Communications

<u>Superintendent's Report</u>: Dr. Finneran reminded all that amazing things are happening throughout the District. She shared that Youth Leadership Lompoc Valley (YLLV) is off to a great start. Board member Jerri Thiel and Assistant Superintendent Paul Bommersbach along with many community members have been instrumental in making this happen.

<u>Board Member Reports</u>: The Board members remain active in the District. Several attended the CHS production of Failure: A Love Story at CHS, the Personnel Commission meeting and school site visits. Other activities include working with the Parent Teacher Student Associations and participating on the Superintendent Committee for Safe Supportive Schools.

Board Consents / Action Items

The Board approved 17 consent items including:

 Approval of an agreement with Lompoc Valley YMCA to provide high school tutors to support students attending the YMCA – ASES Program at Clarence Ruth, La Honda, and La Cañada Elementary.

The Board approved 10 action items including:

- Native American Month resolution. LUSD honors the perseverance and courage of Indigenous peoples, shows our gratitude for the myriad contributions they have made to our world, and renews our commitment to respect Tribal sovereignty and selfdetermination.
- Creation of the, "Drone Club," at Lompoc High.

Reports

Learning Communities for School Success Program (LCSSP): Education Services Assistant Superintendent Brian Jaramillo presented the report. The LCSSP is a threeyear grant focused on decreasing chronic absenteeism, truancy and student suspensions while increasing attendance. The strategies to achieve these goals have been the implementation of a social-emotional curriculum at school sites, mental health counseling for students, tiered case management for families and the implementation of parenting classes.

Superintendent's Evaluation:

Board President Franky Caldeira read a summary of the evaluation of Superintendent, Dr. Finneran conducted by all board members. The evaluation was based on three goal areas developed by the Board and Dr. Finneran: build positive culture rooted in trust, increase academic achievement and improve facilities. In each area the Board determined that Dr. Finneran had met or exceeded the evaluated goal. For the next evaluation cycle the Board reordered the goals with increasing academic achievement coming first, improving facilities next, followed by building positive culture rooted in trust.

The Board commended Dr. Finneran for her leadership, work ethic, presence across our district and community and her dedication to ensure that we are doing all we can for the students we serve and our employees who support them.

Discussions

<u>Mission/Vision Statement Review</u>: Dr. Finneran presented the latest version of the statement. The draft is available to the public as an attachment to the online agenda. She suggested getting input from students and staff in developing a motto for the district. The logo was also addressed. It was acknowledged that the current logo represents the history of the district, but perhaps does not capture the more modern direction we are moving in. Mr. Caldeira suggested that once the statement is complete, students could be allowed to submit ideas for the logo. Mr. Blanco noted that we have many graduates who are graphic designers as well.

Lompoc High School

The Agriculture Program at Lompoc High School is an integral part of the school with over 500 students enrolled and participating in weekly events and many actively involved in FFA (Future Farmers of America).
