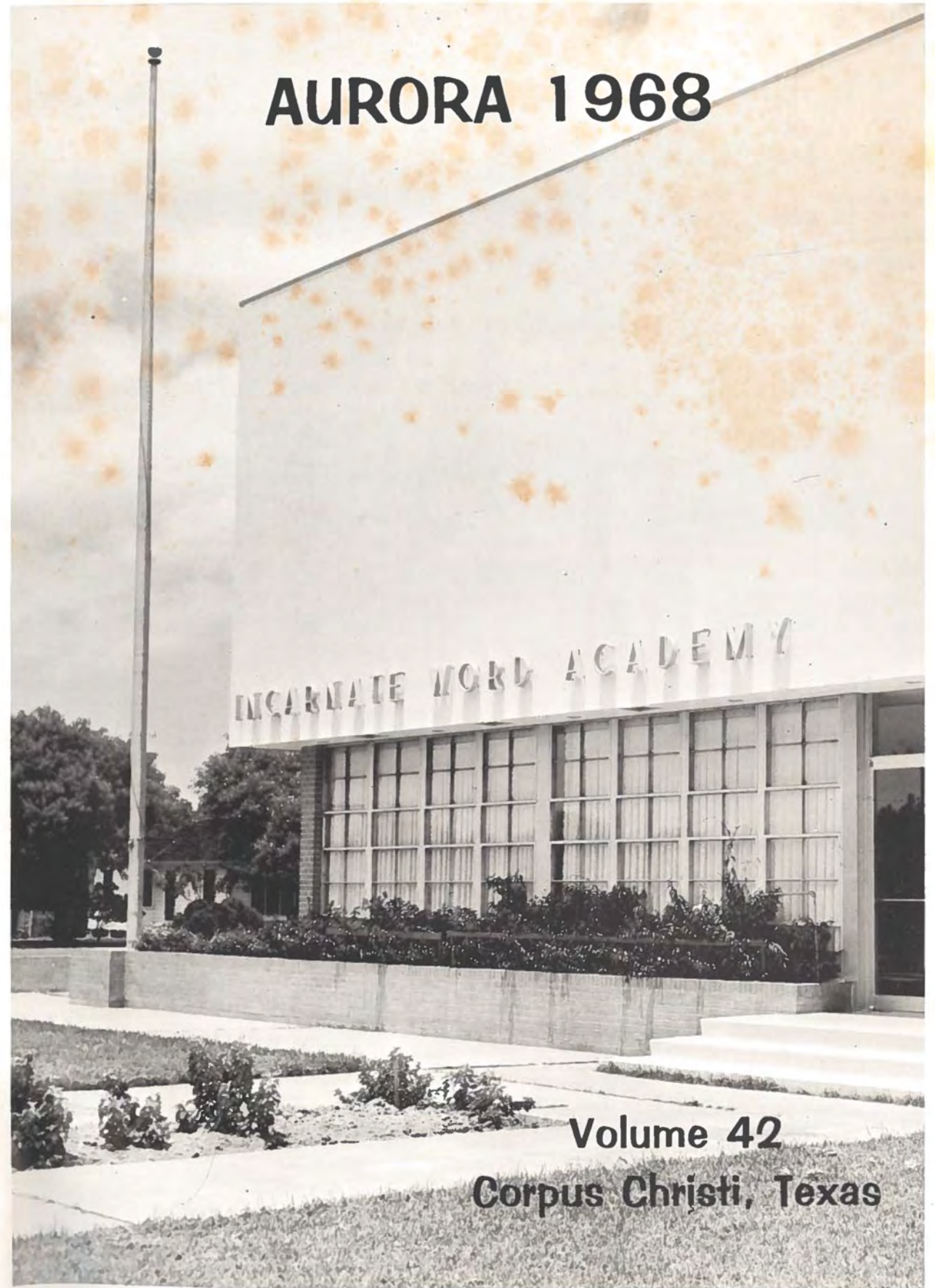

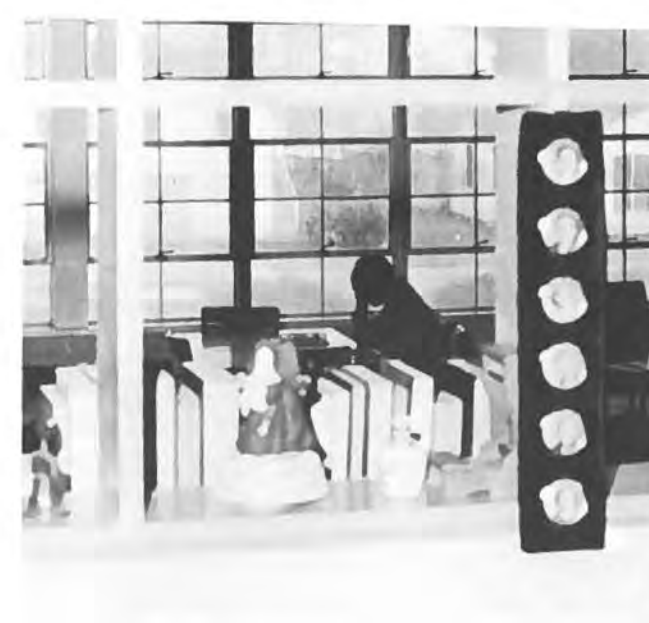


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Foreword . . .

In the final outcome, whether this war is judged right or wrong, just or unjust, the courageous men who have so heroically performed their duty shall not be forgotten.

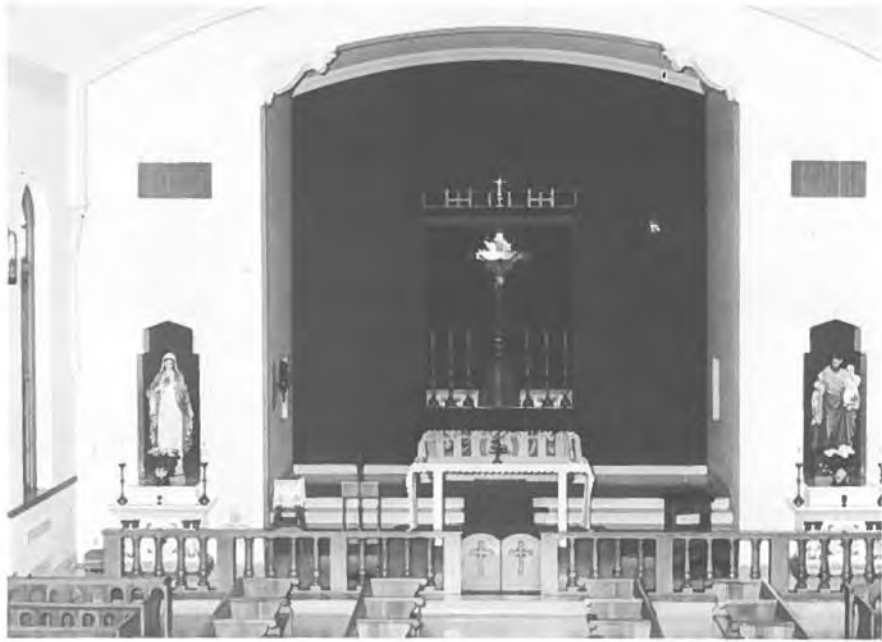
Therefore, to all the American Servicemen in Vietnam, the living and the dead, we dedicate the 1968 AURORA.

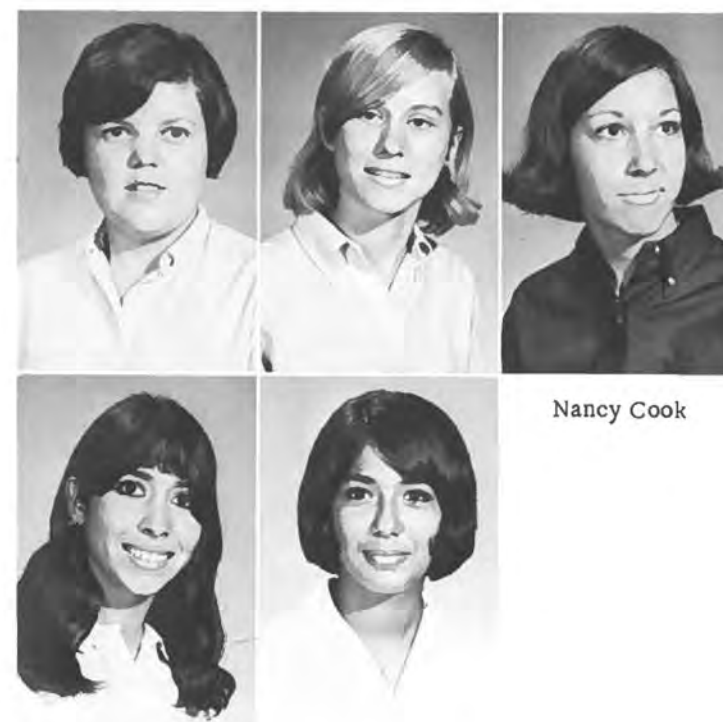

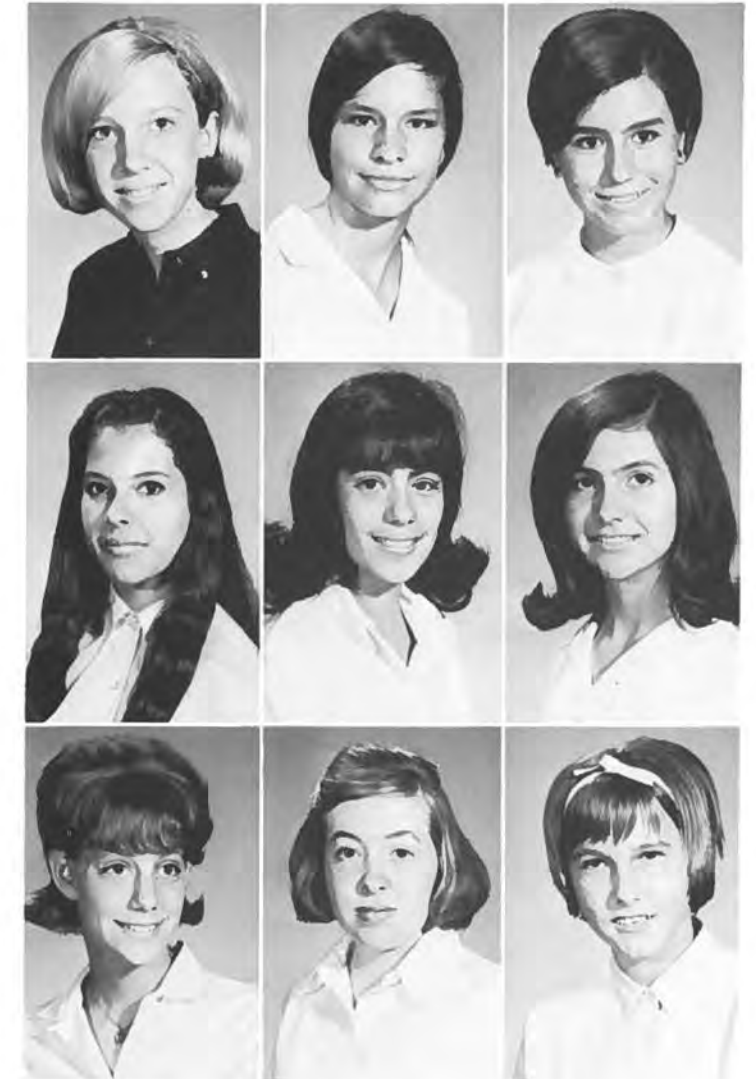

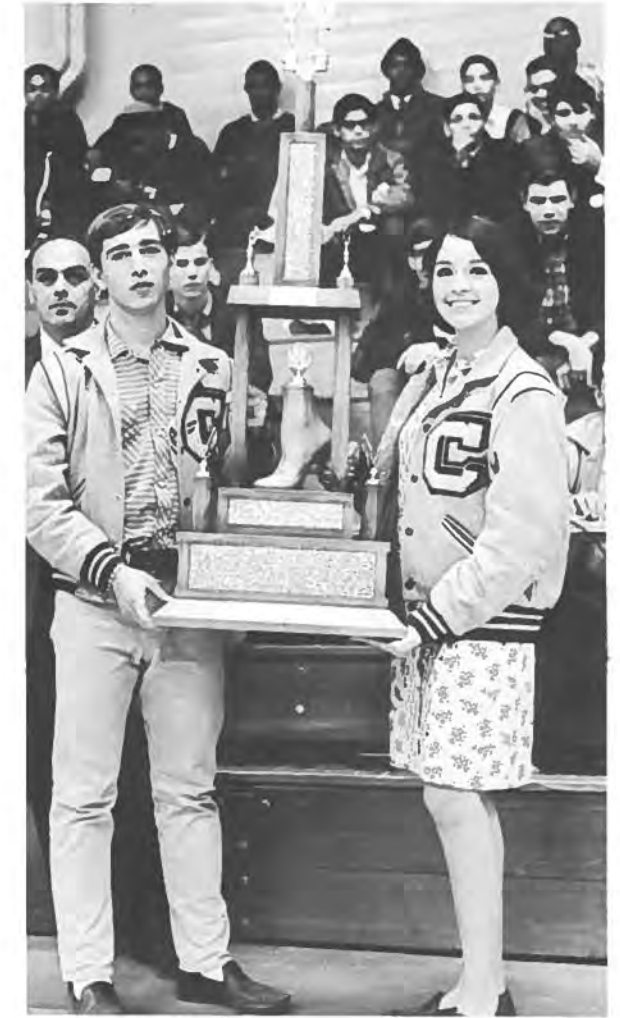

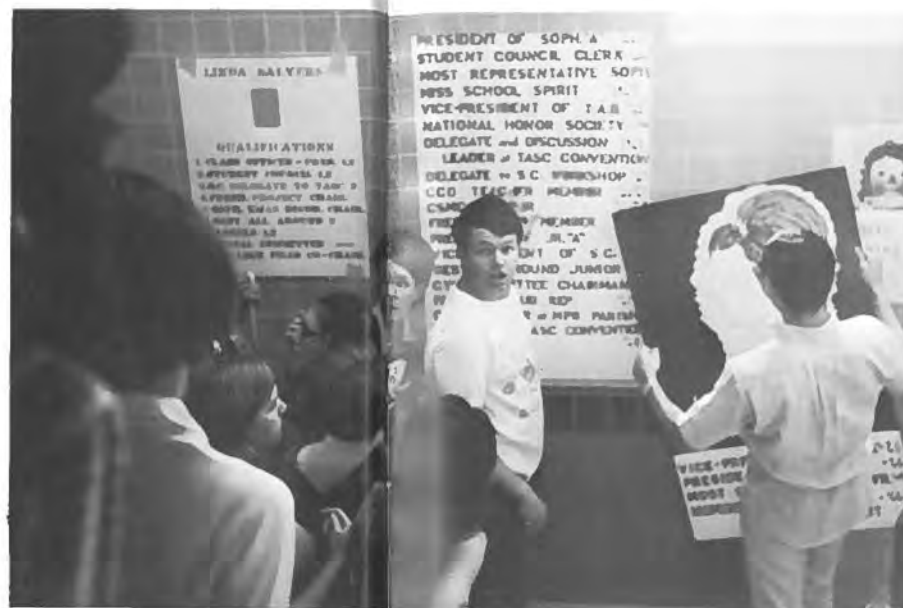
