <u>new school</u> to verify information, complete a kindergarten readiness profile, pick up materials, and learn about exciting summer enrichment opportunities for your new kindergartner! Completing online registration will help

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#### **GCPS** shares summer learning plans

**Ride the wave of learning...** GCPS' redesigned summer learning experience will support all students, specifically addressing learning loss due to the pandemic. **Summer Enrichment+Acceleration (SEA) activities** will be offered in four formats at no cost to families.



In-Person SEA, designed for students (grades 1–8) who will benefit the most, will accelerate and expand on learning for the current grade and preview what students will learn at the next grade, including enrichment opportunities outside the core subject areas. **Rising K Academy** will use fun, hands-on activities to introduce new kindergartners to school and what to expect in the fall. Both of these in-person sessions will be offered **June 14–July 2**. Class sizes will be small and schools will follow safety practices like masks and physical distancing. Students will receive breakfast and lunch.

All K–8 students will have access to the **Digital SEA Program**, a self-paced digital format accessed through the <u>MYeCLASS stu-</u> <u>dent portal</u>. **Career and Technical Education** (**CTE**) Enrichment Camps will be hosted at **Duluth HS** for interested students in grades 8–12. Participants in the sessions will earn industry-recognized certification in areas like food safety, worksite safety, and CPR. All week-long camps are in **June**.

#### **High School Summer Classes for Credit**

GCPS offers high school students <u>four</u> ways to learn for credit this summer.

- Online summer classes (June 7–30). <u>Register</u> through May 30.
- Face-to-face summer classes (June 14–July 7) offered at Collins Hill HS, Duluth HS, and Parkview HS. <u>Register</u> through June 4.
- **GCPS Community Schools** summer classes, including Health and PE. Check the website.

• **Credit Recovery** for students who previously took a course and were unsuccessful. Contact your counselor for approval.

To address COVID-related learning gaps, GCPS will pay for up to two summer classes for high school students needing to retake a class previously failed. GCPS students taking a course for the first time pay \$250 per course. Rising 9th graders may take Health and/or PE at Duluth HS, online, and through some Community Schools.

#### **BOE** votes to transition leadership

At the March 18 meeting of the Gwinnett County Board of Education (BOE), Board members voted 3-2 to transition the district's leadership from CEO/Superintendent J. Alvin Wilbanks to a successor in preparation for the 2021–22 school year. Mr. Wilbanks' tenure will end July **31, 2021**. He has served in the role since 1996. The Board is conducting a national superintendent search, led by the Georgia School Boards Association. Students, staff, families, and community members are invited to participate in an online survey through May 16. (<u>http://bit.ly/GCPSSuper-</u> Survey) The Board hopes to select the next superintendent this summer.

## GCPS suspends Gateway, waives grad requirement for seniors

Due to the pandemic, GCPS suspended High School Gateway testing in both <u>science</u> and <u>social studies</u> this spring, waiving these <u>writing assessments</u> as a graduation requirement for the Class of 2021. The waiver also was extended to students in prior graduating classes who have met all other graduation requirements except passing the High School Gateway. *Questions?* Contact your local school.

#### Find 2021–22 calendar online

The <u>2021–22 calendar</u> features a staggered start for in-person learning. Students in grades K, 1, 6, and 9, and students with special needs who are served in a smallgroup will start in-person learning on **Aug. 4**, with all other students participating in digital learning at home. On **Aug. 5**, students in grades 2, 3, 7, and 10 will start in-person learning, with remaining students in digital learning at home. On **Aug. 9**, students in grades 4, 5, 8, 11, and 12 will start in-person learning. (Students who opted out of in-person learning will begin digital learning on **Aug. 4**.)

Six digital learning days are scheduled throughout the year, with three occurring in 1st semester (Sep. 14, Oct. 20, Nov. 9) and three in 2nd semester (Jan. 25, March 2, March 22). On DLDs, all students will learn from home, completing assignments at their own pace, while teachers participate in staff development and planning.

Other dates for students include a fall break set for **Oct. 7–11**, **Dec. 20–Jan. 5** for winter break, MLK holiday on **Jan. 17**, the addition of a break in February (**Feb. 17–21**), **April 4–8** scheduled for spring break, and an end date of **May 25**.

#### **GCPS** builds tech equity

Even before the pandemic, a technology gap existed for many Gwinnett families that did not have access to reliable internet service or devices for their children. With an infusion of federal funds, grants, and local donations in the past year, the district continues to build a robust supply of Chromebooks and hotspots available for families to check out. To date, GCPS has procured more than 75,000 devices and more than 19,000 hotspots. The district will order additional tech resources as needs are determined. While most students will return to in-person learning in the fall, children still will need tech access as GCPS will have several digital learning days during the year. Watch for information on how you can request a device, a hotspot, or both for your student's use during the summer or next school year.
