



College Admission Requirements

Criteria varies from school to school, but all colleges focus on the strength and quality of your high school transcript. Requirements may change from year to year, so always check with your college of interest for the most up to date information.

Public Universities

Technical/Community Colleges

Varies greatly from an open door admissions policy to selective course requirements by different departments or programs.

Specific programs may have more stringent requirements and deadlines.

Four-Year College Option

- Earn a Bachelor's degree:
 - Bachelor of Arts (BA) for humanities, social sciences, arts
 - Bachelor of Science (BS) for science, math, engineering
- Highly varied:
 - Can be public or private
 - Varying in size, academic standards, course offerings, cost
- Admissions criteria is usually stricter:
 - Usually for students in top ½ of their class
- Typically completed in four to five years

Technical College Options

- Admission requirements are specific to the program
- Various degrees offered (<u>Madison College</u>):
 - Associate Degree
 - Two-year Technical Diploma
 - One-year Technical Diploma
 - Less than one year Technical Diploma
 - Certificate
- Coursework specific to the field of study
- Associate Degree and the liberal arts transfer program have more general education requirements as they are preparing students for a transition into a four year college

Trade / Vocational School

- Usually specialized schools offering education/training in specialized areas of employment
 - Training time ranges from few weeks to couple years
 - Sometimes in-person, sometimes remote/distance learning
- Aimed at students who want to start working ASAP
- Examples of careers/jobs that might benefit from trade school:
 - Auto mechanic, cook/chef, hairdresser/barber, nurse's aide, truck driver
- Watch out for:
 - Higher tuitions because these schools are usually for-profit businesses (check programs at technical colleges first as they are often more cost effective)
 - Certification & accreditation to make sure it's worth it. Also, only accredited schools are eligible for financial aid!

Other Admissions Factors

- Rigor of Coursework
- Essay and/or personal statement
- Clubs, sports, volunteer, work experiences
- Leadership positions and special honors/awards
- Letters of recommendation
- Standardized test scores (mostly optional; submit if it enhances your application)

AP Courses

- How many AP courses should be taken?
 - BALANCE
- How is COLLEGE credit awarded?
 - To earn college credit, students must take an AP exam for the course. Students who earn a 3, 4, or 5 on the AP exam will typically be granted credit.
 - For specific information on how colleges grant credit, please access the <u>College</u> <u>Board website</u>
- How do I report my AP scores to the college that I will be attending?
 - Students choose to <u>send AP scores</u> to the college they will be attending. They can do this when they take the exams in May or from the College Board website.

Essays and Personal Statements

- Answer the prompts/questions
- Provide specific examples
- Pick a topic that sets you apart from other applicants
- Avoid buzzwords or clichés (I've always wanted to be a Badger)
- Have several people read it (i.e. English teacher, parent/guardian)
- Longer isn't necessarily better- do not go beyond the maximum length
- Address weak academic records or other extenuating circumstances this is your chance to tell your story!

Activities Resume

Activities resumes are helpful when completing college and scholarship applications, and requests for letters of recommendation (page 2 of the "<u>Senior Info Form</u>").

What to include:

- Extracurricular activities doesn't need to be a long list, but it should show commitment
- Can include activities in and out of school
- Include community service and volunteer work
- Include employment

- Highlight leadership captain, officer, tutor, first chair, trainer, coach, camp counselor, Sunday school teacher, etc.
- Highlight recognitions Solo & Ensemble, All Conference, MVP, Most Improved, Sportsmanship, manager, academic letter, Badger State Award, artwork display in museum or gallery, etc.

 - Complete the <u>FAFSA</u> starting October 1, 2024
 - Assistance is available (<u>College Goal Wisconsin</u>, one-on-one)
- Scholarships
 - MGHS scholarship list
 - Local scholarship program
 - College specific
 - Nationwide scholarship databases (ex. FASTWEB, Big Future, etc.)
 - Parent and/or student employers


- Figure out which kind of college you're interested in.

Junior Year Timeline

- Begin/continue your college search by reading about majors, careers and colleges. <u>Xello/ACP</u> is a great resource and can connect to school websites

 Compare college costs, learn about financial aid and scholarships
- College Visits

MGHS: Visit with admission counselors in student services
 Campus Visits

- College Admissions Test
 ACT ~ March 12, 2024
- Study for the Advanced Placement (AP) exams in May
- Be well balanced: volunteer, get an interesting job, intern, join a club, musical or sports team

Senior Year Timeline

- Schedule an appointment with your school counselor in September or October
- Narrow your list of school choices and APPLY. All college applications should be submitted by individual college deadlines ~ don't wait, it is a stressful time
- Most applications open on August 1 ~ visit each school's website to determine your application plan and then BEGIN YOUR APPLICATION
- Ask your teachers, coaches or advisors for recommendations if needed. Remember to allow at least 2 weeks for teachers/counselors to write the recommendation and follow-up with a thank you note. Use a "<u>Senior Info Form</u>" to document all of your activities.

With Early Decision/Early Action deadlines, plan accordingly so that your recommenders and counselors have enough time to complete things for which they are responsible (minimally 2 weeks) prior to the due date

Senior Year Timeline

If required, order your high school transcript to be sent to your colleges through Parchment (if not applying through Common Application). Most colleges allow for you to submit for purposes of admission (official transcripts must be requested for final transcripts).

 If applicable, order your college transcripts to be sent to your colleges (one example UW Green Bay - Spanish 5/French 5)

Financial Aid

Attend Financial Aid Night (October) and complete FAFSA starting October 1
 SPECIAL NOTE: Financial Aid Night is December 13, 2023 @ 6:00pm

•Review scholarship opportunities throughout the year

•The local scholarship application will be available online in the spring

Upon completion of first semester, submit mid-year transcript, as needed

College Applications Review

<u>UW Systems</u>

• August 1: Most applications will be available for applying/submitting

The Common Application

- Used by over 900 colleges (including UW Eau Claire, UW Madison, UW Milwaukee, UW River Falls, UW Stevens Point, UW Stout, UW Whitewater and University of MN - Twin Cities)
- Application is available on August 1

Early Decision & Early Action

- Early Decision: Student applies early and decision is binding
- Early Action: Student applies early and decision is non-binding
- UW Madison is an early action school
