

MY POSTSECONDARY PATH

Occupational Profile for students advancing to two-year or four-year institutions

Interests

Do you want NO-COST or LOW-COST certifications and two-year and four-year college credits while still in high school: Connect career interests to your Individual Career Academic Plan (ICAP)

Postsecondary Planning 9th/10th Grade

Building a 4-year plan to meet graduation requirements. Accelerated learners can take concurrent enrollment courses as early as 9th grade.

Postsecondary Planning 11th/12th Grade

Identifying on-campus, online and in-person opportunities at Roy J. Wasson or a college campus. Build three or more postsecondary options into your high school degree plan. Fill your senior year with postsecondary experiences.

Career & Technical Education Planning 9th/10th Grade

Identifying local CTE programs at your school, or on the Roy J. Wasson Academic Campus which can be taken as early as 9th grade, or at Pikes Peak State College which can begin in 11th grade.

Career & Technical Education Planning 11th/12th Grade

If any district CTE pathway is the best choice for you, plan to complete the pathway to earn all college credits and industry certifications available. Take advantage of internships in your senior year to start your career sooner.

Students completing nine postsecondary credits in high school qualify for their first year of college tuition free. Learn more about ASCENT on the D11 Concurrent Enrollment website.

The average cost per credit in Colorado is \$499. Students earning 15 credits while in high school would save on average \$7,485 and be a semester ahead in their postsecondary program. Nine out of 10 jobs in Colorado with an average yearly salary of \$73,000 require a postsecondary credential. Credentials may be college degrees or industry certifications.


