Building Self-Healing Communities

Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) are becoming understood as the leading public health and social problem in our nation. The ACE Master Training Education and Toolkit is designed to provide participants with an introduction to scientific findings that explain how human beings adapt biologically to experiences, and how those adaptations affect health, safety, and productivity during a person's lifespan. Scientific studies from the fields of developmental **N**euroscience, **E**pigenetics, **A**dverse childhood experience and **R**esilient communities (**NEAR** Science) are described, along with instruction about to effectively teach about these topics.

Participants will receive an overview of the ACE Interface materials to use when teaching various adult audiences and they will continue the learning process as they teach and interact with one another in a learning community and engage in independent study using materials provided by ACE Interface. The cohort will have three additional one-hour Zoom meetings led by a LMSW, DSW cohort coordinator, who will answer any questions and help guide them.

Participants will learn:

- The biologic and epigenetic adaptations to adversity and trauma, with a focus on experiences that begin in childhood
- The history of Adverse Childhood Experience(ACE) Study, including the reasons that various decisions were made both in the design of the study and in the release of its findings
- How individuals, schools, and communities can promote recovery and resilience, and
- How and why to think critically about scientific evidence related to these topics

Note: This particular training includes 6-year 'limited access' to licensed digital materials. A literacy check-up, or audit, examines the policies, practices, and results in a school or district to find both strengths and weaknesses in literacy instruction. With this information, school leaders can plan action steps for immediate improvement.

Preventing the Meltdown: Understanding Environmental Factors Affecting Behavior Presented by Michelle Levy

A common mistake made by schools is to assume that problematic student behaviors exist primarily within the child and underestimate the degree to which external environmental factors impact student academic and behavioral performance. The fields of education and human behavior have long recognized the complex nature of student behavior and its relationship to the child's learning environment. Understanding this relationship and the impact of these factors can help educators and clinicians become more effective in their analysis and development of strategies to respond to behaviors which negatively impact student success. <u>Preparing Students for the New Biology Regents Exam:</u> <u>Transitioning Regents Biology Courses to the Three-Dimensions of the</u> <u>NYS Science Learning Standards - *Presented by Glen Cochrane*</u>

The first administration of the New York State Science Learning Standards (NYSSLS) based Biology Regents exam is scheduled for June 2025 with the last LE exam in June 2026. It is possible to transition to the pedagogy that supports the NYSSLS three-dimensional approach while continuing to teach science aligned to the Living Environment Core Curriculum. Having students make connections between the three dimensions of scientific knowledge can better prepare them for the Living Environment exam while they develop a coherent and scientifically based view of the world. Start with the complex phenomena (for science) or problems (for engineering) and let students ask questions, explore, and use the SEPs and CCCs to construct their own understandings of the disciplinary core ideas (content). This is a paradigm shift to students constructing their own understandings with much less memorization of science facts. Students learn by doing science and engineering practices, engaging in discourse, and building understandings of Living Environments' main ideas.

Included will be:

- The new expectations for curriculum, and instruction for teaching and learning.
- Immersion activities for participants to engage in sense-making using phenomenonbased learning.
- Principles of phenomena-based instruction and an introduction to storylines.
- Brief review of NYSSLS architecture and tools to transition to NYSSLS.
- Similarities and differences between NYSSLS and the Next Generation Science Standards
- Strategies for developing a NYSSLS-based curriculum will include adapting current activities to the three-dimensional NYSSLS approach while still teaching the core curriculum.
- Review of item-cluster format and the sample item clusters released by NYSED to see how they assess NYSSLS expectations and how they reflect the anticipated format of the new Biology Regents exam.

When there is a child with academic, social or behavioral challenges, the goal is to provide them with the most efficient supports and interventions available. The development of Functional Behavioral Assessments and Behavior Intervention Plans is a formal process through which parents, teachers and other school professionals can work collaboratively as a team to determine the most effective ways to positively impact a student's academic and behavioral performance.

Learning objectives for this THREE DAY training:

• Identify the essential components needed for an effective FBA/BIP team process through the use of the Competing Behavior Pathway

• Develop an FBA process that includes an accurate operational definition of behavior, examination of the environment in which the behavior occurs and data collection and analysis to determine factors and functions maintaining the behavior

• Understand the critical components of function based BIPs including replacement strategies, antecedent strategies and consequences strategies for staff to implement

•Conduct progress monitoring to determine the effectiveness of the interventions implemented


