DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT SERVICES



In addition to serving as the Chief Executive Officer of Orange-Ulster BOCES, the District Superintendent acts in three capacities:

- As a consultant to individual districts;
- As a liaison between component districts and the State Education Department; and
- Upon request, will serve as a consultant for component districts in the search process for a new superintendent of schools.

The following are some of the responsibilities of all 37 District Superintendents in the State of New York:

- Facilitate communication and cooperation between districts, the State Education Department, and other public and private agencies.
- Interpret and clarify Education Law, Commissioner's Regulations, and other policies affecting education in this region; and serve as the regional contact point for State initiatives, such as the new Standards, Capacity, and Assessment initiatives.
- Assist in developing educational policy while working closely with area legislators on behalf of public education.

- Report to the Commissioner and work closely with the Senior Deputy Commissioner.
- Conduct Registration reviews in New York City and within the BOCES supervisory area, as well as for those schools identified as requiring improvement.
- Assist with reorganization studies in participating districts and coordinate related efficiency grants.
- Investigate, hear, and decide upon boundary line disputes between districts. Provide advice and counsel to local Boards of Education and in-service education for local superintendents.
- Take cases on appeal and report testimony to the Commissioner, as directed.
- Provide assistance to non-public schools.
- Act on behalf of other District Superintendents.
- Approve BOCES service contracts and cross contracts.

The BOCES Career and Technical Education Division has programs located on two campuses in Goshen, one on Gibson Road and the other on Harriman Drive at the Regional Education Center at Arden Hill. Eleven career academies offer high school students a variety of career and technical programs. Health Career programs are offered at the Regional Education Center at Arden Hill in state-of-the-art classrooms and labs.

Through an integrated academic curriculum in each classroom, CTE students are able to earn English, math and science credit (depending on the program), while participating in one of 29 specialized career and technical programs. All of of the career academies meet U.S. Department of Education and NYSED career clusters and feature leading-edge technology, as well as instructors with the latest trade experience. Work-based learning opportunities in local businesses help to develop students' skills beyond classroom experiences. Our students have access to college credits and career opportunities upon successfully completing their program.

The Marguerite A. Flood and Academy at Arden Hill middle and high schools, along with Restart and middle and high school Intensive Day Treatment programs, are operated out of the Regional Education Center at Arden Hill. Standalone elementary special education programs are located at the Middle hope Elementary School in the Marlboro school district and the Pine Island Elementary School in Warwick Valley. Middlehope is also home to an elementary SPARC class while an elementary Newcomer program calls Pine Island home.

The Including Communities program, with an emphasis on the development of work readiness skills, is embedded in a community-based location at 129 Main Street in Goshen. Satellite programs are located in school buildings in the Chester, Cornwall, Goshen, and Minisink Valley and school districts. The satellite at Goshen Main Street hosts the secondary Newcomer program.

The state-of-the-art, secure data center strategically located at Regional Education Center at Arden Hill continues to evolve to meet the growing data security and access demands of our component school districts.

- All power into the data center is fully redundant, including backup generator power.
- Cutting-edge technologies allow fail-over to a backup connection quickly in the event of a fiber cut, minimizing service interruption.
- On-site personnel are trained and available to provide immediate support if the need arises.



ADULT CAREER/TECHNICAL & CONTINUING EDUCATION

BOCES' Adult Education Programs provide career, technical, business and industry training, as well as literacy education, to the adult population in the Mid-Hudson region. The comprehensive career and technical education classes are geared to adults who want to upgrade their work skills, acquire new entry-level training for a career change or to enhance their personal capabilities. A broad spectrum of occupational and technical training programs, including a wide variety of health careers programs, reflect the job opportunities in the surrounding region.

Along with our robust lineup of vocational classes, literacy classes are also offered day and night in many locations throughout Orange County and include High School Equivalency (HSE) and English as a Second Language (ESL) instruction. The Division of Adult Education helps adult learners earn a New York State High School Equivalency (HSE) diploma by teaching students the content and skills needed to successfully pass the Test Assessing Secondary Completion (TASC™). English as a Second Language (ESL) classes are designed for all levels of English language learners from non-Enlish speakers to those with some English fluency who are looking to improve their overall reading, writing, and speaking. These programs run continuously, are flexible and can be tailored to fit into anyone's busy schedule. Furthermore, these HSE and ESL classes offered by Orange-Ulster BOCES are free of charge for all participants.


