






## How 'Bout Us??

All in all, having a brother or sister attending Skyview isn't so bad after all.







Meanwhile, the real football team at Skyview took the field and gave it their all in their homecoming game against Brighton.













Ready or not, technology, though sometimes frustrating, can only result in the continued improvement of *Silver Lining* and *The Predator*.


















marching season.




## Pumpin' up THE SPIRIT

Coach Karen Greening, a former forensics competitor, took on the task of sponsoring and helping the members of the team. It was through her help that the team achieved so much.






The season brought along many memorable moments.






## Taking It In Stride















## On To The Next...




