















## SYMBIOSIS: What Does It Mean?

Being a sophomore meant open campus for lunch, knowing where your classes were, and avoiding demeaning initiations by merciless Seniors.


But most important, it was the knowledge that you fit, that you belonged from the first day, and that you had nothing to fear in walking through the entrance on day one of the school year.

On the other hand, Cari Floerchinger was more interested in the freedom that sophomore status represented. "Being out to lunch without having to ask for a ride is the best part."




To the teachers, freshmen are the students they will have for for the next three

were tardy a lot, at the age of sixteen they kicked you out of school.






