Status of Appropriations

Salaries

The majority of salaries have been encumbered and **budget balances reflect the final accounting entry processed to allocate the negotiations reserve of \$200,000**. There were post-budget staffing changes resulting in variances in both the Educators Classroom and SPED line items. **Variances will continue to fluctuate as we account for leaves and other staffing changes throughout the year**. The Educational Assistant negative variance reflects one additional SPED EA that was budgeted for the Circuit Breaker Fund but given the OOD variances noted below are included in the General Fund. Substitutes and Custodial overtime services are expensed as incurred. You will see those budget balances decrease as the year progresses.

Expenditures

There are no material variances to report to date. Projections have been encumbered for utilities and transportation with both showing a small negative variance due to continued high costs of diesel fuel (transportation) and delivery costs of utilities. We will continue to review and update estimates as warranted.

Out-of-District

Costs for FY24 placements known to date have been encumbered. We budgeted for 10 placements and at this time have 11. In addition, costs for existing placements increased due to changes in placements as well as additional required services. The total negative variance as of November 8th is approximately \$200,000. This is down by \$35,000 due to a change in cost for a placement. We are awaiting the final circuit breaker reimbursement figures for FY24 as well as projected transportation costs. These factors could help offset the current variance. We will continue to monitor the activity and keep the Committee as well as the Town updated on this activity.

Special Revenue/Revolving Funds (new information)

The quarterly statement for the Special/Revenue Revolving Funds is attached for your review. As we discuss funding for the facilities assessment and cooling studies, you will see that we have a balance of approx. \$80,000 in the Building Rental fund. The final Circuit Breaker reimbursement for FY24 is still pending but we have conservatively estimated reimbursement of \$400,000.

The Dover Sherborn Schools share in the mission to inspire, challenge and support all students as they discover and pursue their full potential.



Update on Facilities Assessment and Cooling Studies (new information)

Since our last meeting, we obtained proposals for both the Facilities Assessment and the Cooling Study. We met with the Working Group, which includes both School and Town representatives, to review the proposals and determine next steps and funding. It was agreed to proceed with both studies. The cost of the Facilities Assessment (\$16,800) will be equally shared, with the School Committee funding the costs of the Cooling Study (\$8,000). Funds from the Building Rental Fund will be used to cover the School Committee's portion.

We will keep the Committee updated on the progress of the work. We have requested the Cooling Study be expedited to allow for current year discussion of any FY25 Capital requests. We appreciate the support of the Town on these processes.

We will be happy to answer any questions at Tuesday's meeting.

In those 10 years, there have been many new families that have moved into the community, families have sent students into the school system for the first time, and the educational landscape has continued to shift and evolve. Because of this, we would like to give parents, caregivers, and community members a chance to acquaint or reacquaint themselves with Challenge Success.

On Wednesday, November 8 at 6:30pm, in the Mudge Auditorium at the regional campus, we will be hosting the Challenge Success workshop, "The Well-Balanced Student." Here is a brief overview of the workshop:

In a high-stakes, high-pressure culture, parent and school expectations may have unintentional but damaging effects on students. Increasing demands on students may lead to unhealthy stress, resulting in burnout, disengagement, or debilitating physical and mental health symptoms. This workshop examines the tension that parents, students, and teachers often experience over issues such as homework, grades, and the culture of competition, and offers tools for creating a healthier school climate.

Learning Objectives for Parents

- 1. Learn how you can establish healthier home and school environments for school-aged children.
- 2. Explore how to reduce academic stress and disengagement without sacrificing achievement.
- 3. Examine how to increase students' resilience, creativity, competence, and well-being.

Grade Level Happenings



Pre-School

Preschool is learning about what it means to be a friend! We have been learning about cooperation and sharing. Encourage your preschooler to express their thoughts and feelings about friendship. Listening to their responses can give you insights into their understanding of friendship and provide an opportunity to reinforce the values of kindness, empathy, and cooperation.



Kindergarten

Kindergarten had an exciting Nature walk guided by our Broadmoor naturalist! While we are exploring nature, leaves, and our environment, we are also honing our scientific skills by observing the different plants and creatures we encounter. This hands-on experience is teaching us how to be curious and make keen observations, just like real scientists.



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ling partners. We practice sharing the book and taking turns reading each page. Ask your first grader to show you how to sit knee to knee, elbow to elbow!







Second Grade

Second grade scientists are currently studying sand, rocks, and silt. We are examining river rocks, school rocks, and volcanic rocks. Students are observing and sorting rocks by their properties such as size, color, shape, and texture.

Third Grade

It's not all about video games when it comes to screen time. Type to Learn is a program third grade students use for proper finger placement on the keyboard. Through repetition (and fun games) students develop their typing skills. Ask your child which finger is F, which finger is J, and which finger touches the space bar.

Fourth Grade

Fourth graders have been working on taking strong notes while they are reading. We use evidence from the text (author's words) and our own knowledge to create inferences that help us understand the story better. When reading at home, model your own thinking and ask your 4th grader to share their thinking too!



Fifth Grade

The fifth graders went to Hale Reservation on October 4th for the first of three visits during the year. Each group of fifth graders engaged in team-building activities and discussed what it means to be a leader. Ask your child what their favorite part of their Hale experience was and what they are looking forward to for our winter trip.











Kindergarten

We have been learning about the weather and the colors red, green and blue (rojo, verde y azul). Try this at home- play red light green light in Spanish as well as being spies all around us. What colors do you see?

First

Our first-grade students learned the traditional Spanish folk song "De Colores" as part of our Hispanic Heritage Month celebration. (Music is a wonderful way to acquire language.) Students also illustrated a "De Colores" mini-book to share with classmates. Ask your child to teach you the hand movements that accompany the song.

Second

We have been learning about the weather and the colors in Spanish. Ask about the memory games and board games we play using the colors in Spanish. Try this at home: point out things throughout the day and ask your child to name the color in spanish. Also ask your child to tell you how the weather is in Spanish (soleado, nublado, lluvioso, nevando).



Third

Students in third grade are building their interpretive language skills. Just in time for Bullying Prevention Day, they listened to and discussed the story "La Historia de Piedra, Papel, Tijera". It's a tale of the game Rock, Paper, Scissors. Students identify their favorite part of the story and the importance of being kind and helping others in need. Of course, a favorite brain break is challenging a classmate to a game. ¡Uno, dos, tres, dale!



Fourth

We have been learning about school materials, feelings, weather, and the calendar in Spanish. We have been having lots of fun playing jeopardy, bingo and memory games to practice our new words. Try this at home: ask your child to tell you how the weather is in Spanish (soleado, nublado, lluvioso, nevando)/how they are feeling.

PE - Second Grade

Second graders have been building their soccer skills in Physical Education class while playing some creative and fun modified games. They worked on passing in "Fire and Ice Tag", focused on dribbling in "Soccer Pirates" and developed some accuracy + agility in a game of "Soccer Ball Tag". Our theme of the month focuses on "The Size of the Problem " and has allowed students the opportunity to discuss scenarios related to small, medium, and big size problems including appropriate reactions and management strategies.



Technology- Fourth Grade

Fourth graders are learning how to program a sprite's **behavior** (an action a sprite does until it's told to stop). A **sprite** is a graphic, character or object on the screen that can be moved or changed. Students get excited with this lesson because they can make it their own and now apply and remix all this learning into something new and advanced!



irst graders are using EFFORT (word of the week) to demonstrate vocal exploration. In our most recent activity, we are coloring and cutting out ghosts to create finger puppets. Next week, our ghosts will fly around the room using our "oooo's" and "ahhh's" as our voice stretches high and low! Try vocal exploration by making ghost sounds at home!

Social Emotional Learning



At Pine Hill, the Social Emotional Coach and School Counselors are integrating lessons to raise student awareness and build skills and strategies for navigating conflict during Bullying Prevention Month. In addition, first graders are engaging in lessons where students are identifying size of the problem and how to effectively manage feelings.



Special Education Feature - Occupational Therapy

School-based occupational therapy is designed to support a student's ability to fully access and be successful in the learning environment. The focus of OT support is on helping students learn (or relearn) to participate in activities that "occupy" their time during the school day despite physical, cognitive, or social limitations. Occupations essential for a student's participation in a classroom include: the ability to safely and effectively maneuver all environments across the life of the school, use tools such as pencil/crayons, scissors and small manipulatives efficiently in learning and play tasks, complete self-care tasks required during the school day, as well as regulate effectively to learn and socialize.

Pictured below are students in first grade that are benefiting from multi-sensory instruction in small groups to develop "motor memory" for letter and number formations. Motor memory is the ability to form letters automatically. This is an essential skill for writing fluently across the curriculum.

1) Call to Order

Liz Grossman called the meeting to order in the Middle School Library at 6:33 pm.

2) Community Comments - none.

3) Reports

- Superintendant Report Beth McCoy presented a brief update from her office and thanked all who worked hard to ensure a smooth opening to the school year.
- Assistant Superintendent Report Denny Conklin provided an update on the Math Curriculum pilot program.
- Principal's Report Dr. Reinemann highlighted the opening of school and upcoming events at Chickering.
- Warrant Report

4) **FY23 Budget Closeout**

- Salaries the year ended with a positive variance of \$29,695 (.44%). During the year, two EA positions were converted to a SPED Educator to provide more direct instruction to students on IEPs. Other variances resulted from post-FY23 staffing changes, leaves, and coverage for those leaves.
- Expenditures overall in-district operating expenses were over budget by \$76,675 driven by the significant variance in SPED services based on outside services required to support students on IEPs.
- Out-of-District costs exceeded budget by \$397,066 (15.8%) based on placement activity throughout the year. There was new placement activity since the June report resulting in additional tuition costs of approximately \$87,000. Budgeted placements for FY23 were 21; actual placements by year end were 26.
- Summary of Results overall results from operations for FY23 were a negative variance of \$444,046 (4.28%). These unbudgeted costs were offset by the Circuit Breaker reimbursement of \$1,151,763 resulting in a net turn back to the Town of \$707,717.

5) 2023-24 School Improvement Plan: second read

6) **Proposed Gift: Basketball Court -** over the past several years, planning discussion have taken place between School Administration, Dover Parks and Recreation, and representatives from Hoops for Hyde regarding renovation of the existing basketball park to create a new regulation size court. The Parks and Recreation Commission met on September 14th and approved the idea of the court addition and will work with School Administration/School Committee to finalize procurement procedures,

usage protocols, and long-term maintenance responsibilities. More information will be shared at a future meeting.

- FY24 Monthly Report
 - Revenues: Chapter 70 and 71 revenue projections reflect the final Cherry Sheet amounts. The small variance in Chapter 70 is due to adjustments to our student enrollment in school choice districts and charter school that were not included in preliminary cherry sheets. Chapter 71 revenues reflect a 90% reimbursement rate (FY23 was 79.55%). There are no projected variances in athletics or activity fees.
 - Salaries: the majority of salaries have been encumbered. A few staffing updates: the SPED team chair educator budgeted positions have been converted to two SPED Administrators; increased the BCBA position from .6 FTE to 1.0 FTE due to current program/student needs; and the Athletic Trainer position (new in FY24) has been combined with the Athletic Administrative Assistant position.
 - Expenditures: the are no material variances projected at this time.
 - Capital Projects: Roof Air Handlers Replacement installation of the new handlers has been delayed until the summer of 2025 due to the continued long lead time for delivery; High School Floor Replacement - installation complete; Lindquist Bathroom renovations - project complete; and Bleacher/Press Box Renovation - project bidding components are being finalized and there should be a revised total project cost by the November meeting.
 - FY23 Wrap Up: The Region's EOYR has been filed with DESE. Auditors are scheduled to being their fieldwork later this month.
